

Alaska State Constitution Education Clause

Section 7.1 | Public Education

The legislature shall by general law establish and maintain a system of public schools open to all children of the State and may provide for other public educational institutions. Schools and institutions so established shall be free from sectarian control. No money shall be paid from public funds for the direct benefit of any religious or other private educational institution.

AS 14.07.168. Report to the Legislature

Not later than the 30th legislative day of each regular session of the legislature, the board shall prepare and present in person to the legislative committees having jurisdiction over education an annual report that describes the efforts of the board to develop, maintain, and continuously improve a comprehensive quality public education system, as provided for under the bylaws of the board. The report must include:

1. A summary of the resolves and rationales provided in support of policy decisions made under AS 14.03.015
2. Program and curriculum changes made, discussed, or recommended in meetings held under AS 14.07.125
3. Additional information relevant to efforts made to improve and maintain the public education system



- Appointed a student advisor to the State Board of Education, ensuring student voice is represented in board discussions and decision-making
- Approved the renewal of eight existing charter schools and granted initial approval for one new charter school, expanding high-quality public-school choice for families

What Progress Looks Like by 2025

- K–3 reading measures submitted to the department will show positive trends
- The number of students in grades 3–5 who are proficient on the statewide English language arts assessment will double
- The number of students in grades 3–5 who are proficient on the statewide math assessment will double, since research suggests that reading ability is one of the best predictors of strong math skills
- Student absenteeism rates will be reduced by at least 20 percent

Progress Highlights



Passage of the Alaska Reads Act (2022): Established a statewide framework to ensure every student reads proficiently by the end of third grade



Implementation of Key Components: District Reading Improvement Plans (DRIPs) in all districts, the Department Reading Program (DRP) for intensive support to the lowest-performing schools, and Individual Reading Improvement Plans (IRIPs) to engage families in literacy progress



Statewide K–3 Literacy Screening: Implemented the Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) 8th Edition literacy screener statewide, providing consistent, reliable data across all districts



Professional Learning Expansion: Trained more than 1,200 educators annually through the Science of Reading Symposium and expanded statewide access to literacy professional development



Alaska Native Language Literacy and Instruction: Adopted the Alaska Native Language Arts K–² Literacy Standards and development of Indigenous language literacy screeners to support early reading in Alaska Native languages



Strategic Priority 2

Increase career, technical, and culturally relevant education to meet student and workforce needs.

What Progress Looks Like by 2025

- The number of students who, upon graduation, have earned dual credit, obtained an industry certification, or completed Advanced Placement coursework will increase by at least 15 percent
- The overall four-year graduation rate will increase to at least 90 percent
- The overall five-year graduation rate will increase to at least 93 percent
- The number of students participating in CTE Programs of Study will increase by at least 20 percent

Strategic Priority 2

Increase career, technical, and culturally relevant education to meet student and workforce needs.

Progress Highlights

CTE

Expansion of CTE Programs: Awarded new CTE Program of Study (CTEP) grants in 2024 to strengthen district offerings and develop pathways in high-demand industries



Collaboration and Partnerships: Supported statewide collaboration through two annual CTE conferences, regional consortia such as the Bristol Bay Regional CTE Consortium (BBRCTE), and partnerships with Department of Labor and Workforce Development (DOLWD), the University of Alaska (UA), and industry leaders



Student Leadership and Engagement: Reestablished and expanded Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSOs) and launched annual SBOE CTE Recognition Awards to highlight exemplary programs statewide



Career Guide Demonstration Project: Partnered with DOLWD, BBRCTE, Sealaska Heritage Institute, and rootEd Alliance to expand career advising and postsecondary planning for rural and remote students




Policy and Legislative Progress: Enacted House Bill 148 (2024), expanding Alaska Performance Scholarship eligibility to include CTE coursework and strengthening access to career-focused pathways

What Progress Looks Like by 2025

- The current performance gaps in English language arts and math for all student subgroups will be reduced by at least 45 percent
- The current gaps in graduation rates for all student subgroups will be reduced by at least 50 percent
- The proficiency rate for English learner students will increase to at least 65 percent
- The number of students in each subgroup who are required to take remedial classes upon entering college will be reduced by at least 50 percent

Standards and Instructional Support: Expanded access to evidence-based strategies and materials across all content areas, including new standards in social studies and ongoing literacy initiatives from pre-K through grade 12



Science of Reading Implementation: Extended Alaska Reads Act literacy structures to pre-K through grade three, supported by statewide Science of Reading training and literacy screeners for all K–5 students




Attendance and Engagement: Launched the *Strive for 5 – Attend School All Week* statewide campaign to reduce chronic absenteeism and implemented Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) programs in 14 districts and 46 schools



State–Tribal Partnerships and Culturally Relevant Education: Advanced Tribal Compacting legislation and partnerships with five pilot tribes to promote culturally relevant governance and learning strategies.

Three-year trend



English/Language Arts





Statewide Four-Year Graduation Rate


Percent by Calendar Year



Progress Highlights



Grow-Your-Own Pathways: Established the Teacher Registered Apprenticeship Pathway (T-RAP) and Principal Registered Apprenticeship Pathway (P-RAP) to expand CTE-aligned, earn-while-you-learn routes into the profession and grow Alaska’s homegrown educator workforce



Educators Rising Expansion: Increased participation in Educators Rising from 96 students in 2017–18 to 189 students in 2024–25, supporting district-based programs that introduce high school students to education careers and align with university teacher preparation pathways



Teacher Retention and Recruitment (TRR) Initiative: Launched by the Governor of Alaska in 2020 to strengthen the state’s educator workforce, the TRR Action Plan (2021) and Playbook (2023) outline coordinated strategies across stakeholder groups, supported by ongoing statewide outreach and engagement



Certification Modernization: Modernized Alaska’s electronic teacher certification system, reducing processing times and enhancing customer service for educators and districts through streamlined online workflows and transparent application tracking




Regulatory Alignment and SBOE Action: Since 2017, the State Board of Education has approved 23 regulation changes that expanded alternative certification routes, established new certificates and endorsements, aligned teacher assessments and reciprocity provisions, and streamlined certification processes to strengthen Alaska’s educator workforce

Alaska Trends in Teacher and Principal Turnover | 2013-2024



Teacher and Principal Turnover by School Locale | 2024



FTE | 2019-2025



Educators Serving on Work Visas

Alaska's schools continue to benefit from the contributions of internationally recruited educators who help districts fill positions that would otherwise remain vacant.



Strategic Priority 5

Improve the safety and well-being of students through school partnerships with families, communities and tribes.

What Progress Looks Like by 2025

- The number of students who report on the 2025 Alaska Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) that they did not go to school on one or more of the last 30 days because they felt unsafe will decrease by 35 percent
- The number of students suspended from school for non-violent and non-safety-related incidents in a given school year will decrease by at least 15 percent

Strategic Priority 5

Improve the safety and well-being of students through school partnerships with families, communities and tribes.

Progress Highlights



Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS): Expanded PBIS implementation to 45 schools in 14 districts, promoting positive school climate and behavior. DEED also supports Anchorage School District's (ASD) rollout using Title IV-A funds, with 45 ASD schools now participating



Trauma-Engaged Schools and Practices: Continued statewide training and coaching to help schools implement the Transforming Schools: A Framework for Trauma-Engaged Practice in Alaska. Nearly 15,000 copies have been distributed, and an online Trauma Toolkit provides ongoing professional learning and resources for school teams



Attendance Initiative: Launched the Strive for 5 – Attend School All Week campaign to address chronic absenteeism through coordinated outreach, data sharing, and district-level resources that emphasize consistent attendance as critical to academic success




Protecting the Learning Environment: The SBOE adopted a 2024 resolution encouraging districts to limit student cell phone use, followed by passage of HB 57 (2025), which restricts device use during instructional hours to reduce distractions, support student engagement, and protect focused learning environments



Proposed State of Alaska Blue and Gold Ribbon School Recognition Program

- The federal National Blue Ribbon Schools Program concluded in August 2025, with the 2024 cycle serving as the final group of awardees
- The national program recognized schools demonstrating high academic performance or success in closing achievement gaps
- Today, the Alaska State Board of Education and Early Development is considering a resolution to establish the State of Alaska Blue and Gold Ribbon School Recognition Program
- If approved, the Department will open applications in fall 2026 for schools eligible from the 2025 and 2026 accountability cycles, with formal recognition planned for March 2027
- Appreciation to Representative Rebecca Himschoot for encouraging the Board to pursue a state-level recognition program
- The Department welcomes the opportunity to present future awardees during the Joint Senate and House Education Committee annual meeting to elevate recognition statewide
