I am writing to you as a mother of 4, grandmother of 8, school psychologist and counselor, Christian educator, and spouse of a Lutheran pastor. My husband and I now live in Homer, but have lived in Alaska for nearly 48 years, including Ketchikan, Shishmaref, Anchorage, Nome, and Wasilla. We moved to Shishmaref in 1978 following a series of teen suicides. I saw the photos on the walls: young people in their coffins next to pictures of them as babies, toddlers and busy kids. Years later, in the Mat-Su Borough School District, I was part of the "Crisis Response Team". Evening calls from our Student Support Services director or a principal made my gut knot up. Sometimes accidents, but too often a student or parent suicide- almost always a gun. We sat vigil in homes, in school hallways with tearful or silent kids, I shared prayers with staff and my own children, and explored death and dying questions with children as young as Kindergarten. A principal and school nurse volunteered to mop up the splattered blood and brains. I could not. Some things you can't forget.

I love our state, but our gun violence statistics make me sad and angry! Lives cut short, their talents wasted. Families broken, families recovering, but never the same.

People of all ages suffer from depression. They don't know that depression is common, usually temporary, and treatable. Some deaths (like many school shootings) are caused by angry youth. Sometimes they've been bullied or harassed. Some have been abused. Some deaths happen when we leave lethal firearms in places where curious children can play with them. Young kids love to copy big people and use tools!

This year Alaska ranks #3 in gun suicide rates. We're 5th in overall firearm deaths (per capita) and firearms rank the 2nd leading cause of death for Alaskan children and teenagers (right behind poisoning). Alaska continues to be #1 for men murdering women (at 5X the national rate) with guns the weapon of choice in 44% of those murders. These stats should make all Alaskans feel depressed and maybe angry, **but...**

We have the opportunity to **SAVE MANY LIVES** by implementing these **2 interventions**:

- 1) Please support House Bill 89, introduced by Rep. Andy Josephson. It would enact an **Extreme Risk Protection Order** for Alaska. Extreme Risk Protection Orders protect suicidal, mentally ill, and potentially violent people (of all ages) from easy access to lethal guns by removing the weapon/s for a period of time. It is a **temporary** but effective way to prevent unnecessary death to self or others. This process is **time-restricted** and can be **appealed** before a judge. 21 States have put this intervention into law and are seeing **measurable reductions** in gun deaths.
- 2) **Secure Gun Storage** greatly reduces both accidental and impulsive shootings, especially among children and young people. Many suicides by teens (and sometimes adults) are spur-of-the-moment acts, frequently fueled by drugs or alcohol. Suicidal people do not think about how things could improve in the future. Putting **time between the thought and the act** is one way to reduce tragic deaths. Secure gun storage can buy time for help to reach the hurting person.

I invite you to learn more about these two very doable and affordable ways of reducing gun deaths in Alaska. Let's join the other 21 states and start turning our gun violence statistics **away from the worst** in the nation to a **future of hope** for ALL Alaskans!

Dear Rep. Himschoot,

I know you're having an incredibly busy week with HR 69! I hope you reach a good compromise that benefits all of Alaska's students and schools. Thank you so much for all your hard work tackling the flat funding issue. Maybe this will be the year that the Legislature will unite for the benefit of public education and future generations.

Tomorrow the House State Affairs Committee will hold a hearing on HB89, the Extreme Risk Protective Order (ERPO) bill. I wanted to send you a brief note saying that I, and many others, support this bill that allows the court to temporarily remove guns from a person showing warning signs that they are a threat to themselves or others. This "red flag" law can certainly help curb the firearm shootings that are one of the leading causes of death for children and teens. Nearly half of the states in the U.S. have red flag laws that help save lives.

Coupled with this, it would be wonderful if Alaska could adopt a safe gun storage law. If firearms are secured and stored properly, the risk of someone accidentally picking up a gun is eliminated. A few decades ago, Australia adopted a safe gun storage law for the entire country which has saved countless lives.

We know that the stricter the gun safety laws, the more lives are saved and there are fewer cases of guns falling into the wrong hands. Why not help make Alaska safer with less gun violence and fewer gun deaths?

I think about Kenneyon Baker, a 16 year old who was shot to death on the sidewalk in front of his house in Anchorage in October. There have been no arrests as yet, but you have to wonder was this another kid who got easy access to a gun? Or the young child in Sitka who got a hold of an AK-47 and fired rounds of bullets through a wall. Safe gun storage

should be promoted and there should be a mandate for storing guns safely when an individual purchases a gun.

Thank you to the members of the State Affairs Committee for holding a hearing this week on HB 89, a lifesaving Extreme Risk Protective Order bill.

Alaska has the third highest rate of suicides in the nation and the fifth highest rate of gun deaths overall, yet it is shocking that Alaska has none of the following laws that other states have to address gun violence:

NO background check law for privately sold firearms

NO concealed carry permit law

NO secure storage law

NO law to prohibit bump stocks

NO ghost gun regulations

NO high capacity magazine restrictions

NO law to require childproofing features on new gun models

NO law prohibiting guns on the grounds of this state capitol or at public rallies

and the list goes on and on. We must recognize that failing to regulate guns or gun ownership puts Alaskans at grave risk and gun restrictions are within constitutional bounds.

HB 89 is a **proactive**, **due process protected step** toward preventing gun deaths. Law enforcement officers want an extreme risk protection order law so they can offer families a lifeline in their time of crisis and prevent tragedy. A law like this is already in place in 21 states and the District of Columbia. In 2018 a survey was done by Alaska Survey Research titled "Alaska Attitudes Toward Gun Ownership and Regulation." I am not opposed to responsible gun ownership and use. I am a gun owner, and have used a gun for hunting. For years I was required to carry guns during my field work with the US Forest Service. For several years I also participated in a recreational shooting team at the Juneau Gun Club, which I very much enjoyed.

However, my family has been impacted by gun violence more than once--by suicide, by the accidental shooting and death of a 14 year old family member when a childhood friend found a gun he didn't realize was loaded, and an accidental discharge of a loaded gun that killed one of our daughter's friends as he exited a vehicle. You might think these are isolated incidences, but unfortunately, they are not. The United States has a terrible record when it comes to gun violence. Alaska ranks 4th in the rate of gun deaths, and 2nd as the state with the highest number of gun suicides.

Recently in my own community, a distressed and mentally impaired individual accidentally fired off a loaded gun at our local radio station, endangering but thankfully not hurting the station manager or staff.

HB 89 Gun Violence Protective Orders is proposed as a tool for keeping guns from individuals who pose a risk to themselves or others. I urge your support of this bill, which is a reasonable and practical strategy in working to reduce gun violence. This is not an anti-gun bill. It is an anti-violence bill. We don't have a problem suspending driving privileges for those incapable of driving safely, thereby endangering themselves and the public. It should not be controversial to do the same for firearms.

I am writing in full support of HB89.

First and foremost, I am a resident of Eagle River, House District 23 and I am a gun owner. My experience with firearms over 27 years in the Marine Corps as an enlisted Marine and an officer, drilled into me that firearms are tools that require clear presence of mind to use and possess. While access to firearms is a right we have as citizens of the United States, there are reciprocal responsibilities to society that must be honored as well. These responsibilities lie in your hands as legislators.

Extreme Risk laws are a temporary tool to prevent tragedies. They are not permanent bars, they are not gun grabs, and no more an infringement than the legal prohibition on possessing firearms while intoxicated or under the influence of drugs, even if legally prescribed.

In many instances of gun violence and especially with suicides, there are clear warning signs that the shooter posed a serious threat to themselves and others before the shooting. Extreme Risk laws, allow loved ones and law enforcement to intervene in order to **temporarily** prevent someone in crisis from accessing firearms. I have lost more friends to suicide than to combat during my 27 years in the Marines spanning Iraq, Afghanistan, Libya, Horn of Africa, and the Balkans. If I were in crisis I would want this safety net. Firearms are ruthlessly efficient at killing and sadly over 90 percent of suicide attempts with firearms, end in a fatality.

Extreme Risk laws provide a responsible, legally managed tool to prevent tragedies while upholding the due process so crucial to our legal system and society. Put the right safeguards in the hands of law enforcement and the community. Pass this law.

My wife and I are currently traveling out of state and have a scheduling conflict on the day of your hearing, so I won't be able to testify in person or telephonically. In my files at home, I have a published, peer reviewed study showing that extreme risk protection laws in other states have saved many lives. I know some gun rights supporters allege that these types of laws are unfair to "law abiding citizens". I

I know some gun rights supporters allege that these types of laws are unfair to "law abiding citizens". I would ask them to give a complete definition of the term "law abiding".

Does it include people who threaten others after drinking too much alcohol? Does it include people who have a history of domestic violence arrests?

I had a situation a few years ago with a family member who had been diagnosed with depression but tended to self medicate with street drugs. We had court approved domestic violence protective orders against this person spanning two different years.

One time, I accidently encountered that person at a local store and he threatened to "put a bullet in my head". That is the type of person I would expect to be subject to this type of legislation.

I also have seen studies showing that extreme risk protection laws can help reduce suicides. In order for this legislation to apply to someone, a judge must be convinced that the person is an immediate threat to self or others.

We know from experience that just trying to get a judge to approve a domestic violence protective order against someone is not always easy. They typically want to see convincing evidence that the person is a serious threat. I assume a similar high expectation for evidence would be required by judges before using this law to take guns away from someone.

My name is Odette Edgar; I live in Juneau.

I'm testifying in support of HB89. It provides three temporary means to curb gun violence by removing guns from a person who is a danger to themselves or others. Police officers or family members can file for the protective orders.

When I was growing up, one of my parents suffered from severe bouts of depression. Several times, she threatened to kill herself with a gun; fortunately, she never followed through. But it was a terrifying threat to live with.

Under HB89, any removal of weapons must be approved by a judge only after considering <u>sworn</u> testimony. In the Gun Violence Protective Order, which can run 60 days, the gun owner must be notified 10 days in advance of a hearing and given the opportunity to refute the testimony. If a gun owner surrenders the weapons to the police, they must be given a receipt, and the police <u>must return the guns</u> when the order expires. The other two orders last 72 hours or 20 days.

Here are some of the factors a judge would consider before approving an order to remove guns:

- recent threats to self or others,
- a pattern of violent threats in the past 12 months,
- reckless brandishing of a firearm,
- history of use or threats of physical violence,
- stalking,
- evidence of drug or alcohol abuse, and
- prior arrest for felony or violent crime.

This is a chilling list of behaviors. I can imagine the trauma of the family that is dealing with this scary scenario. If HB89 does not pass, the police have no legal way of protecting the family or their loved one.

Please pass HB89. Thank you for allowing public testimony on this bill.

I am writing in support of the passage of HB 89 (Extreme Risk Protective Orders). The bill has provisions that are the same or similar to those in place in the 21 other states which have Extreme Risk laws in place. Those states include Indiana and Florida.

I am a lifelong Alaskan who has hunted since I was 10 years old and owned guns since I was old enough to do so. I recognize the importance of gun ownership to many, many Alaskans. I also recognize the dangers that can accompany their use and the responsibilities that come with ownership. HB 89 provides a much needed and appropriate tool to help address suicide and gun violence issues.

Those who oppose adoption of extreme risk laws often go quickly to arguments that there are second amendment issues and that the laws do not provide for due process. Neither of those is true. The restrictions of gun possession/ownership that are outlined in HB 89 and the laws of the other states are not in conflict with the second amendment because of due process provisions involving law enforcement, the court system, proper notice, and review. I encourage all members to carefully read and fully understand the sections of the bill that lay out the processes.

Alaska has one of the highest suicide rates in the nation as well as high levels of domestic violence. Statistics on suicide highlight how lethal guns can be. While the vast majority of those who survive a first a first suicide attempt do not make a subsequent attempt, that scenario is not the case with guns as first attempts are successful about 90% of the time. Having the ability to temporarily restrict access to guns for those that are demonstrating suicidal tendencies can be critical in allowing them to get the help they need. With regard to domestic and related violence, restricting access to guns in verifiable situations can help prevent trauma and tragedies for all who are involved.

Thank you for your consideration of HB 89. It is not anti-gun legislation, it is reasonable protection for Alaskans that is in concert with the responsibilities of gun ownership and use. In implementing an extreme risk protective order system, we will have the benefit of analyzing and utilizing what is working well in other jurisdictions.

After over eighty hours of intense data driven study and research, a position on Gun Safety was adopted June 17, 2024, by the Alaska League of Women Voters, which some of our local lKenai Peninsula league members helped to write.

STATEMENT OF POSITION

The League of Women Voters of Alaska finds that the safety and health of its citizens are threatened by a lack of safe gun ownership laws. The League recognizes that many Alaskans value and rely on firearms for hunting and personal protection and respects the right of Alaskans to own and use guns. However, firearms cause very high rates of death and injury in our state, particularly among children and teens. Therefore, the League believes the state government should adopt common-sense gun laws that will save lives and reduce injuries, and supports the following with an emphasis on public safety:

• Safe storage, including gun locks • Annual licensing fees to be used for gun safety education • Required permit to conceal carry • Background checks to purchase • Gun-free school zones • Red flag laws known as extreme risk legislation • Parental liability • Regulation of assault weapons and high-capacity magazines

HB-89, an Extreme Risk law, is a bill that would only be a tool for preventing firearm suicides, homicides, mass shootings, and school shootings, because it provides a way to intervene before extreme warning signs become tragedies. I am a resident of Anchorage writing in support of House Bill 89, the Extreme Risk Protection Order law. This law would be a crucial tool for families and law enforcement to use to use to prevent gun violence and suicide in our state by temporarily restricting firearm access through due process of law to those who are showing evidence of harming others or themselves.

Alaska has the third highest rate of gun suicide deaths in the nation, and 71% of Alaskan gun deaths are suicides (everystat.org). Our youth are struggling, and surveys show that one in five Alaskan high schoolers has attempted suicide in the last year, and half say they have easy access to a loaded gun (2023 Youth Risk Behavior Survey). My husband is a pediatrician in Anchorage who frequently counsels suicidal teens, and our family has been impacted by firearm suicide, which has affected our close relatives for decades. If HB 89 becomes law, family members who are concerned about their loved ones showing signs of suicidal ideation can appeal to a judge to have their guns taken away until the danger has passed, putting critical time and space between a person in crisis and lethal means.

Extreme Risk laws are in place in 21 states plus Washington DC, and have resulted in a 14% reduction in firearm suicide rates in Connecticut and a 7.5% reduction in Indiana over ten years. This tool will save lives in Alaska without infringing on people's Second Amendment rights.

As a mother of three school-aged children, I also worry about the threat of gun violence on school grounds. School shooters often display warning signs before acting, and HB 89 would provide a way for family members and law enforcement to intervene before the unthinkable happens. We've got to use every tool available to protect our kids.

I hope you will support and advance HB 89, and I thank you for opening up this important conversation in your committee.

Thank you for holding a public hearing to consider House Bill 89, which would enable Alaska to join other states in reducing the number of lives being lost to gun violence, including suicide.

House Bill 89, relating to Extreme Risk Protective Orders (ERPOs), can prevent deaths by firearms, including reducing the number of deaths that result from suicide. In Alaska suicide comprises 71% of firearms deaths. It is often the case in instances of mass shootings and other gun violence incidents, that the person wielding a firearm was showing clear signs of trouble before an incident takes place. These warning signs, if they are observed by a family member or a member of law enforcement, can enable law enforcement to seek a court order to temporarily block an individual's access to firearms, thereby reducing the likelihood of gun deaths. And the bill, without question, provides for due process.

Twenty-one states and the District of Columbia have adopted ERPO laws. Florida was a leader in adopting ERPO legislation and many other states have followed suit because such laws are an effective tool to save lives.

It is a sobering statistic that firearms and poisonings are tied for second place as the leading cause of death for Alaska's children (up to eighteen years old), but we can be encouraged that there are proven methods such as HB 89 to reduce firearms deaths for children as well.

Many Alaskans have firearms, and they are widely used for sport and subsistence; they are a part of the fabric of Alaska life. This bill does nothing to alter that. But just because many of us Alaskans own guns doesn't mean we have to stand idly by while lives are lost. It doesn't mean we are proud to have the fifth highest rate in the country of death by gun. You have the power to take action that will change this shameful statistic.

Please give this proposed measure due consideration, and allow it to move forward for consideration by your colleagues in the Alaska House of Representatives. Thank you for your consideration.

I am a 46 year resident of Alaska and a parent, and I thank you for hearing HB 89, a bill that would establish an Extreme Risk Protective Order or "Red Flag" law for Alaska. I strongly support HB 89, that would give caring family members and local law enforcement a due process tool through the court system, that could just temporarily remove firearms from a person in crisis that is showing signs of harming themselves or others. The Office of Veterans Affairs, the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, and other suicide prevention organizations recognize the importance of ensuring guns cannot be readily accessed when there is a mental health crisis. Twenty-one states (including the states of Florida, Indiana, Virginia) and DC have adopted Extreme Risk legislation, as they have recognized that having this focused tool will prevent firearm suicide, mass shootings, and school shootings – and save lives. A 2018 study of Connecticut's Extreme Risk law found that the law was associated with a 14% reduction in firearm suicide rates, and ten years after Indiana passed its Extreme Risk law, the state's firearm suicide rate decreased by 7.5%.

I want to broaden my comments from this single bill, to implore you as Legislators to have serious conversations about gun safety and gun harm In Alaska and to be open to <u>developing and supporting solutions</u> that will save Alaskans' lives. Alaska's firearm death rate is the 5th highest in the country and is more than double the national average. Alaska has the 3rd highest rate of gun suicide deaths in the country. Very tragically, firearms are one of the top two leading cause of death for Alaska's children and teens, and 55% of those deaths are gun suicides.

This is a recognized public health crisis – and it is <u>beyond time</u> for the Legislature to act to prevent more gun deaths and injuries in our state. I implore you as Legislators to start taking our gun injury and death statistics seriously – and to work on solutions that would be effective and a good fit for Alaska.
