Pursuant to adjournment the House was called to order by Speaker Stutes at 10:34 a m.

Roll call showed 36 members present. Representatives Carpenter, Kurka, Patkotak, and Tarr were absent and their presence was noted later.

The invocation was offered by the Chaplain, Student Rabbi Max Antman of Congregation Sukkat Shalom. Representative Thompson moved and asked unanimous consent that the invocation be spread on the journal. There being no objection, it was so ordered.

Yehudah Amichai, a famous Israeli poet once wrote:

A [person] needs to love and to hate at the same moment, to laugh and cry with the same eyes, with the same hands to throw stones and to gather them...

In a fragmented society, it is easy to fall into patterns of polarity, in which political conflict becomes not only the product of theological divide, but the theology itself. Amichai teaches that we do not have such a luxury. As human beings, we are called to both agitate and collaborate, centering the stories of those who lie between and beyond our conflicts to create meaningful and lasting change in our world.

In the days to come, let us remember that love and hate are not mutually exclusive, and that the fastest way towards progress is by joining hands and marching together.

In the Jewish tradition we say, Ken Yehi Ratzon, Let it Be So.
