Working with CMS, the division was able to identify planned work that is currently reimbursed at a 50 percent federal match but will be eligible for 75 percent federal participation for operations and maintenance and 90 percent for DDI. This request is aligned with the department's strategic priorities and federal requirements that take effect in the next two years. Additional federal authority is required.</p> <p>The School Based Services grant supports the development, implementation, and improvement of Medicaid School-Based Services statewide, allowing schools to submit for Medicaid reimbursement for health services delivered in school settings. School-based services increase access to health services for youth but very few schools in Alaska have school-based Medicaid programs. This grant supports coordination with schools, technical assistance, and resource development to support sustainable Medicaid School-Based Services programs.</p> <p>Without additional federal authority, the department risks interrupting these efforts and compromising CMS compliance timelines. Operating costs for these systems have steadily increased, and additional funding is needed to maintain uninterrupted operations and ensure Alaskans continue to receive the benefits they depend on. A primary driver of these increases is necessary technology modernization, including ongoing system licensing, maintenance, and support costs that shift from capital expenditures to operating costs once system development is complete.</p> <p>Additional budget authority is needed to support these essential technology systems and operations that are required to determine eligibility and administer public assistance statewide. These operating costs, which include software licensing, system maintenance, and integration services, are not eligible under the division's current capital appropriations.</p> <p>Between fiscal year (FY) 2023 and FY2026, operating software costs for key systems increased by approximately \$25.7 million without a corresponding increase to the base budget. Without adequate funding these core systems could experience delays, errors, or interruptions in service delivery. The VCC manages approximately 20,000 to 24,000 calls each month, providing telephonic applications, outbound client contact, and eligibility-related assistance.</p> <p>Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) rules generally require that certification functions (interviews, eligibility/benefit determinations, case actions that affect eligibility/benefits, etc.) be done by merit-system employees (state employees). A recently approved demonstration waiver from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) allows non-merit VCC staff to perform certification functions on behalf of the department. This will enable the department to directly address application backlogs and improve timeliness of benefits.</p> <p>By leveraging Medicaid federal participation and general fund match for allowable costs, the department was able to reduce the contract cost with the demonstration waiver from \$12,000.0 to \$8,000.0 for FY2027. This approach maximizes federal funding while maintaining essential service capacity.</p> <p>Centralizing call center functions within the VCC allows State eligibility technicians to focus on core eligibility processing rather than call handling. This division of labor has proven effective in improving compliance, reducing backlogs and minimizing delays in benefit access for eligible Alaskans.</p> <p>Discontinuation of the VCC would place significant operational strain on the division, delay access to critical assistance programs, disrupt service delivery, and risk noncompliance with federal and State requirements. Previously, the department relied on multi-year federal authority that termed out at the end of fiscal year (FY) 2025.</p> <p>The purpose of WIC is to provide nutrition assistance and education to pregnant women, postpartum women, infants up to one year old, and children up to ages five through electronic benefits to purchase specific healthy foods including milk, cheese, eggs, fruit, vegetables, whole grains, infant formula and baby foods, cereal, legumes, and peanut butter.</p> <p>Without increased federal authority, the program will face constraints in providing eligible families with access to nutritious foods, jeopardizing maternal and child health outcomes. Additional authority ensures the program can keep pace with inflationary pressures, maintain compliance with federal nutrition standards, and uphold its mission of supporting the health and well-being of Alaska's most vulnerable women, infants, and children.</p> <p>If additional authority is not approved, the WIC program will be unable to fully fund participant benefits. This would force the State to reduce or restrict WIC voucher amounts, directly limiting access to nutritious foods for women, infants, and children who rely on the program. Reduced benefits could lead to poorer health outcomes, increased food insecurity, and higher long-term healthcare costs. This request is in addition to the \$2,700.0 federal authority increase in the department's fiscal year (FY) 2027 Governor's budget due to recently awarded grants.</p> <p>With these grants, the Division of Public Health will support public health functions in the areas of communicable and chronic disease prevention, immunization systems, opioid and overdose prevention, and emergency preparedness.</p> <p>Additional federal authority is needed for immunization grants to support immunization information systems, data modernization, and core public health infrastructure. Immunization programs are returning to steady-state operations following the expiration of emergency funding under COVID.</p> <p>Federal authority is also needed for OD2A, COSSUP, and related chronic disease grants. Most of these funds will be distributed through grants and contracts to community partners implementing evidence-based opioid prevention, health promotion, treatment linkage, and recovery support services at the local level. In 2025, the division received a three-year \$6.9 million federal grant to address the opioid epidemic. Expenditure authority is requested for the remaining two years of funding and for future federal grants for the division.</p> <p>Without this additional authority, the Division of Public Health will be unable to fully expend federal awards or sustain federally funded public health services and infrastructure. The current vacancy rate is almost half of the historical average of 11 percent.</p> <p>However, this success puts additional pressure on the personal services budget which must be realigned to reflect a greater number of filled positions. Authority will be decreased in less utilized fund sources and increased in program receipts, wherein the majority of the DMLW's revenue is received.
