Analysis

This legislation would not have an impact on the Department of Environmental Conservation's budget.

Non-potentially hazardous foods are currently not regulated by the Department of Environmental Conservation regardless of who sells them. This legislation would not change that. For potentially hazardous foods that the Department of Environmental Conservation regulates, this legislation would eliminate our oversight in stances when the sales transaction occurs between a producer and a consumer. The majority of regulated producers sell to wholesalers, such as stores, therefore this legislation would not change the Department's oversight in those areas. This legislation would create a new method for producers to sell potentially hazardous foods directly to consumers without ensuring the safety of the food. The bill explicitly eliminates the Department's ability to respond to potential outbreaks, including inspection, testing, or detaining suspect products. As a result, there would be no cost to the Department in such instances.
