Sponsor Statement for HB 14

Although housed in Division of Healthcare Services, the Division of Public Assistance (DPA) is responsible for administering the Catastrophic Illness and Chronic or Acute Medical Conditions program. In FY21, FY22, and FY23, the DPA has collectively processed thousands of applications and only two qualifying applicants that did receive assistance within the year of 2021.

The program began in 1986. Recipients were mainly those too young for Medicare and with incomes too high to qualify for Medicaid. Those who were either not covered by health insurance or whose insurance was inadequate to brace a catastrophic illness event without endangering their financial resources, subsistence and essential assets. Due to the expansion of Medicaid under the Affordable Care Act put into effect within Alaska in late 2015, the increase in coverage for Medicaid recipients grew nearly 145,000 people. Since that time, the number of qualifying recipients has dramatically declined to the numbers we see today. However, as a statutory program, the division must administer it, which is costing the state over \$150,000 a year and countless hours of administrative work that could otherwise be spent on other such programs.

As a statutory program, the division was administering CAMA program until FY 24 costing the state over \$150,000 a year. Funding for the program was discontinued in the FY25 budget and remains unfunded in the FY26 budget. The division had also provided countless hours of administrative work that would alternatively have been used to process applications for more utilized programs within their division such as Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) to prevent backlogs in assistance funding. The Catastrophic Illness and Chronic or Acute Medical Conditions program has since become obsolete and House Bill 14 aims repeal the program from state statute.

Analysis

Since the implementation of the Medicaid Expansion Group in 2015, most individuals now qualify for Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI) Medicaid, eliminating the need for the Chronic and Acute Medical Assistance (CAMA) program. Currently, no one is using the service, as its only eligible population—legal immigrants who do not meet the five-year residency requirement for Medicaid—can access alternative options through the federally facilitated marketplace. The Division can integrate the regulatory repeal of CAMA into regular updates with minimal impact on public assistance field services.

Thank you for your inquiry regarding the Chronic and Acute Medical Assistance (CAMA) and General Relief (GR) program.

How many applications for general relief (rent and utility assistance) were submitted in FY21, FY22, and FY23? (Just submitted applications)

The below reflects all General Relief (GR) Assistance Initial Applications, including Rental, Utility, Food, Miscellaneous, and Burial. The Department is unable to distinguish applications by category of GR.

- FY21 - 11,904
- FY22 - 6,564
- FY23 - 6,226

In FY22 there were 109 rental payments and 69 utility payments based on data from the Department of Health (DOH). How many payments per household does this equate to? (Example 1 family = 12 utility payments and 12 rental payments)

General Relief is determined on a month-by-month basis, in as such an individual / household will need to reapply for assistance each month. i.e. once a household receives rental assistance in one month, it is not automatic for subsequent months.

How many people receive GR medical assistance?

Presently there are no recipients.

What is the department's interpretation of discretionary assistance as defined in AS 47.25.252? Did DPA make any distributions under this statute? If so, what was the amount?

The division does not pay any discretionary GR benefits. If the individual is not eligible for GR based on the policy outlined in the manual, the application is denied.

How many applications for CAMA were submitted in FY21, FY22, and FY23? How many were approved?



Component Budget Summary

Component: Catastrophic and Chronic Illness Assistance (AS 47.08)

Contribution to Department's Mission

Enable eligible Alaskans to manage their chronic medical illnesses and conditions.

The Catastrophic and Chronic Illness Assistance is a state-funded program for low-income Alaskans who have inadequate or no health insurance, but who do not qualify for Medicaid. Catastrophic and Chronic Illness Assistance provides limited services to eligible individuals only if diagnosed with one of the following conditions:

- Terminal illness
- Cancer requiring chemotherapy
- Chronic diabetes or diabetes insipidus
- Chronic seizure disorder
- Chronic mental illness
- Chronic hypertension

Covered services for those who qualify for Catastrophic and Chronic Illness Assistance are limited to:

- Medical services provided by a physician, advanced nurse practitioner, and physician assistant in the practitioner's office or an outpatient clinic
- Outpatient hospital services limited to chemotherapy and radiology for the treatment of cancer
- Three (3) prescriptions per month and medical supplies limited to a 30-day supply

Core Services

- Provide payment for Catastrophic and Chronic Illness Assistance services.

Major Component Accomplishments in 2023

The Catastrophic and Chronic Illness Assistance program experienced the anticipated 100 percent decrease in number of enrolled recipients from FY2016 to FY2021 due to Medicaid expansion, from 704 to 0, and the decrease in expenditures, from \$450.1 in FY2016 to \$0.0 in FY2023.

Key Component Challenges

- Catastrophic and Chronic Illness Assistance provides no coverage for inpatient hospitalization, transportation, and other services that are mandatory under Medicaid coverage.
- Challenges that previously existed with the Catastrophic and Chronic Illness Assistance program are mitigated by the expansion of Medicaid. Except for qualified immigrants who have not yet met the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act (PRWORA) of 1996 five-year waiting period for Medicaid eligibility, most individuals who qualified for the program now qualify for full coverage under Medicaid expansion.
