Dear Members of the House Judiciary and House State Affairs Committees,

My name is Jacqueline Muehlbauer and I am a resident of Fairbanks. I am writing to express concern about the State of Alaska’s decision to provide voter data to the U.S. Department of Justice, including information that is considered confidential under state law.

Alaskans expect that when they register to vote, their personal information will be handled carefully and in accordance with the protections established in state law. The disclosure of sensitive data such as dates of birth, partial Social Security numbers, and driver’s license information raises serious concerns about privacy, transparency, and the security of our voter information.

I am also troubled by the agreement that the state would remove voters identified by the DOJ as “ineligible” within 45 days. Decisions about Alaska’s voter rolls should be made transparently and in accordance with Alaska law, with appropriate oversight and due process. These decisions should not be delegated to federal authorities without clear safeguards and public accountability.

Alaska has a strong tradition of protecting the integrity of our elections while also protecting the rights and privacy of voters. I respectfully urge the Legislature to fully review this agreement, ensure that confidential voter information is properly protected, and clarify the legal authority under which this data was shared.

Dear Senate Affairs and Judiciary Legislators,
I am re-sending you the email I sent to both committees on February 16 regarding the Division of Election's handing over of our Personally Identifiable Information (PII) to the U.S. Department of Justice and also the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) by the Lt. Governor. While that message sent earlier expresses my concerns I feel the need to reiterate.

As the two weeks have gone on and more information is gleaned and the actual MOU has been publicized by Representative Zack Fields I grow more weary and outraged by this action by our State's Division of Elections, an agency I have worked (and do currently) both seasonally and annually, in various positions, for Republican and Democratic administrations since the mid 1980's.

This breach violates the privacy laws of our Alaska Constitution, the U.S. Constitution in Article 1, and I have since learned the Privacy Act of 1974. Our state administration should have known the severity of handing over our voter rolls in full, and the legal and security challenges of doing so. That does not instill trust in our state government. What are the options for monitoring and protecting out PII going forward? What are safeguards that voters will properly show up on precinct registers for our primary a bit over 5 months away? Will voters be notified if they have been removed? What and how quickly can expunged voters correct incorrect removal? There are many questions.

In addition, the mishandling and misinformation of some DOJ cases, the lack of accountability and transparency, plus their disregard for certain uncomfortable laws do not give me pause on how safe our PII is going forward. Between being poorly safeguarded or what might be shared between agencies for other than stated reasons, it's all very concerning. It was only a year ago that U.S. agencies under DOGE exposed PII, with sloppy cybersecurity, As I previously stated what is the criteria for expunging voters?

Alaskans need answers and we are out here paying attention.

Dear Legislators,

To say I am disturbed by the recent Alaska voter roll breach from Alaska's elected and appointed officials is an understatement. Turning over private voter information and signing a binding agreement at the Division of Elections to the US Department of Justice looks like an unconstitutional sharing from the states who are responsible for the rules, laws, and governing of elections overall. This is clearly in our US Constitution. The proper response was the response in August 2025 for the Director of Elections to submit PUBLICLY available voter information.

It's hard to concentrate on any meaningful legislation that will benefit all Alaskans in this legislative session when elected and appointed officials are selling off our personal, private information under the guise of cleaning up the voter rolls. I ask how this effects our elections with our primary a bit over 5 months away. Who gets to make the decision on who is expunged? What standard and source are they basing decisions on? What other agencies and individuals will have access to our private information?

We already know that the former DOGE construct crossed agencies with our information and in an unsafe (cybersecurity) manner. As a 35+ year election worker through administrations and with officials of both parties, and currently administrating elections annually as a chairperson at a precinct for the last 10 years, I am trained annually and familiar with how safe our Alaskan elections are. Alaska has had a few changes on how to clean up and voter roll expunges over the years, but this is the chore of the State Division of Elections and not the federal government.

What is the current legislature is doing about this? I'd like to know who in the Alaskan Department of law signed off on this reinterpreting the US Constitution. Action on this breach can not wait until the primary. I hate to think of the people standing in front of me to sign a register to vote and having to be told they have to fill out a question ballot as they are not, or no longer on the register.

I sent a POM to some of you on this issue, but felt constrained by the 50 word limit, and also wanted to address the specific committees who deal with elections.

To the Alaskan House State Affairs Committee and Alaskan House Judiciary Committee:

I was angry to hear that the Lieutenant Governor took it upon herself to violate Alaskans' state constitutional right to privacy by sending our personal information to the federal government. I am writing to express serious concern regarding the Lieutenant Governor's decision to provide Alaska citizens' voting information to the federal government.

Article I, Section 4 of the United States Constitution makes clear that the states, not the federal government, have primary authority over the administration of elections. Likewise, the Alaska State Constitution protects the fundamental right to vote and places responsibility for election administration within our state. The transfer of voter data to federal authorities raises significant constitutional concerns and risks undermining public confidence in our election system.

A recent federal court decision in California addressed a similar issue. In that case, the judge wrote that the action "threatens the right to vote which is the cornerstone of American democracy." The court further stated:

"The Department of Justice seeks to use civil rights legislation which was enacted for an entirely different purpose to amass and retain an unprecedented amount of confidential voter data. The centralization of this information by the federal government would have a chilling effect on voter registration which would inevitably lead to decreasing voter turnout as voters fear that their information is being used for some inappropriate or unlawful purpose."

I share these concerns. Centralizing confidential voter data at the federal level risks chilling voter participation and eroding trust in our democratic process.

I respectfully request that you investigate this matter, clarify the legal authority relied upon, and take appropriate action to ensure that Alaska voters' constitutional rights and personal information are fully protected.

Dear Legislators:

I was alarmed when I first read about Nancy Dahlstrom sending off Alaskans' voter information when the Trump administration sent a demand for the voter rolls of individual states. I wrote in protest about this. Voter information is strictly governed by the states, and the Federal government has no right to it. To have given this up so easily to the feds when we know there is an active effort to interfere with the mid-term elections is a blatant betrayal of all Alaskans. It is a violation of our privacy!

The Trump administration is desperate to control all the states' election information. In view of Governor's hype about federal government overreach, it is shocking to see how easily he turned over all our personal data to the Trump regime without consulting Alaskans.

I want the Legislature to demand our information not be used by the federal government. If there is any sort of agreement with the feds to let them use this information, on behalf of the privacy of all Alaskans, demand that the agreement be nullified. The feds could have accessed the public lists of Alaskan voters without giving them the official state voter rolls that has all our personal information. They are publicly available.

Most states have protected their voters' information by refusing to cooperate in this overreaching request. What is even more egregious about this underhanded capitulation to the Trump administration is that it then requires the state within 45 days to purge so-called "ineligible voters" from the list and then the list is to be submitted again to the Department of Justice to approve it! Who gave the right to the feds to control our voter list!! This is outrageous and must be rectified. They do not know the nuances of eligibility here in Alaska, especially for our Native populations. Pure and simple—this is a violation of our state's rights and an effort to interfere in Alaska's election process.

I respectfully request and demand that the Legislature investigate this egregious violation of our sensitive voter information, refuse to purge our voter rolls based on any request from the Federal government, and require that the state insist that that information not go into the

federal database. I believe this action, despite the A.G. Cox's review that this was legal, may well not be legal. There are other regulations governing what is done with voter rolls that would make the 45-day requirement illegal. It may also run afoul of the "National Voter Registration Act."

Please investigate this very serious breach of our voter information and potential method for many Alaskans to be disenfranchised if the State follows the instructions of the Feds. This should never have been agreed to without Legislative oversight and a vote of the people. It is our information and our votes that are in jeopardy-so please act on this to rescind this ill-advised action by the Governor and his Lt. Governor.
