RE: **Letter of Support for Legislation Establishing the Jonesville Public Use Area**

It is my understanding that legislation is to be introduced this session to establish the Jonesville Public Use Area. As manager for Borough lands within the 25,000 square miles that comprise the Mat-Su Borough, I want to go on-record as being very supportive of this effort. I believe that this is the right direction for the Citizens, the Borough, and the State.


The Jonesville area currently suffers from many of the problems/issues that once afflicted what is now the Knik River Public Use Area (KRPUA). Rampant and uncontrolled shooting, under-age partying, vehicle burning, and many other associated destructive activities have unfortunately become the norm in the Jonesville area. Further, the greater Sutton community has essentially been left on its own to grapple with the lawlessness, damage and related community impacts.

No too many years ago, we saw a very similar situation in the KRPUA and the Butte area. However, once the KRPUA was formally established by the legislature and the plan was completed for the area, considerable progress has been made by the State, the Borough, the community, as well as various user groups to dispel much of the area's "Wild West" reputation. In fact, the Borough has invested substantially in improving recreation infrastructure on its lands adjoining the KRPUA. As a result, the area is becoming increasingly 'family-friendly' while maintaining a vast majority of the recreation values that make it so popular. We hope to continue to work with the State until we have fully turned the corner.

This is all because the State made the conscience decision to establish the KRPUA. I believe that the Jonesville area can have a similar positive outcome, and the first step is to establish the Jonesville Public Use Area. I am ready to assist the State in this effort in any way I can, and sincerely hope the legislature will take this vital first step.

FOR AN ACT ENTITLED

1 **"An Act establishing the Jonesville Public Use Area."**

2 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:**

3 * **Section 1.** AS 41.23 is amended by adding new sections to read:

4 **Sec. 41.23.280. Purpose of AS 41.23.280 - 41.23.289.** The purpose of
5 AS 41.23.280 - 41.23.289 is to protect, maintain, enhance, and perpetuate the present
6 use of the area described in AS 41.23.286 as the Jonesville Public Use Area. The
7 Jonesville Public Use Area is established to

8 (1) protect, maintain, perpetuate, and enhance year-round general
9 public recreation;

10 (2) protect and maintain migratory waterfowl nesting areas and
11 habitats for moose, Dall sheep, brown bear, and other fish and wildlife so that the
12 public may continue to enjoy the fish and wildlife of the Jonesville Public Use Area;

13 (3) provide opportunities for the public to enjoy the area through a full
14 spectrum of public uses, including the maintenance and enhancement of off-road
15 vehicle and nonmotorized recreational opportunities for the public; and

(4) allow

(A) continued motorized access for miners and owners of private property in the Jonesville Public Use Area; and

(B) additional public uses of the area determined by the commissioner to be compatible with this section.

Sec. 41.23.282. Management. (a) The commissioner is responsible for the management of the surface and subsurface estate of the Jonesville Public Use Area consistent with the purposes of AS 41.23.280. After adequate public hearings, the commissioner may designate incompatible uses and shall adopt and may revise a management plan for the Jonesville Public Use Area. The management plan must include provisions for the enforcement of the plan and compliance with the requirements of the plan. The commissioner shall consult with the Department of Fish and Game in the adoption and revision of the management plan.

(b) Subject to valid existing rights, the commissioner may not dispose of the surface estate in state land within the Jonesville Public Use Area.

(c) The commissioner of fish and game, the Board of Fisheries, and the Board of Game are responsible for the management of fish and game resources and the public use of fish and wildlife in the Jonesville Public Use Area consistent with the purposes of AS 41.23.280.

(d) The Jonesville Public Use Area may not be managed as a unit of the state park system.

(e) The commissioner shall identify wetland areas within the Jonesville Public Use Area and provide for the protection and use of the wetland areas in the management plan.

(f) The state may not acquire by eminent domain privately owned land within the boundaries described in AS 41.23.286 but may acquire privately owned land located within the boundaries described in AS 41.23.286 by purchase, exchange, or otherwise for inclusion in the Jonesville Public Use Area.

Sec. 41.23.284. Incompatible uses. (a) Except as provided in this section, the commissioner may prohibit or restrict uses determined to be incompatible with the purposes of the Jonesville Public Use Area under AS 41.23.280 within the state-

2 (b) Nothing in AS 41.23.280 - 41.23.289 prohibits the Department of Fish and

6 (c) The commissioner may not restrict

17 (B) include all-terrain vehicles, aircraft, watercraft,
18 snowmachining, horseback riding, hiking, bicycling, dog sledding, cross-
19 country skiing, skijoring, camping, hunting, fishing, trapping, wildlife viewing,
20 photography, and, where permitted, rifle and pistol ranges, parking of
21 vehicles, and mineral exploration and mining; and

22 (2) recognize the existing off-road motor vehicle trails and the access
23 those trails provide within the Jonesville Public Use Area, make accommodations that
24 will provide the shortest possible route to avoid critical habitat, conduct trail
25 rehabilitation in a way that minimizes damage, maintain and enhance off-road motor
26 vehicle options and opportunities in the Jonesville Public Use Area, and provide for
27 responsible use of the public use area.

28 (e) The commissioner of public safety and the commissioner of fish and game
29 shall have necessary access to the Jonesville Public Use Area for fish and game
30 management, research, and enforcement purposes.

31 (f) If the commissioner determines that a use is incompatible with one or more

1 other uses in a portion of the Jonesville Public Use Area, the commissioner shall state
2 in the management plan adopted or revised under AS 41.23.282

- 3 (1) each determination of incompatibility;
- 4 (2) the specific area where the incompatibility is determined to exist;
- 5 (3) the time within which the incompatibility is determined to exist;

- 7 (4) the reasons for the determination of incompatibility.

8 **Sec. 41.23.286. Jonesville Public Use Area.** Subject to valid existing rights,
9 the vacant and unappropriated state-owned land and water and the state land and water

11 are designated as the Jonesville Public Use Area, are reserved for all uses compatible
12 with their primary function as public use land, and are assigned to the department for
13 control and management:

RESOLUTION SERIAL NO. 17-012**

A RESOLUTION OF THE MATANUSKA-SUSITNA BOROUGH ASSEMBLY SUPPORTING ALASKA STATE HOUSE BILL NO. 6, ESTABLISHING THE JONESVILLE PUBLIC USE AREA.

WHEREAS, the Jonesville Mine/Slipper Lake area near Sutton, over the past few years; gradually turned into a lawless area that included one shooting death; several near misses; numerous poorly thought out unorganized shooting areas; shots fired at working construction equipment and residential houses; numerous four-wheeler accidents; massive partying with alcohol and other drugs; garbage; human waste and many other thoughtless, unsafe, and undesirable activities; and

WHEREAS, upwards of 20 truck and trailer loads of garbage and contaminants are picked up from the grounds in the area and taken to the local transfer station by community volunteers each year; and

WHEREAS, Sutton community members became concerned and attempted to improve the area, but the undesirable uses grew faster than local solutions, and

WHEREAS, the community of Sutton provided its own resources and funds to clean and monitor the Jonesville area, even though the jurisdiction over the lands lies with the state of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, signage has not been placed to designate public use activities including shooting and off-road recreational vehicles; the State has not provided signs without a management plan in place; and

WHEREAS, the Sutton Community Council established "The Jonesville/Slipper Lake Action Committee" in November 2015, that gathered widespread community input and participation, to determine a course of action to improve the situation on public lands in and around Sutton, known as Eska and Jonesville mining areas; and

WHEREAS, the Sutton community sought help from Borough Planning and Land Management officials, Alaska State Department of Natural Resources, and Alaska State Troopers; and

WHEREAS, a management plan and agreement can only be put in place after the area has been declared a Public Use Area by State legislation; and

WHEREAS, legislation would allow a management plan which would protect the homes and property of local citizens in Sutton; reduce all-terrain vehicle accidents; provide needed safe places for recreational shooting; mitigate illegal dumping; and generally provide a healthier, cleaner and safer environment for public multiple use activities; and

WHEREAS, the area being wrecked by crazy behavior is beautiful and has potential for family camping, picnicking,

controlled shooting, hiking and other outdoor activities; and

WHEREAS, the state of Alaska controls the active and abandoned mining leases and the moose range located in the Jonesville area, which has a long history of public use under the Department of Natural Resources; and

WHEREAS, the Jonesville/Slipper Lake Action Committee and other stakeholders have reviewed the history and determined a course of action needs to be taken for the benefit of the community of Sutton and the safety of the general public; and

WHEREAS, the current problems are similar to the Jim Creek area lands a few years ago prior to the establishment of the Knik River Public Use Area (KRPUA), and

WHEREAS, the steady establishment of the KRPUA of a shooting range, designated trails, and other things have dramatically reduced violence, crime, alcohol and other drugs, and changed the character of the land use to be more family friendly; and

WHEREAS, the areas adjacent to the main Sutton community are beautiful, accessible areas with great potential to have similar camping, safe shooting areas, designated trails and more family friendly activities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Matanuska-Susitna Borough Assembly enthusiastically supports the establishment of a Public Use Area by the state of Alaska for purposes of recreation in the Jonesville/Slipper Lake area.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Borough will assist and coordinate efforts to develop a public use plan and supports the enabling legislation, House Bill 6, now before the 30th Alaska Legislature.

RESOLUTION OF SUPPORT FOR THE JONESVILLE PUBLIC USE AREA

- WHEREAS: the Sutton Community Council saw a need to establish a committee called, "The Jonesville/Slipper Lake Action Committee" in November 2015, to determine a course of action with regard to the publically used land area located in Sutton, Alaska known as Eska and Jonesville mining areas,
- WHEREAS: the Jonesville Mine area, Eska Mine area and parts of the Moose Range located in the Sutton area will be collectively titled "Jonesville Area" in the following items denoting those areas in this resolution,
- WHEREAS: the State of Alaska controls the active and abandoned mining leases and the moose range located in the Jonesville Area,
- WHEREAS: the Jonesville Area has a history of intended public use by the State of Alaska Department of Natural Resources,
- WHEREAS: it has been determined that The State of Alaska, Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has spent approximately [nine] million dollars of Federal Reclamation Funds to alter the Jonesville Area's abandoned and active coal leases to a recreational state of condition prior to 2013,
- WHEREAS: the DNR chose not to establish a management plan for the safety of the public when designing and implementing their public use area,
- WHEREAS: realizing the State's obvious disregard for: public safety, air, land and water contamination, and the inhabitants of the Sutton community; the community of Sutton provided its own resources and funds to clean and monitor the Jonesville Area without jurisdiction,
- WHEREAS: multiple four wheeler accidents, an accidental shooting death and other multiple near miss shooting incidents has occurred in the area since 2013,
- WHEREAS: local homes have been damaged by stray bullets since 2013,
- WHEREAS: the general public has contaminated Slipper Lake by throwing community provided "porta-potties" into Slipper Lake,
- WHEREAS: hundreds of tent campers, motorhomes and camping trailers have congregated on weekends during the summer months to the area,
- WHEREAS: thousands of visitors to the area have no public restrooms to "relieve" themselves creating unsanitary conditions in the surrounding landscape,
- WHEREAS: upwards of 20 truck and trailer loads of garbage and contaminants are picked up from the grounds in the area and taken to the local transfer station by community volunteers each year,

WHEREAS: signage has not been placed to designate public use activities including shooting and off-road recreational vehicles; the State will not provide signs without a management plan in place,

WHEREAS: a management plan and agreement can only be put in place after the area has been declared a Public Use Area by State legislation,

WHEREAS: legislation would allow a management plan which would protect the homes and property of local citizens in Sutton, reduce all-terrain vehicle accidents, provide needed public safety for recreational shooting, mitigate illegal dumping and generally provide a healthier, cleaner and safer environment for public multiple use activities.

WHEREAS: The Jonesville/Slipper Lake Action Committee and other stakeholders has reviewed the history and determined a course of action needs to be taken for the benefit of the community of Sutton and the safety of the general public,

WHEREAS: THE SUTTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL COMES now forward and recommends and supports a Senate and House Bill to designate the Jonesville Area the Jonesville Public Use Area.

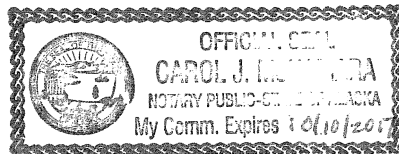

Retake the 'coal hills': Sutton wants its playground back from shooters and garbage piles

SUTTON — Residents here say uncontrolled target shooting and trash piles have chased them from their favorite recreation areas behind town, and now they want the rowdies gone — but they're not getting help from Alaska State Troopers.

They are looking to reclaim the rough camping areas on the "coal hills" off Jonesville Mine Road and the shores of Slipper Lake.

"There is no safe place around that lake, anywhere," said Martin Johnson, who has lived in the area since 1957. "It's just a constant war all weekend."

Johnson was one of dozens of area residents who attended a town hall meeting Wednesday at Sutton Elementary School. They complained of scary shooting, wild four-wheeling and garbage but said troopers rarely patrol the area and often don't respond to calls for help.

Rep. Jim Colver, a Republican from Palmer facing a primary election challenge in August from a Sutton conservative George Rauscher, convened the meeting and brought two of Alaska's top cops: Public Safety Commissioner Walt Monegan and Col. James Cockrell, head of the Alaska State Troopers. About 50 people attended.

Budget-bound troopers say they don't have the manpower to send regular patrols up Jonesville Mine Road. Capt. Hans Brinke, the supervisor of Mat-Su trooper posts, said 36 troopers working three shifts cover an area the size of West Virginia.

"If I can get my guys up there, I'm going to try my best," he said.

Most campers are domestic locals say. But a few trash the place and sneak through the night. It's gotten so bad many community members say they are afraid to visit on summer weekends.

Gilfe Barker and a friend were talking last summer when they said, bullets started flying by their heads as they ducked and yelled, hemmed in by heavy brush.

Barker, a Chickaloon-based avalanche forecaster, said at the community meeting she believed someone on an adjacent four-wheeler trail was firing blindly.

"I'm not sure I feel comfortable going back up there again, which is unfortunate because it's one of the most incredible places around and everyone here knows that," she said. "We feel really lucky we weren't injured or killed that day. I hope no one else has to experience that."

A recent death added urgency to the conversation. An Anchorage resident, 30-year-old Adam C. Malaby, was shot and killed last month while taking video of people he knew who were firing guns near the road, according to Col. Cockrell.

Along with talk of increasing enforcement, there's also a local effort supported by the Sutton Community Council to establish a new public-use area for Jonesville similar to that adopted by the state for the Knik River.

The public-use area campaign is led by Rauscher, Colver's opponent in August's Republican primary. Rauscher, a remodeler, is chair of the Jonesville/Slipper Lake Action Committee. The group hopes to have a bill ready in November as a vehicle for the Legislature to create the public-use area.

The state improved campsites along the lake in 2009 and 2012 but didn't have a plan to manage growing pressure from Anchorage and Matanuska-Susitna Borough residents, according to the public-use-area campaign.

Along with working with local and state officials on the planning process, Rauscher urged locals themselves to tell people not to shoot in undesignated areas.

"We can all be a part of policing the area ourselves," he said.

Monegan urged residents to call every time they see illegal activity, such as shooting and people or at homes. Troopers say they aren't getting many calls from the area.

"Even if you get no response, we log your call," Monegan said. "The more we hear, the more it builds up. When you actually go apathetic — well, they're not going to come so far not going to call — we won't know. Don't give up on us. Call."

Community demands for a formal shooting range got nearly universal support. But developing a shooting range is a complicated process, said Clark Cox, the Alaska Department of Natural Resources' regional manager. Residents need to agree on its location and hours, Cox said.

Colver said any public-use-area legislation is "no sure thing" and noted the bill comes with a \$200,000 price tag. It will be a challenge to pass given the state's grim financial situation, he said.

"If that's the direction we're going, it's just going to take push, hard work and tenacity," Colver said.
