



Reductions Since 2019

- Closed Four Schools
- Class Sizes Have Increased
- Special Education Positions
- Extended Learning Program
- Supply & Activity Budgets Cut in Half
- Elementary Band & Orchestra
- Elementary Art
- Activity Funds
- Print Shop
- More than 250 jobs
- 20% reduction in administration

FY26 Budget Forecast

Preliminary Deficit - **\$31 million** -15% general fund budget

If \$680 increase is repeated - **\$16 million** - 8% general fund budget

- Revenue Outlook
 - State \$4 million decrease (assuming 680 repeat)
 - Assuming repeat of FY25 one-time funding
 - Local Status quo
 - Federal \$625,000 decrease

FY26 Budget Impact

Projected FY26 Deficit	\$16 million
Contracting Custodians	\$3 million
School Consolidation	\$7 million
Remaining FY26 Deficit:	\$6.0 million

Subsidized Programs

Transportation

State Funding has not increased since 2015 and no longer covers the full cost of our transportation services. The District is forced to subsidize transportation services with general fund dollars that are intended for the classroom.

Nutrition Services

\$700,000 required from district general fund annually to subsidize food program

\$1,400 BSA Increase

- Break even point for FY 25 deficit
 - Ensures no class size increases
 - Reads Act tutoring
 - Address growing liabilities in technology, curriculum, & transportation

Allows for reinvestment back into the classroom

Measuring Success Through Student Growth

- Student Growth as a Key Measure: Emphasize growth instead of only test scores to holistically evaluate success in education.
- Shared Accountability: Collaboration between districts and the state is essential for defining and achieving clear goals.
- **Importance of Funding**: Adequate resources enable smaller class sizes, intervention programs, and adequate resources to achieve goals.
- Holistic Support: Recognize diverse student needs and provide timely support, including initiatives like the Alaska Reads Act.
