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## Medicaid's Impact on Alaska's Economy





Medicaid is a critical economic driver in Alaska for healthy communities

Alaska Medicaid Snapshot, FY2024:

**\$2.8 billion** annual spend

Pays out **\$52 million** weekly

8.5 million annual claims


31,000 enrolled providers




## Total National Health Expenditures by Payer Type, 2023





- Medicaid is one of the largest public health insurance programs in the US
- Medicaid finances nearly one-fifth of national health care spending



#### What is Medicaid?

- Medicaid is a joint federal and State public health insurance program for low-income individuals and families
- The program is **designed to support vulnerable populations**, including children, pregnant women, seniors, individuals with disabilities, and other low-income groups
- States have flexibility in designing and administering Medicaid programs within federal guidelines
- Eligibility is based on financial (income) and categorical (e.g., age, disability, pregnancy) criteria



## **Medicaid Eligibility**





- Individual applies to a State or other government agency
- Agency verifies the applicant meets financial and general eligibility requirements
- A person must be financially and categorically eligible

#### Medicaid Services in Alaska Statute




#### Alaska Statute 47.07.030:

- Requires that Alaska's Medicaid program covers all mandatory services under Title XIX of the Social Security Act
- Lists additional services that Alaska Medicaid may cover. However, new federal requirements (e.g., the Affordable Care Act) have made many of these "optional services" effectively mandatory. Examples include:
  - Prescription Drugs
  - Emergency Hospital Services
  - Long-Term Care Non-Institutional Services

#### How is Medicaid Administered?

- States have flexibility to design their Medicaid programs, subject to approval by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS)
- Medicaid is jointly funded by federal and state governments
- States administer the program, managing eligibility, enrollment, services, and providers
- Alaska's legislature approves budget, optional groups, and services



CMS authorizes federal matching funds

#### Federal Medicaid Match



State and federal government split Medicaid costs based on the Federal Medical Assistance Percentage (FMAP):

- Calculated each year
- 50% federal floor
- Different eligibility categories have different FMAP rates

Category	FY2025 FMAP
Indian Health Services (IHS)	100.00%
Expansion Population	90.00%
Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)	66.08%
Breast & Cervical Cancer (BCC)	66.08%
1915(k) Community First Choice	57.54%
Regular Medicaid	51.54%

#### What is the Medicaid State Plan?

The Medicaid State plan is an agreement between the State and the federal government that outlines how the State will administer its Medicaid program.



- Defines who is eligible for Medicaid services
- Specifies the types of services covered
- Details how providers are reimbursed for services
- Explains how the State will administer the program

#### The Role of Medicaid Waivers

The U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services may grant waivers to certain Medicaid provisions, allowing states to test and implement innovative approaches.

Children with Complex Medical Conditions


Individualized Supports Waiver

Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) help people remain in their home or community when their needs would otherwise require an institutional level of care.

Thanks to HCBS waivers, Alaska saves \$600+ million annually in avoided costs.





#### **Annual Medicaid Spending, Enrollment & Recipients**




# Drivers Influencing the Medicaid Budget




## Recipients per Month Remains Flat





## **Chronic Conditions Drive Spending**


