Dear Alaska Senate Resources Committee,

I am concerned about the Governor's legislative proposal SB 199/HB 282 that would allow widespread commercial development of Alaska's state-owned public lands. Our public lands provide outdoor recreation opportunities, hunting and fishing access, and supports the habitat that sustains our fish and wildlife populations. While I support a balanced approach to land management planning, SB 199/HB 282 goes too far and gives too much power to the DNR commissioner to reclassify lands for commercial development regardless of the implications.

Not every portion of state land is suitable for development especially when state land has already been set aside for recreation, the protection of fish and wildlife habitat or other designations to protect access and the public interest. Alaska's state-owned public lands are a resource that we all share. I urge you to vote no on SB 199/HB 282.

Dear Senate Resources Committee Members:

Thank you for this opportunity to comment on SB 199. My concerns lie with section 3, extending land disposal authority to the Department of Transportation. I encourage your committee to remove section 3 of SB 199 for the following reasons:

1. It will give unlimited authority to a single individual, the Commissioner of DOT, to dispose of public land if DNR does not act in 45 days. Section 3 spells out no process and places no restrictions on the DOT Commissioner when disposing of DOT lands. If passed as written, this bill creates the potential for misuse of a public resource.
2. Any responsible land disposal process should seek highest and best use of the resource. This requires a process that is transparent, that is fair and that is competitive. Most importantly, the process must include the public. Instead, section 3 grants sole authority to the DOT commissioner, a political appointee, and cuts out the public completely.
3. No maps or inventory of DOT lands appear to be available to determine what lands might be eligible for disposal now or in the near future. It's critical this information be made available to the public. Such a map might also be helpful to each of you as you review the content of this bill.
4. Extending land disposal duties to DOT could have a fiscal impact on the department if it must not only dispose of land but also create a new process for disposing of that land. This could require funding additional positions at a time when the governor strives to trim and streamline departments. Furthermore, the DOT commissioner has stated publicly that he has an inexperienced staff. Is this DOT staff up to the task of creating policy and implementing a new process that lies outside their current job description?
5. What's wrong with the current process for disposing of DOT lands? DOT builds roads. They are not land managers. DNR employs professional land managers. Let's leave state land disposal to the management professionals at DNR.

Please strike section 3 from SB 199 for the above reasons. Public land disposal must include public notice and public input, along with a fair and competitive process, which section 3 of this bill does not. Please continue to entrust land disposal to the professionals at DNR, as the current policy requires.

SB 199/HB282 is colonialism: to give away our assets without compensation, without benefiting Alaskans ever, without considering the future generations of us who were born here and desire to live here our entire lives is a violation of our human rights. I'm 36, and at Governor Dunleavy's rate of resource extraction gifts and human rights reductions if I'm lucky to be 80 I'll look out on Anchorage's Front Range and see mines all the way up the mountains.

For the sake of Alaska's future and the futures of children, I urge you to vote No on SB 199/HB 282.
