
The Strategic Moment




Arctic security is escalating

Alaska hosts Tier One facilities




Infrastructure readiness will determine funding velocity and military preparedness



The Core Problem

No unified, defense-aligned narrative

- Regions have projects
- ARDORs know the priorities
- Utilities have needs



Federal staff do not have time to piece this together



ARIDAR Is A Focused Readiness Tool

ARIDAR IS:

- A concise, 1–2 page federal-ready white paper
- A coordinated synthesis of ARDOR infrastructure priorities
- Focused on ALL Infrastructure Pillars
- Linked to a structured digital companion



ARIDAR IS NOT:

- A new planning exercise
- A long technical report
- A political messaging document



Keep It Simple, Smartie

Federal decision-makers need:

- Clarity
- Confidence
- Speed

The white paper is the front door.
The website is the library.

The Digital Companion

If asked: “How much? Where? What phase?”

- Costs
- Phasing
- Regional breakdown

Clear scope = controlled cost and timeline

2. Reinforcement in federal conversations
3. Awareness of coordinated ARDOR effort
4. Early champions
5. A seat at the table and part of the planning discussion.



No funding ask today. We need alignment and awareness.



What Success Looks Like



1. Federal staff reference Alaska's coordinated infrastructure plan
2. Alaska is seen as investment-ready
3. Projects move faster through state channels
4. State-federal communication tightens
