FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA
2024 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

BILL NO. HB 107

Analysis

This legislation amends the definition of “person” in Title 11 (criminal code) to be “a natural person or an entity that has the moral right of self-determination and, when appropriate, an organization, government, or governmental instrumentality.” In addition, the legislation adds a definition of “life”, which is not currently defined, to the criminal code. Under the bill, “life” means “the property or quality that distinguishes a living organism from a dead organism or inanimate matter and that is manifested in the function of a metabolism, growth, reproduction, a response to stimuli, or adaptation to the environment, each of which originates within the organism.” These definitions are broad and would apply any time the word “person” or “life” are used in Title 11.

Additionally, there are statutes that would be left in place which appear to conflict with the stated intent of the legislation. For example, AS 11.41.150 is the crime of murder of an unborn child and AS 11.41.140 contains a definition of “person” which applies to the homicide statutes. It is unclear how these statutes should be read in conjunction with the new definitions in the bill.

To the extent that this legislation touches on the right of privacy as specified in the Alaska Constitution, there would likely be litigation surrounding how the legislation is applied if it were to become law.

For the above reasons the Department of Law anticipates that this legislation will be the subject of significant litigation surrounding language interpretation and how the legislation is applied. It is difficult to estimate the fiscal impact of such litigation and, therefore, the department submits an indeterminate fiscal note.
