Dear Speaker-Elect Edgmon:

Under the authority of Article III, Section 18 of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill establishing a pilot program for demonstration state-tribal education compact (STEC) schools. Senate Bill 34 (2022) directed the Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) to negotiate a demonstration state-tribal education compact with federally recognized tribes and tribal organizations and to submit a report to the legislature relating to the demonstration state-tribal education compact schools. On January 31, 2024, DEED submitted its *State Tribal Education Compact Schools Demonstration Legislative Report*, based on its negotiations with five federally recognized tribes or tribal organizations that applied to participate: Central Council of the Tlingit & Haida Indian Tribes of Alaska, the Inupiat Community of the Arctic Slope, the Ketchikan Indian Community, the Knik Tribe, and the King Island Native Community in partnership with the Village of Solomon.

This bill takes the next step in launching STEC schools in Alaska by setting up a five-year pilot program for the five participating tribes and tribal organizations to enter into education compacts with DEED for the establishment of tribally operated Alaska public schools. The bill designates mandatory subjects that must be addressed in each compact but allows DEED and the participating tribes and tribal organizations to negotiate the details of each mandatory provision based on their individual needs and circumstances.

Demonstration STEC schools may be funded by the legislature as if they were schools in a regional education attendance area. Participating tribes and tribal organizations must report on student data and enrollment at their demonstration STEC schools to DEED on an annual basis and DEED will provide that information to the legislature in its annual progress reports. At the completion of the pilot program, DEED will provide a written report to the legislature summarizing the student data over the entire project period.

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HB 59 – State-Tribal Education Compacts

Sectional Analysis Version 33-GH1518\A

"An Act relating to demonstration state-tribal education compacts; relating to demonstration state-tribal education compact schools; and providing for an effective date."

Section 1: Amends uncodified law by adding a new section outlining legislative intent. The section indicates that the intent is to have the legislature re-evaluate the establishment of demonstration state-tribal education compacts (STEC) outlined in this act in seven years.

Section 2: Amends uncodified law by adding a new section outlining the authorization of STEC compacts. Subsection (a) grants the Commissioner authority to negotiate and execute compacts with the federally recognized Tribes in Alaska that participated in negotiation under the authority of ch. 43, SLA2022.

Subsection (b) outlines the required components of a demonstration state-tribal education compact. Each participating tribe must follow a template that contains similar or equivalent terms outlined in the required 11 provisions.

Subsection (c) states a demonstration state-tribal education compact must be in effect by June 30, 2028.

Subsection (d) defines "participating tribe" as a federal recognized tribe and tribal organization that participated in negotiations under sec.1, ch. 43, SLA 2022.

Section 3: Amends uncodified law by adding a new section outlining the operation of STEC schools. Subsection (a) requires that a STEC school must operate in accordance with the terms of the compact executed in sec. 2.

Subsection (b) states that a STEC school is exempt from all state statutes and regulations applicable to school boards except for statutes and regulation made applicable in sec. 2 of this Act, or in legislation enacted or regulations adopted after the effective date.

Subsection (c) outlines provisions to the operation and management of a STEC school as if the school were a district. This subsection outlines the requirements relating to school operations (1)

that include parental rights, compulsory attendance, the school term, day in session and school holidays; literacy and early reading information; miscellaneous provisions applicable to school district operations; transportation of students; requirements for annual fiscal audit; authorizing cooperation with other school districts; prohibiting discrimination based on sex in public education; school safety and discipline; regulations adopted by the state board of education and early development to implement this paragraph that are applicable to school districts and their schools. Additional requirements (2) include state aid to public schools including special needs, vocational and technical instruction, and intensive services; and procedures for payment of public-school funding an imposing general requirements and limits on money paid. Requirements relating to teacher employment and retirement (3) include sick leave; teacher certification; employment and retention of teachers; the teachers' retirement system; and authorizing collective bargaining by certified employees. Finally, it outlines requirement for students and education programs (4) that include educational services for children with disabilities; sexual abuse and sexual assault awareness and prevention; establishing health education program standards, and bilingual-bicultural education.

Subsection (d) allows the state board of education and early development to, upon request of the STEC school (1) waive requirements of AS 14.20.020(b) or 14.20.022(b) allowing an individual with specialized knowledge the tribe feels relevant in order to obtain a teacher certificate or subject-matter expert limited teacher-certification; and (2) the department may issue a teacher certificate to a person qualified under AS 14.20.020(b) or 14.20.022(b) Certificates issued in the section do not require a request from the school board of the district or regional educational attendance area in which the STEC school is located.

Subsection (e) outlines that a STEC school may not engage in secular activities, charge tuition, or restrict enrollment.

Subsection (f) requires STEC schools have a physical location only in school districts where the board of the department has consulted with under sec. 1(c), ch. 43, SLA 2022 unless the STEC school is a correspondence school.

Subsection (g) requires that the STEC act as the "employer" for teachers in the school for the purposes of participation in the teachers' retirement system and that a teacher employed by the STEC school is a member of the plan.

Subsection (h) designates the federally recognized tribe or tribal organization under this act as a "school district" and the STEC as a "public school" for the purpose of providing an appropriate public education for each child with a disability. As such, a "governing board" or "school board" is established by the tribe or tribal organization.

Section 4: Amends uncodified law by adding a new section for facilities. Facilities of a STEC must conform to applicable laws concerning public access, health, safety, and fire code.

Section 5: Amends uncodified law by adding a new section regarding funding. The legislature may appropriate funds to a STEC in the same manner as a regional educational attendance area. This includes state aid and grant funding. For the purposes of federal aid, a STEC school is known as a local education agency.

Section 6: Amends uncodified law by adding a new section regarding reporting. Each STEC school shall report to the commissioner data required for all federal and state funding sources including attendance, assessment data, and all data reported in the state and federal report cards to the public as well as the Annual Report to the Legislature.

Section 7: Authorizes the department and the board of education to adopt implementing regulations.

Section 8: Sunsets the authorization of the demonstration STEC program on July 1, 2036.

Section 9: Provides for an immediate effective date.

Analysis

This bill establishes demonstration state-tribal education compacts and authorizes the commissioner of the Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) to enter into compacts with participating Tribes for a period of five years. The compacts must take effect on or before June 30, 2028.
A demonstration state-tribal education compact school, also referred to as a Tribally Compacted Public Schools (TCPS), must operate in accordance with the terms of its compact. Through this bill, Tribes would have the opportunity to function like a local educational agency, granting them greater flexibility and authority over curriculum design, teacher certification, hiring practices, school calendars, and community engagement.
Pupil transportation grants under AS 14.09 would be based on a per-pupil amount by district. There is no projected change based on this bill, as any grant to a TCPS is anticipated to be offset directly by a decrease in grant funds to the associated district due to a potential transfer of students.
The funding mechanism is a general fund transfer to the Public Education Fund (PEF). The fiscal note effect for FY2026 through FY2031 is reported in the fiscal note for the PEF, as the funding is deposited to the PEF, not into the Pupil Transportation funding component. The above analysis is presented here for explanation purposes only.

Analysis

This bill establishes demonstration state-tribal education compacts and authorizes the commissioner of the Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) to enter into compacts with participating Tribes for a period of five years. The compacts must take effect on or before June 30, 2028.

A demonstration state-tribal education compact school, also referred to as a Tribally Compacted Public Schools (TCPS), must operate in accordance with the terms of its compact. Through this bill, Tribes would have the opportunity to function like a local educational agency, granting them greater flexibility and authority over curriculum design, teacher certification, hiring practices, school calendars, and community engagement.

A TCPS would be funded based on the foundation formula under AS 14.17.410, using the same student count period, formula multipliers, and considerations as a regional educational attendance area school district that does not have a local contribution. Since a TCPS do not have an identified district cost factor, the district cost factor of the associated district for the TCPS' community would be used.

Five tribes are interested in participating in a pilot program. The projected average daily membership (ADM) is based on applications submitted to the DEED during the negotiation process with Tribal partners for the development of a demonstration state-tribal education compact to establish demonstration state-tribal education compact schools as required under SB 34 (Chapter 43, SLA2022).

Central Council of the Tlingit & Haida Indian Tribes of Alaska- Juneau School District - projected 100 ADM Ketchikan Indian Community - Ketchikan Gateway Borough School District - projected 200 ADM King Island Native Community and Village of Solomon - Nome Public Schools - projected 120 ADM Knik Tribe - Mat-Su Borough School District - projected 300 ADM and 300 correspondence ADM Qargi Academy - North Slope Borough School District - projected 100 ADM

In addition to the foundation formula funding, to start the initial pilot of the TCPS, Tribes would need to have start-up funds. A TCPS would receive a one-time start-up grant the first year the school operates in the amount of 45 percent of the base student allocation (BSA) for the initial year of the TCPS' adjusted average daily membership (AADM). The BSA for FY2026 is \$5.960.

Pupil transportation grants under AS 14.09 would be based on a per-pupil amount by district. There is no projected change based on this bill, as any grant to a TCPS is anticipated to be offset directly by a decrease in grant funds to the associated district due to a potential transfer of students.

Due to the indeterminate effects of potential ADM reductions across the individual school size adjustment factors and hold harmless provision, the fiscal impact to an associated school district cannot be determined and is not reflected in this fiscal note. In addition, the actual foundation formula funding for each TCPS will not be known until after the student count period in October 2026.

This fiscal note includes the one-time (FY2026) start up grants estimated to be \$5,408.9 and the projected foundation formula funding under AS 14.17 estimated to be \$12,051.9, for a total estimated cost in FY2026 of \$17,460.8. In addition, a one-time cost of \$6.0 is needed for legal fees to implement the necessary regulation changes.

Attached to this fiscal note is a breakdown of the increase in funding by TCPS.

This bill takes effect immediately under AS 01.10.070(c).

Analysis

This bill establishes demonstration state-tribal education compacts and authorizes the commissioner of the Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) to enter into compacts with participating Tribes for a period of five years. The compacts must take effect on or before June 30, 2028.

A demonstration state-tribal education compact school, also referred to as a Tribally Compacted Public Schools (TCPS), must operate in accordance with the terms of its compact. Through this bill, Tribes would have the opportunity to function like a local educational agency, granting them greater flexibility and authority over curriculum design, teacher certification, hiring practices, school calendars, and community engagement.

A TCPS would be funded based on the foundation formula under AS 14.17.410, using the same student count period, formula multipliers, and considerations as a regional educational attendance area school district that does not have a local contribution. Since a TCPS do not have an identified district cost factor, the district cost factor of the associated district for the TCPS' community would be used.

Five tribes are interested in participating in a pilot program. The projected average daily membership (ADM) is based on applications submitted to the DEED during the negotiation process with Tribal partners for the development of a demonstration state-tribal education compact to establish demonstration state-tribal education compact schools as required under SB 34 (Chapter 43, SLA2022).

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In addition to the foundation formula funding, to start the initial pilot of the TCPS, Tribes would need to have start-up funds. A TCPS would receive a one-time start-up grant the first year the school operates in the amount of 45 percent of the base student allocation (BSA) for the initial year of the TCPS' adjusted average daily membership (AADM). The BSA for FY2026 is \$5,960.

Due to the indeterminate effects of potential ADM reductions across the individual school size adjustment factors and hold harmless provision, the fiscal impact to an associated school district cannot be determined and is not reflected in this fiscal note. In addition, the actual foundation formula funding for each TCPS will not be known until after the student count period in October 2026.

This fiscal note includes the one-time (FY2026) start up grants estimated to be \$5,408.9 and the projected foundation formula funding under AS 14.17 estimated to be \$12,051.9, for a total estimated cost in FY2026 of \$17,460.8.

Attached to the Public Education Fund (PEF) fiscal note is a breakdown of the increase in funding by TCPS.

This bill takes effect immediately under AS 01.10.070(c).

The funding mechanism is a general fund transfer to the Public Education Fund (PEF). The fiscal note effect for FY2026 through FY2031 is reported in the fiscal note for the PEF, as the funding is deposited to the PEF, not into the Foundation Program funding component. The above analysis is presented here for explanation purposes only.

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
