**A RESOLUTION**

**1 Encouraging the United States Congress to award the Hmong veterans of the Vietnam**  
**2 War the Congressional Gold Medal.**

**3 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:**

**4 WHEREAS**, beginning in 1960, the United States Central Intelligence Agency  
**5** recruited thousands of Hmong people to fight against the Communist Pathet Lao and North  
**6** Vietnamese Army regulars in Laos; and

**7 WHEREAS**, in July 1961, Brigadier General Edward G. Lansdale wrote in a memo to  
**8** General Maxwell D. Taylor that about 9,000 Hmong tribesmen had been equipped for guerilla  
**9** operations and these operations were being conducted with considerable effectiveness in  
**10** Communist-dominated territory in Laos; and

**11 WHEREAS** as many as 100,000 Hmong soldiers were recruited and trained as  
**12** Special Guerrilla Units to engage the North Vietnamese Army; and

**13 WHEREAS** the United States relied heavily on the Hmong Special Guerrilla Units,  
**14** although outnumbered by enemy forces, to intercept and prevent the flow of troops and war  
**15** supplies along the Ho Chi Minh Trail; and

**16 WHEREAS** the Hmong soldiers conducted tactical guerilla actions, flew thousands

1 of deadly combat missions in support of the United States Armed Forces and the United  
2 States Central Intelligence Agency, and fought in conventional and guerilla combat with an  
3 extremely high number of casualties; and

4 **WHEREAS** the Hmong soldiers protected United States personnel, guarded United  
5 States Air Force radar installations, gathered critical intelligence about enemy operations, and  
6 undertook rescue missions to save the lives of downed United States pilots; and

7 **WHEREAS** approximately 40,000 Hmong soldiers lost their lives defending  
8 democracy, approximately 50,000 Hmong soldiers were seriously injured and disabled, and  
9 approximately 3,000 Hmong soldiers were missing in action; and

10 **WHEREAS** Hmong soldiers died at 10 times the rate of United States soldiers in the  
11 Vietnam War; and

12 **WHEREAS**, because the war effort of the United States in Laos was covert, the  
13 accounts of the sacrifices and service of the Hmong soldiers remain largely unknown; and

14 **WHEREAS** many Hmong soldiers became refugees because the United States  
15 government encouraged them to fight for the United States, and, as a result, thousands of  
16 family members of Hmong soldiers were evacuated to a United States air base in Thailand to  
17 avoid bloody vengeance by the communists in Laos and Vietnam; and

18 **WHEREAS**, after the conclusion of the Vietnam War, thousands of Hmong soldiers  
19 suffered acts of retribution and atrocities by the Pathet Lao and North Vietnamese Army,  
20 causing hundreds of thousands of Hmong refugees to flee to neighboring Thailand; and

21 **WHEREAS** approximately 50,000 Hmong veterans reside in the United States, and  
22 approximately 150,000 Hmong and Lao-born children have graduated from schools in this  
23 country; and

24 **WHEREAS** the Hmong warriors were promised that they would be treated just like  
25 other United States veterans;

26 **BE IT RESOLVED** that the Alaska State Legislature encourages the United States  
27 Congress to award the Hmong veterans of the Vietnam War the Congressional Gold Medal.

3 Collins, United States Secretary of Veterans Affairs; and the Honorable Lisa Murkowski and  
4 the Honorable Dan Sullivan, U.S. Senators, and the Honorable Nicholas Begich, U.S.  
5 Representative, members of the Alaska delegation in Congress; and all other members of the  
6 119th United States Congress.
