**A RESOLUTION**

**1 Urging the United States Congress to pass legislation to open the coastal plain  
2 of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, Alaska, to oil and gas exploration,  
3 development, and production.**

**4 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:**

**5 WHEREAS** in sec. 1002 of the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act  
**6 (ANILCA), the United States Congress reserved the right to permit further oil and gas  
7 exploration, development, and production within the coastal plain of the Arctic National  
8 Wildlife Refuge, Alaska; and**

**9 WHEREAS** the oil industry, the state, and the United States Department of the  
**10 Interior consider the coastal plain to have the highest potential for discovery of very large oil  
11 and gas accumulations on the continent of North America, estimated to be as much as  
12 10,000,000,000 barrels of recoverable oil; and**

**13 WHEREAS** the residents of the North Slope Borough, within which the coastal plain  
**14 is located, are supportive of development in the "1002 study area"; and**

**15 WHEREAS** oil and gas exploration and development of the coastal plain of the refuge  
**16 and adjacent land could result in major discoveries that would reduce our nation's future need**

1 for imported oil, help balance the nation's trade deficit, and significantly increase the nation's  
2 security; and

3 **WHEREAS**, for the first year ever, more than one-half of the oil used in the United  
4 States has come from foreign sources as domestic crude oil production fell to 6,600,000  
5 barrels per day, its lowest annual level since 1954; and

6 **WHEREAS** development of oil at Prudhoe Bay, Kuparuk, Endicott, Lisburne, and  
7 Milne Point has resulted in thousands of jobs throughout the United States and projected job  
8 creation as a result of coastal plain oil development will have a positive effect in all 50 states;  
9 and

10 **WHEREAS** Prudhoe Bay production is declining by approximately 10 percent a year;  
11 and

12 **WHEREAS** opening the coastal plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge now  
13 allows sufficient time for planning environmental safeguards, development, and national  
14 security review; and

15 **WHEREAS** the oil and gas industry and related Alaskan employment have been  
16 severely affected by reduced oil and gas activity, and the reduction in industry investment and  
17 employment has broad implications for the Alaskan work force and the entire state economy;  
18 and

19 **WHEREAS** the 1,500,000-acre coastal plain of the refuge comprises only eight percent  
20 of the 19,000,000-acre refuge, and the development of the oil and gas reserves in the refuge's  
21 coastal plain would affect an area of only 5,000 to 7,000 acres, which is one and one-half  
22 percent of the area of the coastal plain; and

23 **WHEREAS** 8,000,000 of the 19,000,000 acres of the refuge have already been set  
24 aside as wilderness; and

25 **WHEREAS** the oil industry has shown at Prudhoe Bay, as well as at other locations  
26 along the Arctic coastal plain, that it can safely conduct oil and gas activity without adversely  
27 affecting the environment or wildlife populations;

28 **BE IT RESOLVED** by the Alaska State Legislature that the Congress of the United  
29 States is urged to pass legislation to open the coastal plain of the Arctic National Wildlife  
30 Refuge, Alaska, to oil and gas exploration, development, and production; and be it

31 **FURTHER RESOLVED** that that activity be conducted in a manner that protects the

1 environment and uses the state's work force to the maximum extent possible.

2       **COPIES** of this resolution shall be sent to the Honorable Bill Clinton, President of the  
3 United States; the Honorable Al Gore, Jr., Vice-President of the United States and president  
4 of the U.S. Senate; the Honorable Bruce Babbitt, Secretary of the Interior; the Honorable Newt  
5 Gingrich, Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives; the Honorable Robert Dole, Majority  
6 Leader of the United States Senate; to the Honorable Ted Stevens and the Honorable Frank  
7 Murkowski, U.S. Senators, and the Honorable Don Young, U.S. Representative, members of  
8 the Alaskan delegation in Congress; and to all other members of the United States Senate and  
9 the United States House of Representatives serving in the 104th United States Congress.
