2017 – 1 Tanker at Kenai

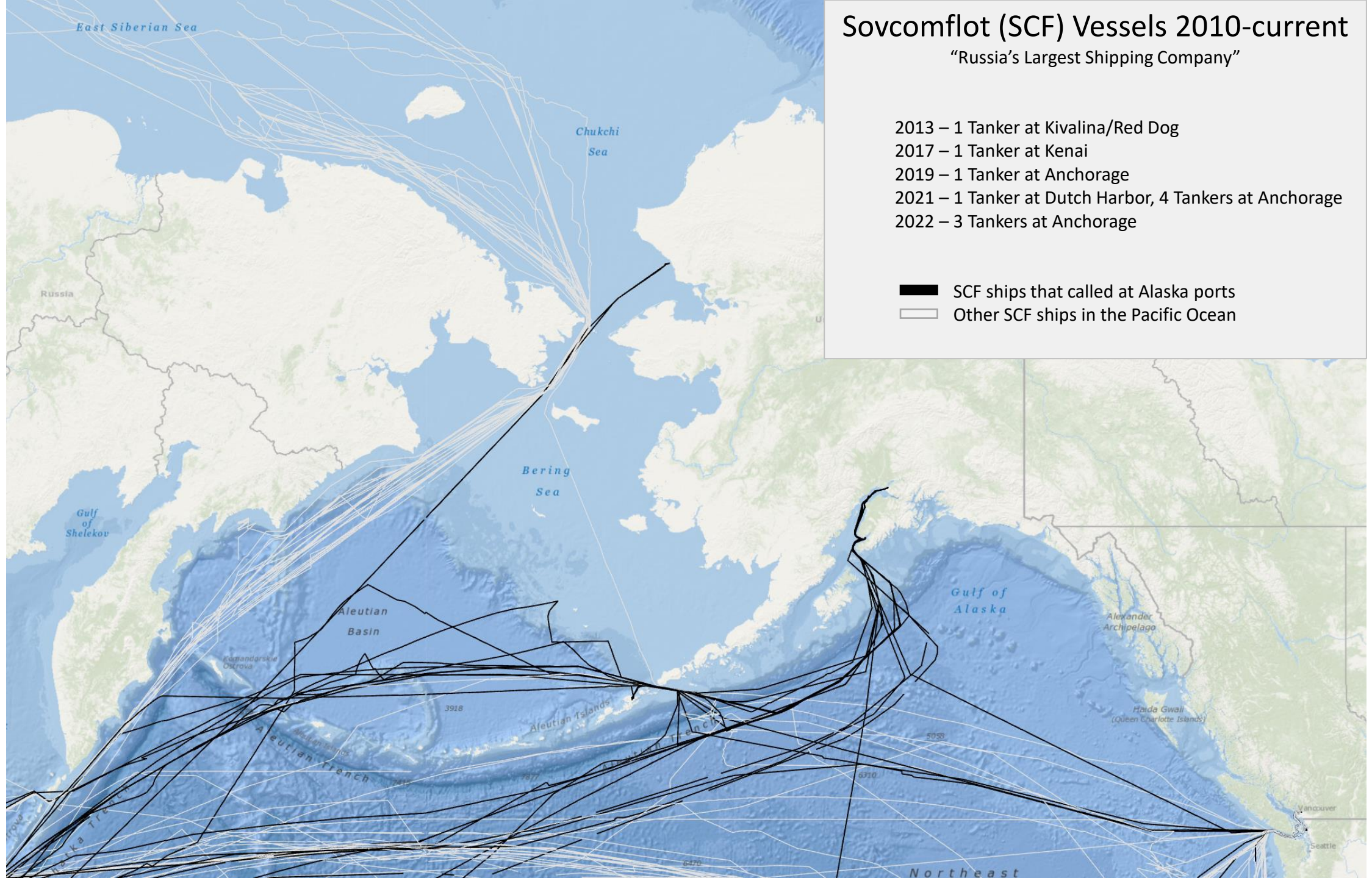
2019 – 1 Tanker at Anchorage

2022 – 3 Tankers at Anchorage

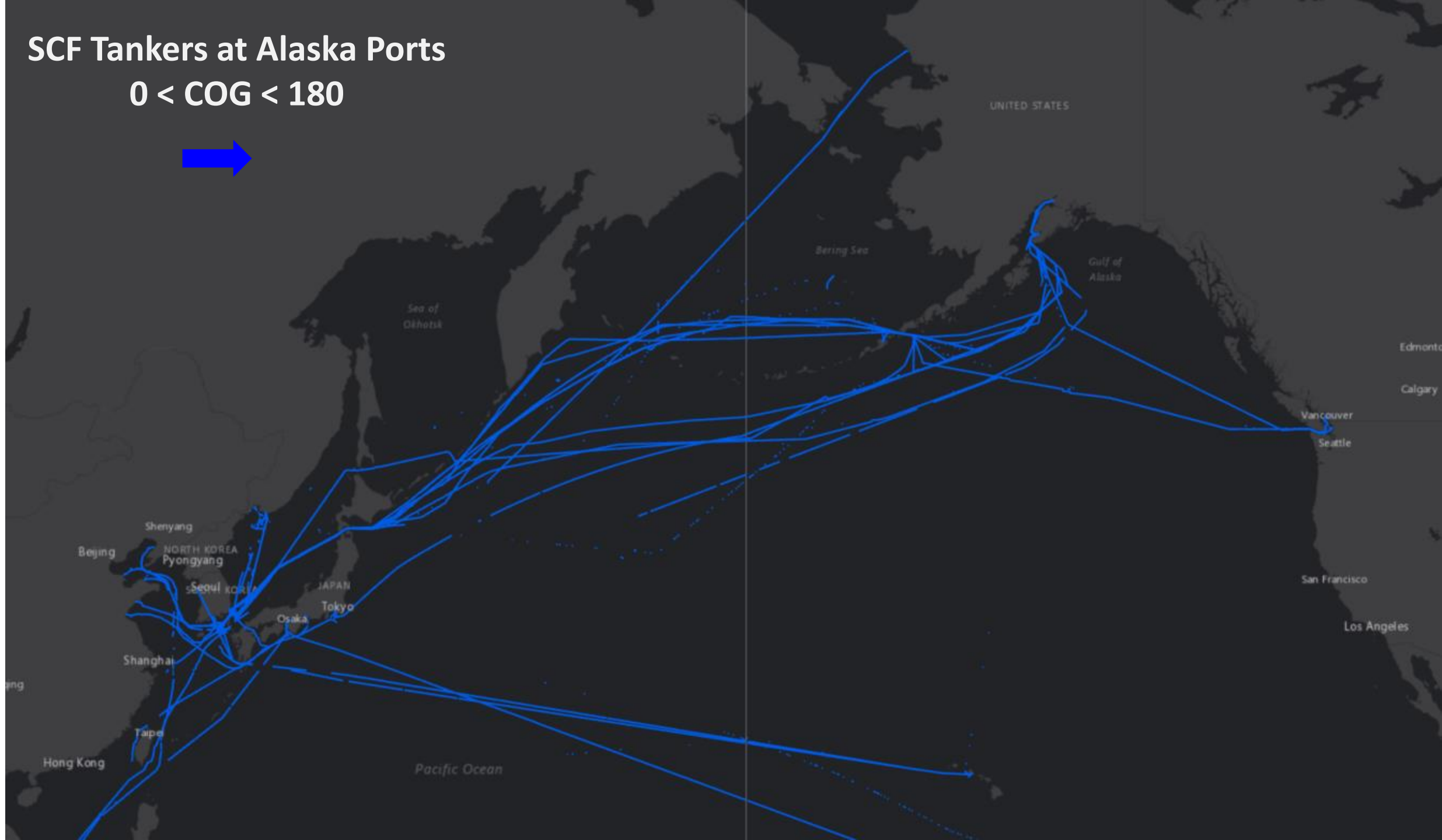

□ Other SCF ships in the Pacific Ocean



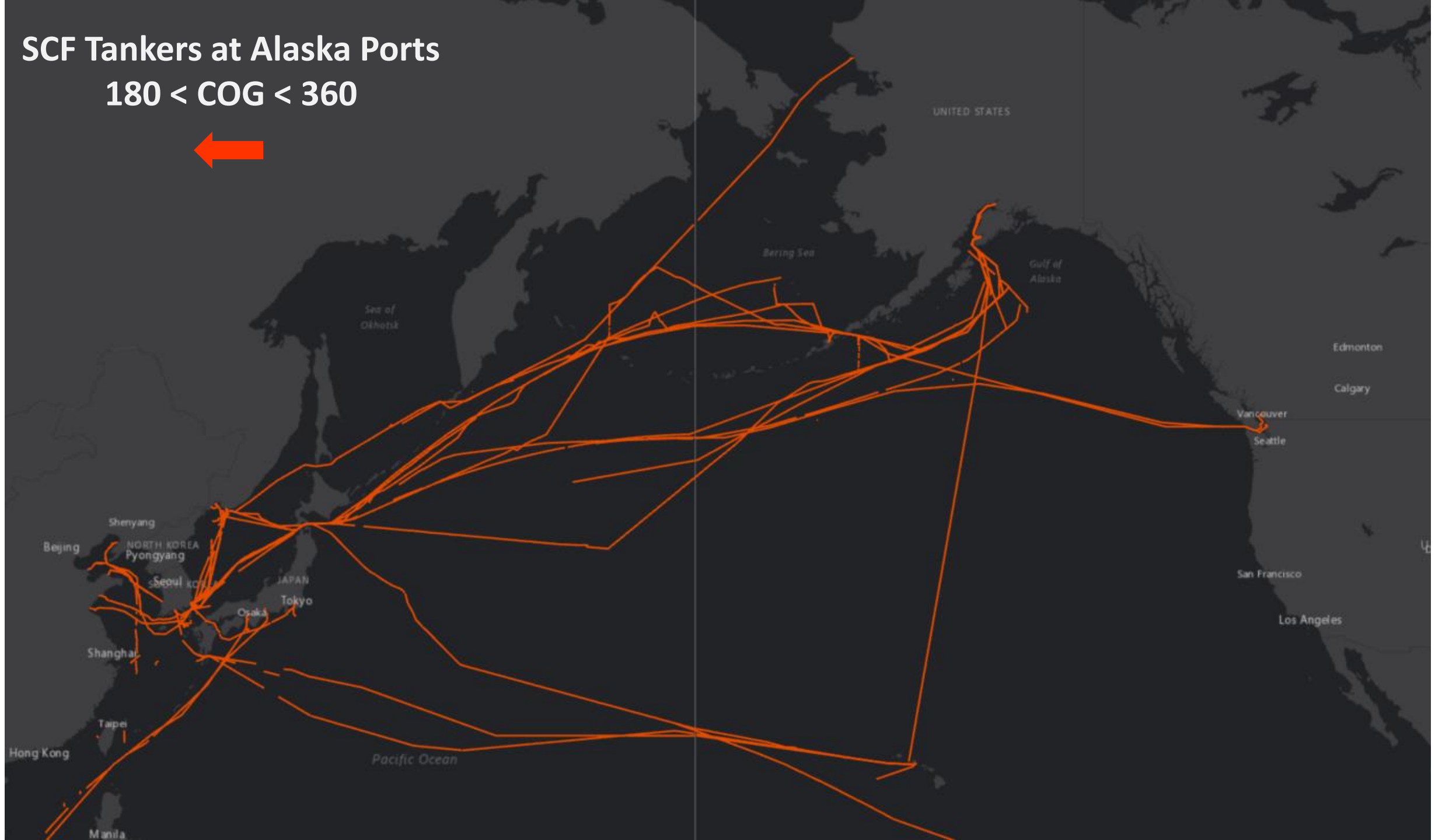
SCF Tankers at Alaska Ports

$0 < \text{COG} < 180$



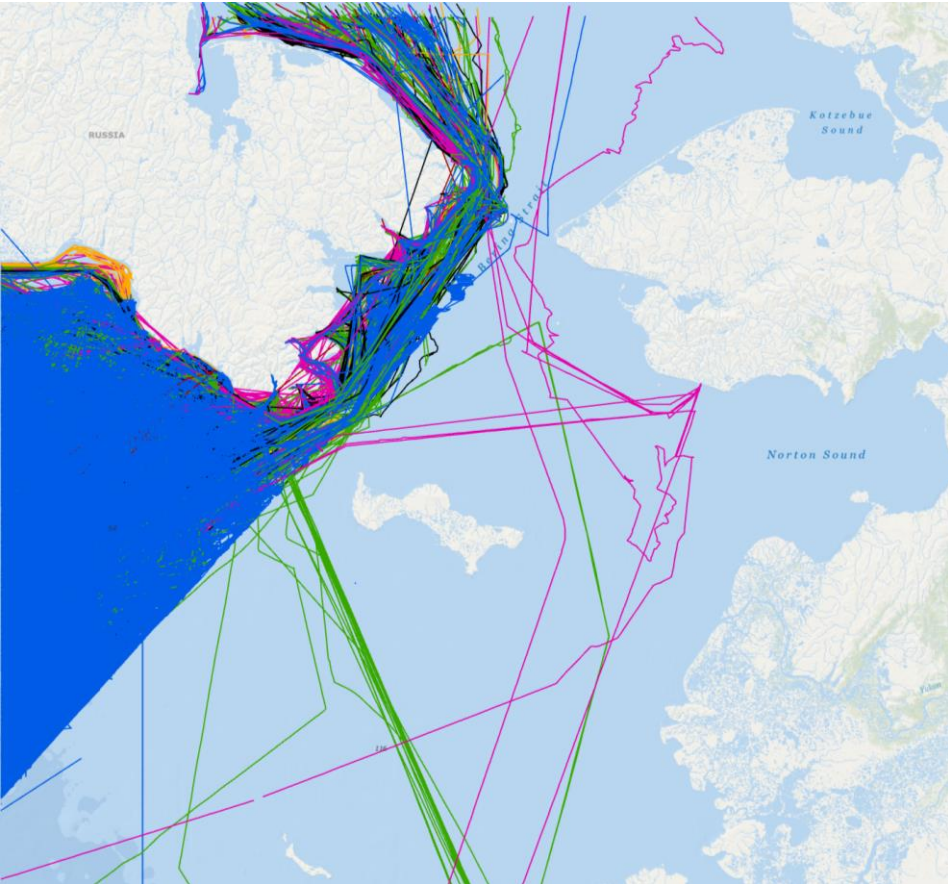
SCF Tankers at Alaska Ports

180 < COG < 360

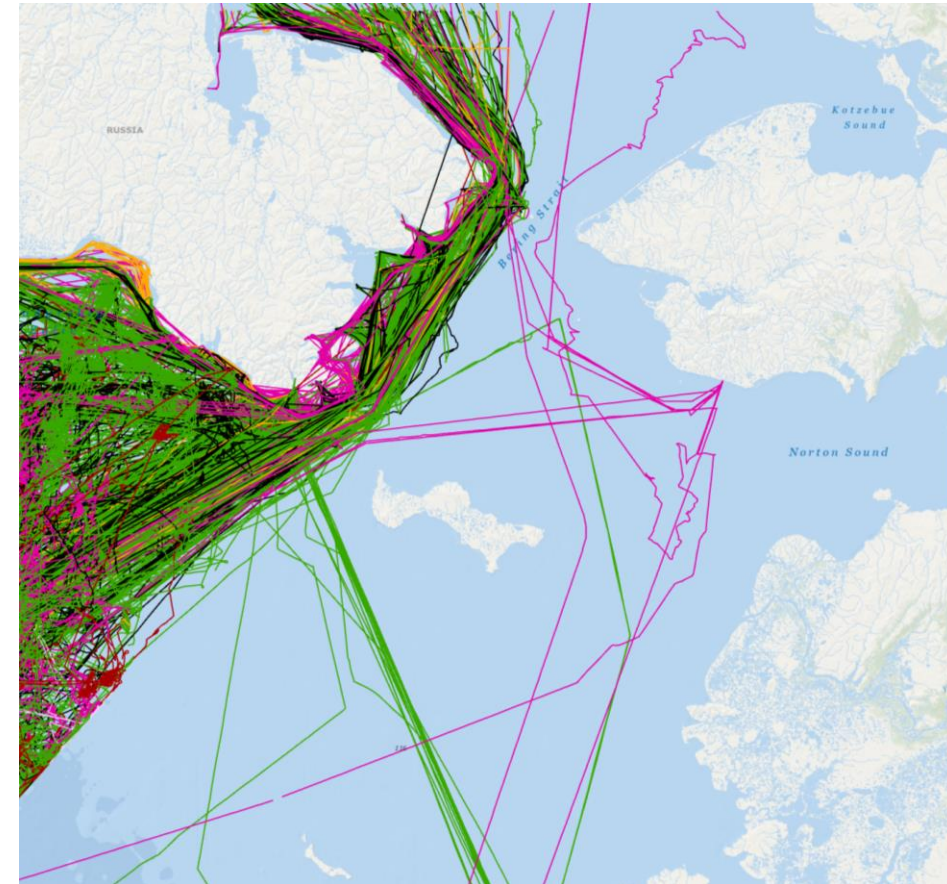


Russian-flagged Vessels Along the Border

(2014 - 2021)

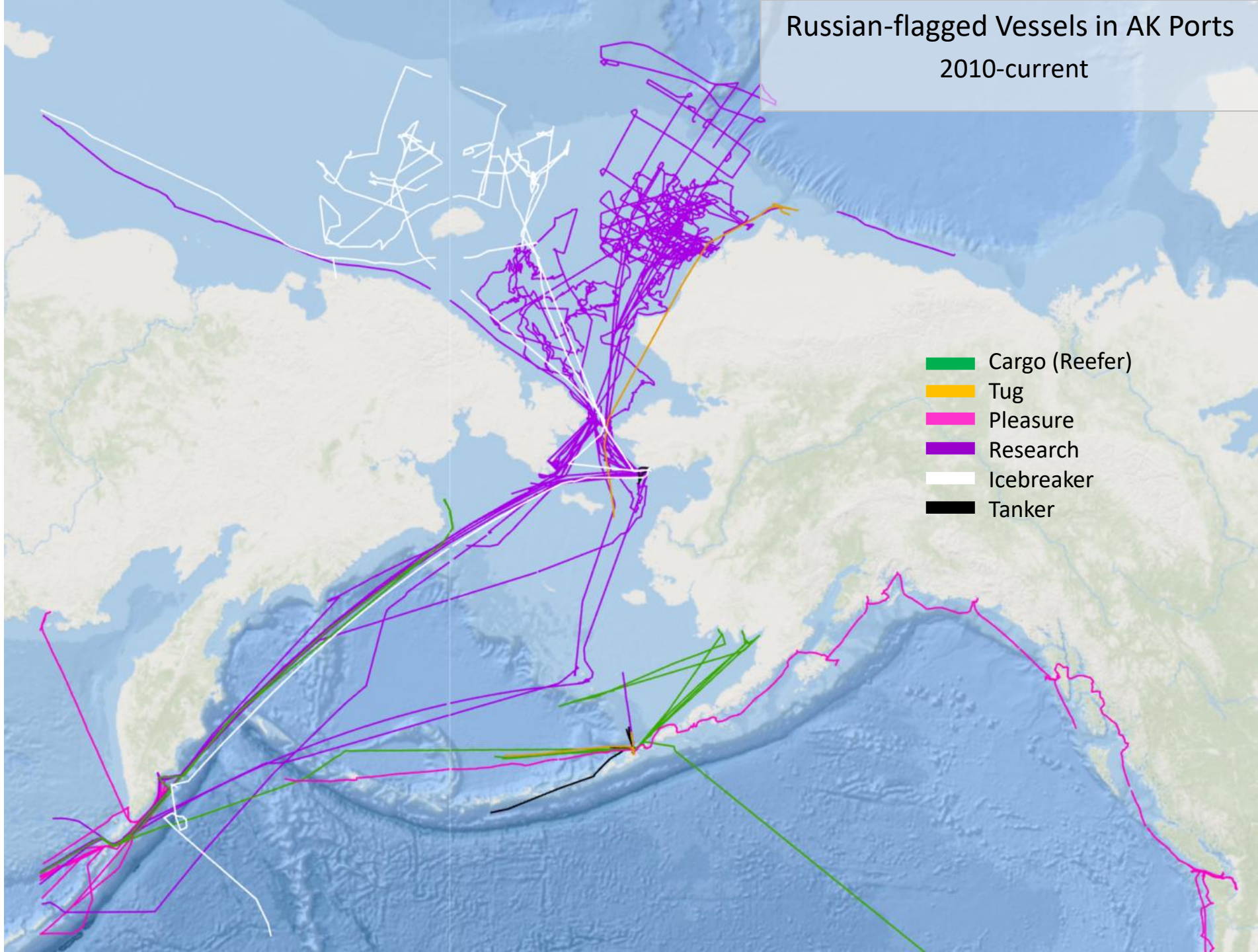

Russian-flagged Vessels in AK Ports 2010-current

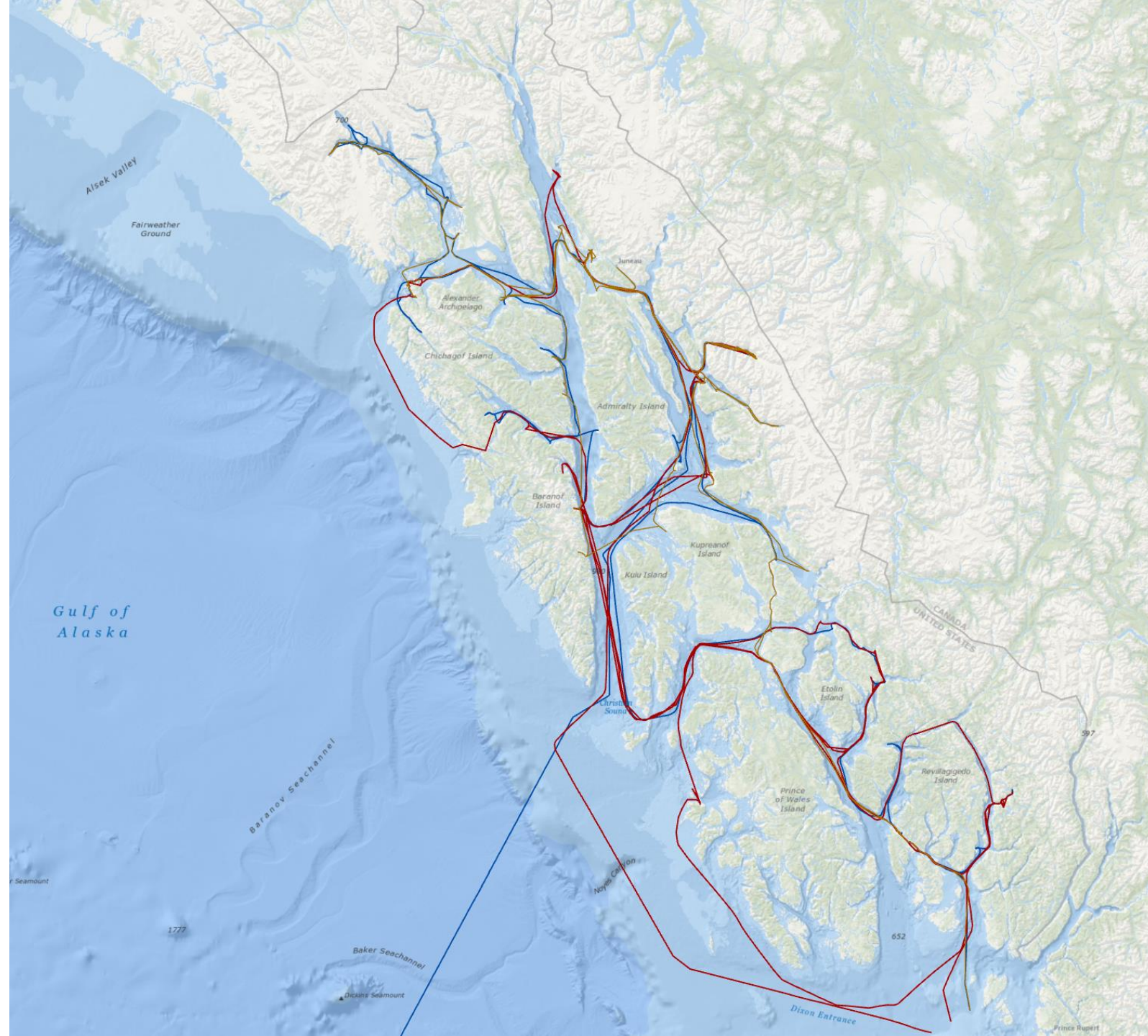

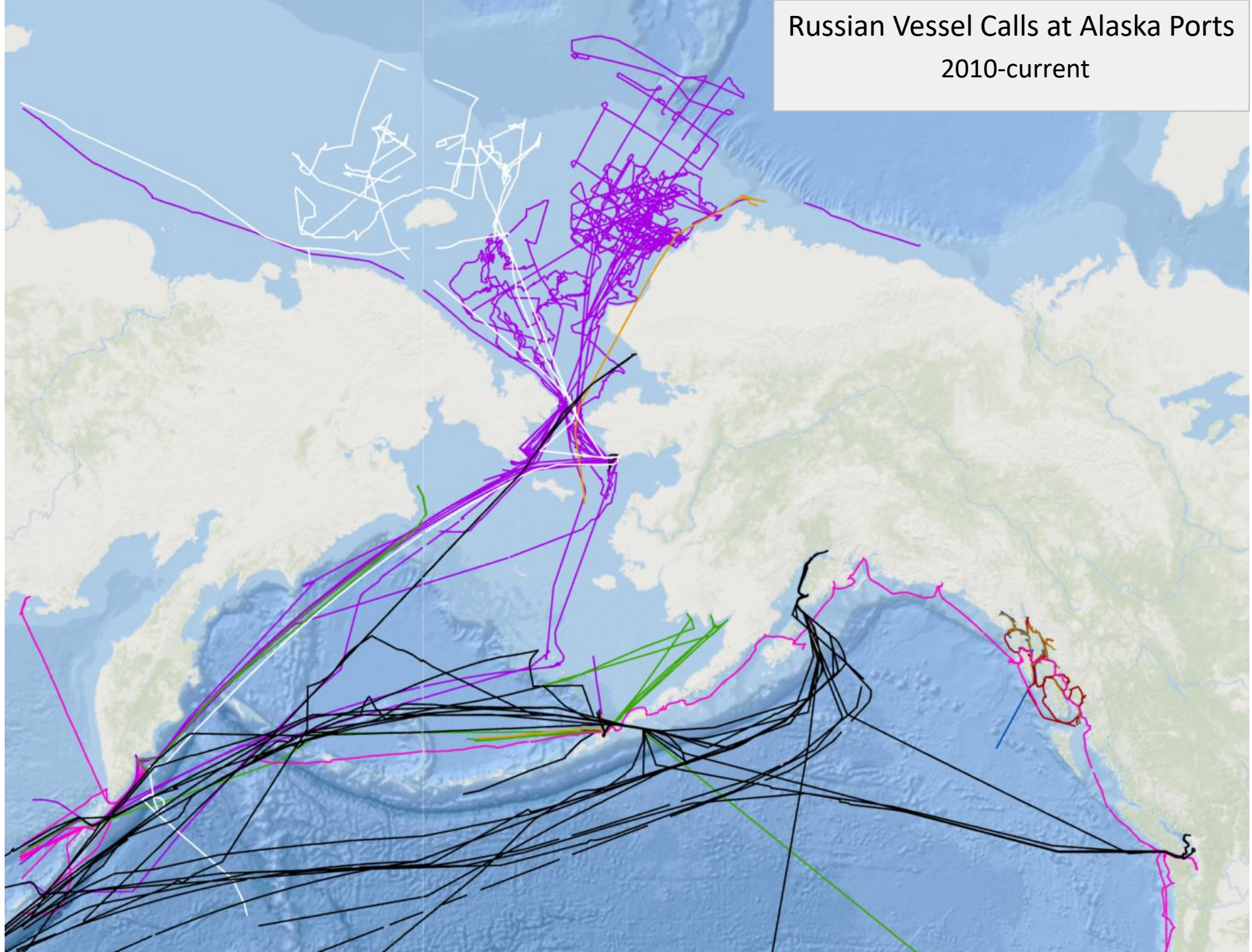
