Pursuant to adjournment the House was called to order by Speaker Kott at 10:36 a.m.

Enlighten with Your wisdom and sustain with Your power those whom the people have set in authority: the president, the governor, all counselors and legislators, judges and officials who are entrusted with our safety and with upholding our rights and liberties. May faithfulness in that which is beyond us spread its blessings among us and exalt our nation and our state with peace, and respect each cause for the other.

Oseh shalom bimromav, may the One who forms peace in the highest portion of the heavens, huya aseh shalom alaynu, be a source of peace for us, and may we, created in the image of the Divine, be a source of peace, of loving kindness, of wisdom and justice, and of joy in the lives of one another and the citizens of this great and beautiful state.
