FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA 2025 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Analysis

	This bill would impose requirements on manufactures of digital products to provide tools, software, security bypasses, and documents to allow consumers and independent service providers to repair and maintain digital devices. The definition of "digital product" is broad, and encompasses any product that depends on a digital device to function, though, notably, motor vehicles are excepted. Violations of this act would fall under the Unfair Trade Practices Act (UTPA). The UTPA is enforced by the Department of Law, but private parties also effect the requirements of the Act by bringing actions for treble damages where they have been harmed by a violation. The Department of Law's decisions to bring UTPA actions are discretionary and the Department anticipates that it will be able to implement this bill within existing resources.
