SENSE OF THE HOUSE

The following Sense of the House was offered by Representatives Rauscher and Eastman:

"It is the sense of the House that, in accordance with *Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure*:

'It is not the right of the presiding officer to rule upon the constitutionality of bills, because that authority belongs to the house.' (*Mason's Manual Sec.* 578.6), and further that,

It is not the presiding officer's right to rule upon the constitutionality or legal effect or expediency of a proposed bill, since that authority belongs to the house.' (*Mason's Manual Sec.* 242.1), and further that,

If an amendment is clearly not germane to a measure, it may, under Uniform Rule 35, be ruled out of order, however, "The presiding officer should never rule an amendment out of order unless certain that it is. In case of doubt the presiding officer should entertain the amendment, subject to the right of a member to raise a point of order, or the presiding officer should submit to the house the question of whether the amendment is in order.' (*Mason's Manual Sec.* 401.5)"

Representative Rauscher moved that the Sense of the House be adopted.

There was objection.

Representative LeDoux moved to table the Sense of the House.
