

Three levels of funding from Veterans Affairs

- Nursing Home Level of Care -\$144.10/day

### Alaska Pioneer Homes: Waitlists

Active Waitlist

An applicant with a desire to move into a home within 30 days is placed on the Active List.

All applications are ordered by date received

Inactive Waitlist

An applicant who desires to move into a home at a later date is placed on the Inactive List.

When an inactive applicant chooses to activate, they are placed on the Active List based on their original inactive application date.

# Alaska Pioneer Homes: Achievements

- Expanded training in dementia care, stigma, person-centered care and geriatric care
- Implemented a new nurse call system in three of the homes
- Implemented a new Electronic Health Record
- Created and implemented online waitlist application
- Maintenance and upgrades:
  - Ketchikan Pioneer's Home finished seismic upgrade
  - Juneau Pioneer's Home started courtyard project
  - Sitka Pioneer's Home updated bathing rooms
  - Alaska Veteran's and Pioneer's Home remodeled bathrooms and received VA funding for roof
- Pharmacy:
  - Provides medications to Pioneer Home residents
  - Clinical services:
    - Biannual chart reviews for general population
    - Monthly clinical and Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services adherence reviews for Skilled Nursing Facility Provider Consultations on request
  - Provided all six Division of Juvenile Justice facilities with medications since June 2022
  - Provided clinical placement for 11 pharmacy students in FY2023
  - Moving to Cloud hosting for FY2026



# Alaska Pioneer Homes: Looking Forward

- Complete install of call light system
- Move Pharmacy to cloud hosting
- Increase home internet capacity



### **INCREASE CENSUS**

- Help elders to easily apply to the waitlist

- Stigma, mental health, and substance use training for all staff
- Add more Positive
   Approach to Care trainers,
   and dementia care
   specialists
- Explore new training funding and opportunities

# Division of Juvenile Justice

### **Mission:**

- Hold juvenile offenders accountable for their behavior.
- Promote the safety and restoration of victims and communities.
- Assist offenders and their families in developing skills to prevent crime.

- 13 Probation Offices
- 421 Full Time Positions

- First point of contact for minors involved with DJJ
- Conduct intake investigations
- Lead the division's participation in court processes
- Case management and community supervision

Youth under 573 supervision






# **Detention Services**

- Temporary secure placement awaiting court processes or alternative placement
- Court-ordered to protect the youth, family, and the community
- Available in six facilities

Average length of stay days






# Treatment Services

- Available at four DJJ facilities






# FY2024 By the Numbers






# Referral Trends, FY2015-FY2024
