FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

BILL NO. SB 4

Analysis

This bill would increase the administrative burden on claim administrators. That increased responsibility would be passed on to plans in the form of increased administrative fees. The AlaskaCare plans already incentivize consumerism and steer members to lower cost alternatives.

As written, this bill only requires the Division of Retirement & Benefits to analyze whether the statute would benefit AlaskaCare members. The Segal, the AlaskaCare plans' consultant, estimate for that analysis is \$210.0. If the intent of the legislation is for this to apply to the AlaskaCare plans, the fiscal note would need to be revised to reflect that analysis.
