STATE OF ALASKA 2025 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Analysis

This bill expands the definition of theft in the second degree to include the theft of mail or an article within mail. The bill establishes that theft of mail obtained through fraud or taken from a post office, mail receptacle, authorized depository, or mail carrier qualifies as a second degree theft offense. Additionally, the bill criminalizes the receipt, retention, concealment, or disposal of stolen mail with knowledge that it was stolen.		
The fiscal impact on the Department of Public Safety is expected to be zero. The bill does not create new enforcement requirements beyond existing theft statutes, and any increase in case volume is expected to be absorbed within current resources.		

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
