


HB 238: Criminal Mischief in the Third Degree

Institutional Vandalism

- Intentional defacement, damage, or desecration of a building of worship.
- 42 states and D.C. make this a distinct crime from property damage.
- US Department of Justice and FBI report an increase in recent years of crimes to property motivated by religious bias.

Why Do We Need This Bill?

- Vandalism to a place of worship is currently treated as a typical property crime.
- National and global events have a lead to an increase in these types of crimes, both nationally and locally.
- In 2022 (most recent data), crimes against property and religion as a bias motivating factor accounted for 80% of all hate crimes.*

Hate Crime Incidents in 2022 (Alaska)

What Does HB 238 Do?

1. Elevates any intentional vandalism to a religious institution to a C Felony.
2. Exempts authorized intentional damage by an employee of the institution.
3. Provides for an immediate effective date.

This ensures that no matter the value of property damaged, vandalism of a place of worship is treated the same:

- There is no dollar value that can be placed on psychological and/or spiritual harm.
- The bill's language will house places of worship and places of burial in Criminal Mischief in the Third Degree.
