Covid 19 Workers' Compensation Report

Overview


At the end of the year, there were 47,569 COVID-19 cases total in AK¹, with 1045 cumulative hospitalizations and 220 deaths. Cases continue to rise across the state, but the acceleration has slowed and shown signs of reversing in recent weeks.

From March 1st to December 21, there have been 1816 Workers' Compensation claims² where the cause of injury was "Pandemic" or the nature of injury was "COVID-19". There was 1 WC Fatality Claim.

Approximately 1 WC claim has been opened for every 10.5 cases of Covid-19. The measures tracked closely until the end of September corresponding to a spike in Covid cases.



The increase in covid-19 cases has not been met with similar increase in WC cases.

Payments


Payment have been made on 523 cases for a total of \$655,717.80. Employer paid (EP) has hovered between 20% and 25% accounting for \$120,723.50. \$143,580.62 has been paid in Other Benefit Type (OBT).

Covid WC Claims represent 12% of all new cases filed and 20% of all IPs or EPs filed from 3/19/2020 to 12/31/2020.

Industry

SB 241 was an extension of the public health disaster emergency declaration issued by the governor on March 11, 2020 and ended November 15, 2020; which declared a presumption of compensability if exposed to COVID-19 while employed as a firefighter, emergency medical technician, paramedic, peace officer, or health care provider, and verified by a lab or physician.

Since November 1st, there have been 783 WC cases opened, 320 closed, 106 denied and 172 paid, for a total of \$196,022.43. The medical industry accounted for 277 of those cases, and Police/Fire for 70.



Regional Breakout

As we can see from the following table, Anchorage has more covid cases per population and Southeast has less. The Northern Region has higher comp payments (almost exclusively due to one case in Utqiagvik). Southwest and Interior both have lower pay totals than expected.
