I am a father of two elementary students and the principal of Soldotna Elementary. I have 19 years of experience in the state as a teacher and school administrator and I would like to thank this committee for the hard work they put in in securing funding. I would like this committee to put together a package that will enable us to provide an adequate education for all the state's students, mine included.

Every year I'm asked to do the same with less and I have exhausted my resources to do so. My school is a standout school and has met or exceeded our district's charter schools averages in reading and math as reported on the state report card to the public, and yet, I have fewer resources, options, and my students are far needier, lower income, more impacted by disabilities and far more racially diverse than charter school students.

According to the state report cards to the public. Soldotna Elementary has a score of 55.68 in reading and 57.95 in math. Our four charters average 52.4 in reading and 57.99 in math. The state continues to divert resources from boundary schools to these underperforming charters who place barriers to education against marginalized and disabled students. In addition to meeting the rising costs induced by inflation, I respectfully ask that all schools be held to the same standard, be given the same privileges, responsibilities and obligations. The two tier system should be abolished. Separate is inherently unequal.

Why does the state see fit to continually divert resources from one class of students to another class? If the privileges bestowed by statute are good for charters, why are they denied to boundary schools? The executive branch needs to be held accountable for enabling this system that both underfunds the traditional schools and discriminates against students in need of more resources. This committee has the power, legal, and moral responsibility to do this. I encourage the committee to do the right thing: ensure our state's investments are paying off. Fund a reasonable amount and also provide equity for students by giving all schools the same level of freedom to operate and use its funds. One school's existence and freedom (charters) should not be contingent upon another school being held to a higher and stricter standard.

While I appreciate the time you're taking to consider this, I understand the issues are complicated. I encourage any member to reach out to me and discuss this further if they want more information on the topics I have written about here.

Please add this as my Testimony on HB69.

As a member of the 2014 House Sustainable Education Task force I was in full agreement with our conclusion that increases to the BSA do harm to school budgets. That injections of money need to be outside formula.

This dispersement model has failed since it was last modified. Leading inevitably to wasteful spending, nearly every district could not comply with Legislative requirement that 75 percent of fund go to classroom, and DEED waived so many Districts from this requirement that the requirement was dropped.

Like Speed limit on Sterling highway.

The only thing that is consistent in the last 30 years is more money into the BSA only leads to more money badly spent.

We agreed there are simpler and cheaper solutions: Here is our list.

- 1)Enroll all School District employees into the state health care program. Lowers over all cost due to age pool, per Insurance actuaries.
- 2) Prohibit state funds from being used to pay administrators and central office staff. This is money that never makes it to the classroom. This has lead since kast formula to excesive growth in school budgets for central office costs.

The previous formula had both salary and personel caps tied to classroom expenditure. If you want to control the spending, prohibit use of state funds in excess of 1999 restrictions on Administration costs.

If districts want to exceed this amount they must use local funds only.

- 3) Increase pay to teachers. By directly sending as a yearly a COLA adjustment.
- 4) Prohibit districts from allowing union to contact new hires until after contract is signed.
- 5) Prohibit districts from closing schools which still have bonded debt, and require 90 percent occupancy in the rest of the school buildings.
- 6) Require districts to use surplus buildings and/or excess space to house charter schools at no cost, this will end the practice of charter schools having to build or lease buildings.
- 7) Allow Charter schools who have more applicants than space to operate in multiple public school buildings, especially surplus buildings.

It is also important to check that districts are complying wirh the Alaska Supreme Court

decision that school transportation must allow charter and or private school students access to routes that pass their location.

8)Prohibit Districts from paying union membership dues for their employees to the union directly.

Unions work best when members write the check foe their dues.

# **Education Bill Testimony**

Good morning and thank you for this opportunity to share my thoughts. My name is Lisa Bishop and I live in Fairbanks. I am a product of local schools and graduated from UAF with a degree in elementary education in 1990, when there were 40 jobs and 400 applicants which is the opposite of what we have now. My children attended Pearl Creek Elementary starting in 1998 and I worked there doing a wide variety of jobs for 15 years, from building sub to ERII tutor to RTI Assistant. I received my special education certification in 2015 and have worked at several other schools in the district until returning to Pearl Creek in 2023. I am thrilled to be back and appreciate even more the things that drew me back there, a strong and effective principal, a cohesive and experienced teaching team and support staff and supportive and engaged parents. I was able to see how effective this team can be for students as the school I was at previously was redistricted to Pearl Creek and students that I had in special education were now 5th graders at Pearl Creek. Many of them had made amazing progress in that year, benefiting greatly from having experienced and effective teachers in general education and special education, peers who are at or above grade level and less behavior. Although many of these students had been Title 1 at the previous school, Pearl Creek had worked hard to still provide these students with the physical and emotional support they needed such as extra clothes, food for over the weekend, and great support from the counselor for them and their families.

This is all part of why I am sharing my thoughts. I want to see all this school continue to perform so well and all of the schools in our district and state to be fully funded to carry on this important work. I am so very sad to see today's students not receive the excellent education that I and my own children did. It is demoralizing and exhausting to work in a system that seems to value experienced teachers so little. We need the funds to educate children well and to draw the best and brightest. That is not what is happening now. The public schools are being held to an impossibly high standard given the amount of funding and support we are giving. While I support schools of choice and charters and home schooling when done correctly, I am beyond tired of constantly receiving students from home schools and poorly performing charters that are two to three years below grade level. They then become part of the public schools so called poor performance. As a taxpayer, I am enraged that my tax dollars are given to these entities with no accountability or reporting mandates. I homeschooled my own child for a period of time and was appalled

at the lack of accountability and standards that I was held to. This needs to change.

Not fully funding education for our children also has long term consequences for the state of Alaska. We are not drawing new people here to work in fields like medicine and business when we have poor schools. We are hearing of job seekers turning down jobs in the state because of these concerns. This is not how we grow our economy and our state.

Lastly, the practice of importing teachers on J1 visas to teach our children is also detrimental to their education. While many of them may be well educated in their home country, it is a heavy lift to get them caught up in the Fairbanks public school system. They are particularly lacking in skills for dealing with classroom management and behavior. Until we fix our teacher retirement and pension system and start funding schools, this trend will continue and reinforce the downward spiral of our public schools.

Thank you for your time in reading this and I hope my experience of 40 years in a variety of roles in public education is helpful. I love teaching and want our schools to be the best that they can be to grow our state and our future.

This inconsistency creates further financial instability and inequity.

Dear Alaska Legislators,

I am writing to ask for your support of House BIII 69 that would increase base student allocations. I have been a resident of Salcha, Alaska for over 42 years. My children and now my grandchildren attend Salcha Elementary School. Salcha Elementary is currently on the list of schools being considered for closure by the Fairbanks North Star Borough due to lack of funding. Our school has a long history of serving Salcha families and is the heart of our rural community. I would like to share a little about our school to help you realize the importance of supporting this Bill that will help to keep our school open.

Salcha Elementary has a long record as a school of excellence, being selected for numerous state and national awards for service to military families, diverse student populations, serving low income students, and the community. Salcha School, like all rural schools, has a unique role to fill. Salcha is a geographically large community, over 40 miles along the Richardson Highway, extending from Eielson AFB to the edge of the Fairbanks North Star Borough (over 40 miles). Children and staff come to school from as far away as Birch Lake. This distance alone creates unique challenges, but Salcha School staff have utilized school and community resources to solve issues, each time strengthening our school and community.

Salcha School is a Title 1 school. Closing Salcha School will only bring hardships to our families and the students that are served. Our local community school allows families to be involved in their student's education as volunteers in the classroom, sports, and attend school functions such as School Nights, Science Fairs, and other evening events. Non-parent community members act as tutors and mentors as well. Transportation becomes an issue with students who ride the bus to another community to attend school. Elementary students will be excluded from participation in after school activities, such as sports, STEM, or tutoring, that enrich their daily educational experience due to transportation problems (no late bus transportation) Many parents who work outside the community find it prohibitive both financially and time wise to drive home from work to get their child then drive back 20 or more miles to go to a school activity in another community. Many of these families already have financial hardships. Governor Dunleavy advocates in his State of the State address charter schools and homeschooling. Yet this is not a viable option for families that live 40 or more miles (one way) from the district charter schools. Homeschooling is extremely difficult, if not impossible, for single and working parents, especially if they have young elementary students. Young children do not learn how to read, write, or calculate without adults helping them. I spent 20 years in education and have seen the negative impact on educational levels when parents do not have the time, energy, or knowledge to homeschool their children properly. I applaud families that can homeschool correctly, but most families do not have the economic ability to homeschool. Public education is for all families, all children, despite their situation.

The mental health of each student is also at risk. I know from personal experience, when young children leave a community to attend school, they become isolated due to distance, and are less likely to create friendships. Their sense of community is gone. Special needs students are also more likely to be affected by isolation from their peers. Salcha has often used an inclusion model of Special Education that benefits the child with special needs and also the other children in their class, school, and community. Lifelong friendships and understanding of differences have been the result of this teaching model. Salcha's unique classroom environment allows cross-age activities and experiences as well that encourage student leadership, empathy, and connection. Multiage classrooms also allow flexible grouping of student's without any stigma attached allowing for outstanding student growth. Salcha School's belief of "All our kids, are all our kids" results in every staff member taking the responsibility of educating EVERY child. This is the special gift of a small school environment. Salcha School is also an important part of the overall daily lives of community members. Volunteers support the ski, running, and science programs, improving the quality of mentorship, coaching, and intergenerational interactions. Salcha School is the community hub and primary gathering place for events, such as the voting location for the community, Thursday night community volleyball, and an emergency shelter for the community (especially for flooding and fires). The playground and trails are used by the community and visitors year around.

Physical activities have always been an important part of our school. Every fall Salcha School hosts over 500 elementary runners and their families for a cross-country race. We are the only school to host the event on their own trails. This event is run by volunteers. On the last day of school we hold the "Salcha 5K Challenge Race" on the ski trails behind the school. We are the only school in the state and in fact the entire country that holds a competitive race on the last day of school. The students work hard to prepare for this race. This race is not new. For about 20 years students ran "The Six Mile Run" from Harding Lake to the Salcha School along the Richardson Highway. They trained hard for the privilege of running this race.

Once it became too dangerous to use this course, a new race was created utilizing the Darrel Coe Ski Trails. Students learn to persevere and challenge themselves with this race. This is a life-long skill that translates to every aspect of life. This unique race empowers our students to believe in themselves and their ability to overcome a challenge which is a lifelong skill.

Please vote yes on Bill 69 to increase the base student allocation that will support all rural community schools and public education. Thank you for your time and help.

- 4. Screeners for those below proficient
- 5. Progress Monitoring students who fall below proficient on both the DIBELS and MAP biweekly
- 6. Providing interventions to any student who falls below proficient
- 7. Conferencing with families to provide updates
- 8. Notifying (conferences, phone calls, emails) families 10 times a year with updates on their child's progress on MAP and DIBELS
- 9. Evaluating teacher practices and monitoring their practices for student growth
- 10. Conducting quarterly community meetings to review our schools data, systems, teaching, answering questions, and looking at concerns
- 11. Hosting our Title One and Migrant Events to the families to increase awareness and opportunity for education at home
- 12. Making contact with families who have been more than 10% absent
- 13. Making contact with families who have been tardy

I support HB 69. Most of these are written into Alaska's regulations or law; However, in passing the AK Reads Act in 2022 there was little funding to support this act. This list of what we do in Petersburg is not exclusive, and it is an important list. I am writing to express my support for HB 69. As the principal of Paul Banks Elementary, a K-2 school in Homer, I can attest to the need for this bill to pass. My school district faces a \$16.9 million deficit if funding remains flat as proposed by Governor Dunleavy. The effect on Paul Banks will be significant. For example, a PTR increase of as much as +10 would result in classes ballooning to more than 30 kids in a classroom. When classrooms grow to this size, student learning is greatly impacted in a negative way. Furthermore, we could potentially lose our PE and music programs, our librarian aide, and our elementary counselor. Talks of reducing classified staff contracts by up to ten days would significantly reduce opportunities for collaboration and training to support our students in special education. One catastrophic impact of not passing HB 69 is that Paul Banks would be closed. Within our district there are conversations about school consolidations and closures and Paul Banks could be one of those schools; this would be a tremendous loss to our community.

Funding schools is a constitutional responsibility and HB 69 fulfills this responsibility. Flat funding does not. Flat funding will lead to loss of programs, loss of opportunities and loss of learning. This will damage not only my community but communities across the state. When we do not invest in education, we do not invest in our future. As our state population declines, it seems that investing in education would be a wise investment for a myriad of reasons outside of an ethical and constitutional responsibility.

Please vote Yes on HB69. Our "Brick and Mortar" neighborhood schools are barely holding on because school funding has been politically restricted for too many years. In reaction, many people have chosen to homeschool, by using programs offered by other school districts, such as Galena School District based IDEA, and Yukon-Koyukuk School District based Raven, both of which serve students outside their own districts. This artificially shifts revenue to other districts, complicating school funding equations and limiting resources to the homeschool students' own local school districts, reducing classes and opportunities to all students in each community. The risks and benefits of homeschooling are invaluable in this setting, because IDEA and Raven are unregulated by the State of Alaska and any statistics comparing these publicly funded programs are unavailable.

The above conclusions are based on painstaking inquiries made to DEED, IDEA and Raven representatives and employees and to my own (Juneau) school district over the past few months. The difficulty that I experienced obtaining information on homeschool student numbers from these institutions suggests that some parties have an interest in concealing the facts behind state funding for them. I would strongly encourage Alaska Legislators to investigate and publish details of state funding for these home school organizations, local public schools and districts, and private schools receiving state funds.

Budgetary limitations have already caused the closure of one of two Juneau High schools, with some Juneau High School students lacking classroom space and critical courses. Some homeschool based high schoolers may also be affected, as they access some classes through their local public schools.

Please support our Democracy by supporting our neighborhood schools with an increased BSA with a willingness to override any Gubernatorial Veto, if necessary.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on this bill. I am in strong support of HB69. Education in Alaska needs to catch up on funding and then increase ito support a system like we had in the 1970's and early 80's. We had an education system second to none in those days. Residents paid directly for it with a \$100 payment directly to schools through our state income tax.

HB69 is a pragmatic approach bringing inflation adjusted funding back to where it was in 2010 in a phased approach over 3 years. Inflation proofing for the future is included. Why are other budget items increased periodically to account for inflation and economic conditions and not education funding? It has been mired in the 2010's for over a decade. Case in point: current discussions to increase raises for the Governor, Commissioners and Legislators swiftly passed 2 years ago.

It has been suggested that we are just throwing money at education and reforms are needed. We need to get funding to a reasonable level, increase educator's salaries and benefits while attracting and retaining the best and most dedicated educator's in the nation. Then we can adjust the curriculum to help all K-12 students achieve desired results.

We do not need more school choices. Parents have all the choices needed for students to get a good K-12 education if we support teachers, staff and facilities. Students can choose public schools, charter schools, homeschooling or private schools. If parents want their kids to attend a private religious school at their expense, that's their prerogative. Public school funding should not be impacted by the choice.

Our state school system is too diverse to attempt State control of school choice. We have a mix of urban, rural, and off-highway rural schools. Public and charter schools work in an urban setting, but would be handicapped in a rural setting. Local school board control, as we currently have, seems appropriate to me. Resist State Overreach just like the administration wants to resist federal overreach.

The root cause for our lacking education and student performance, in my opinion, is funding.

- We currently have a funding deficit from years of underfunding due to inflation and budget issues.
- We cannot attract and retain quality educators due to salary and benefit deficiencies.
- We have large school fixed costs due to restrictions on budgeting needed maintenance.
- We have too large a student/teacher ratio due to lack of funding.

The argument that we are just throwing funding at education with no return holds little water, in my opinion. Examples of throwing money away under tight budgetary conditions are:

- Hiring \$600-1000/hr lawyers for lawsuits against perceived Federal overreach.
- Joining lawsuits for national causes and paying legal fees that have no practical benefit for Alaska.
- Funding \$million studies on salaries for state workers (including teachers) and then not making them public in time for budgeting purposes.

• Funding quarter \$million dollar studies to refute privately funded economic studies on AIDEA and then never releasing the results to the public.

I am a product of the public school system from a middle income family. I was able to get a BS degree in engineering as well as MS and PhD degrees in engineering. #### Dear House and Senate Education Committees:

I urge you to greatly and significantly increase school funding and the BSA so my child can have an adequate education. I don't think your current proposal (in HB69) will be enough of an increase in funding for the Fairbanks North Star Borough school district to provide an adequate education. Here are some of the effects of flat funding on Fairbanks North Star Borough School District from the perspective of a parent (of an elementary student):

<u>Class Size Increases</u>: Since my daughter started kindergarten in 2019, her class size has gone up each year since 2020 (COVID) and this year she is in 5th grade and her class size is up to 29 students - above school district targets. Many school grades are combined into one classroom (split classes). I expect next year (in middle school) there will be 30-35 students per class.

Loss of educational programs at elementary schools: No art class in elementary. Elementary band and orchestra has been eliminated. Extended Learning Program (ELP - gifted program) decreased or eliminated. Classes are combined at different grade levels (split classes K/1, 2/3, 4/5 combined classrooms) due to lack of funding for additional teachers making learning difficult for students and teaching more difficult for teachers.

<u>High teacher turnover</u>: Last year 6 educators left at my daughter's school. Lack of a school music teacher for 1.5 years. There have been 4 different music teachers since my child started school. Periodic losses of school nurse, who administer medicine and deal with sick children. The school has had great difficulty finding elementary school teachers. Many teachers have quit due to burn out, stress, poor retirement/benefits, large class sizes, etc. My daughter's school had to hire 2 teachers last year from the Philippines who will likely not remain in Fairbanks long term.

Continued school closures and instability: 4 school closures during our 6 years in the Fairbanks School District (Joy Elementary, Nordale Elementary, Anderson Elementary, Ben Eielson High School). They also moved 6th graders into middle school within the past few years. This year (2025) 5 additional school closures are proposed (Pearl Creek Elementary, Midnight Sun Elementary, Salcha Elementary, Two Rivers Elementary, Hunter Elementary). School closures have a strong negative (academic, emotional, financial) impact on students, families, communities, and teachers.

<u>Transportation</u>: Less school buses available for many neighborhoods (i.e. some students have to walk more than 1 mile to their bus stop on steep hilly outlying roads with no shoulders all winter). My daughter has a long bus rides of nearly 1 hour per

way. Friends' kids have bus rides of OVER 1 hour each way because they combined middle and high school routes into the same bus to save money. This means that they drop the high school kids off first and then drive across town (additional 20 minutes) to drop kids off at middle school. This makes for very long bus rides for many kids. These busing "efficiencies" done by the Fairbanks school district have a negative impact on kids and families. These transportation issues (started during COVID and continue today) are partly why make many people pull their kids out of school in our district and look for other options (private school, home school, move to lower 48, etc).

Over testing: Students are over tested with numerous standardized tests and other tests during the school year. This results in less time for actual education. My elementary school child no longer performs as well on standardized tests; she was well above proficient in her early elementary years, despite COVID, but is not longer "advanced proficiency" and does not show strong growth. In my opinion it is because there is too much standardized and other testing and as the students get older, they know their score doesn't matter for their grades. My child gets mostly straight As on report cards and tested into the elementary school gifted program (ELP). I feel she doesn't try as hard anymore because there are so many tests and the children are tired of the constant repeated testing all year long. I would prefer that the time spent on standardized testing is spent educating instead. Legislators should stop tying school funding to only standardized test performance, it seems to be a poor measure of student success.

Please provide adequate funding for our school district now.

#### Good morning,

I called in from the Anchorage LIO this morning to testify about HB69 and the need to increase the BSA. Below is a slightly expanded version of what I said this morning. Many other people provided testimony about the larger picture issues of trying to keep providing the same level of service with funding that hasn't kept pace with inflation. They also nicely stated the flawed idea of requiring improved performance before providing adequate funding. So I decided to focus on specific examples of how school funding affects my children.

A couple of additional points I did not have time to address this morning:

- -Class sizes continue to increase because of inadequate school funding. My son's kindergarten and first grade classes have had 26 students in them. Imagine trying to teach a room of 26 five year olds how to read.
- -Imagine a legislator coming forward with a bill to slash the BSA by \$1800. What an uproar that would cause! How absurd to slash more than 20% of school funding! But that is essentially what has happened over the past 15 years.
- -My family had the opportunity to leave Alaska when my husband's employer left the state in 2020. We made the difficult decision to give up a well paying job so we could stay here in Alaska. We love Alaska, this is home, so while finding a new job with a substantial pay cut was stressful, we felt it was the right decision. However, with every year that I see our government decide to not adequately fund our public schools I feel more and more doubt about our decision to stay.

## To whom it may concern -

My name is Katie Rohrs and I am the current PTA president at Bear Valley Elementary in Anchorage. I am writing to you today, in hopes that you will keep education and necessary funding at the forefront as you work through the budget for this fiscal year.

As many of you are aware, Bear Valley was recently placed on the school closure list as the Anchorage School District confronts a lack of funding and budget constraints. Thankfully, through community involvement, hours of research, data analysis and testimony, corrected data was uncovered that allowed our school to be removed from the closure list. The turmoil our families were suddenly thrust into ignited our resolve to fight for education and understanding of what our district and so many others are faced with when it comes to educational funding and budgeting.

- Why and how had our state reached a point where we were relying on bandaid funding from year to year?
- Why has the BSA only increased 5% in fourteen years, falling far short of inflation?
- Why is there a shortage of qualified staff in our schools?
- Why do we lack the resources and materials to ensure our children receive a proper education?
- What else will be stripped away as various levels of government seek to balance budgets?

Our family relocated here from the Houston, TX area four years ago in support of the oil and gas industry. We have three children in the public school system and I myself taught in diverse socioeconomic schools during my time in the classroom before our move to Anchorage. The funding concerns for education are not specific to Alaska. This is a growing problem all across the United States and with the future of The Department of Education in limbo, this just further puts into light the need for a well thought-out plan by our state.

It sits with you to make a decision that puts our children and the future of Alaska front and

center. If there is no priority put on our youth, then where is the draw to stay, enter the work force or receive higher education here? Do we not want them to turn around and invest in our community as adults? For example, UAA recently lost its accreditation for teaching which means there are no student teachers in Alaska who can then funnel into our classrooms as seasoned educators retire.

What myself, our PTA board, and families in Anchorage are asking of you, is to raise the BSA. Not another 5% over the course of the next fourteen years, rather to a number that gives our schools the **teachers**, **staff**, **materials** and **support** they need to secure the safety and future of our youth here in Alaska. HB69 appears to be the launching point we need to get us to that place. Please vote to ensure that we do not have a repeat of last year's vote that left education behind.

Currently, PTAs, grants, private funding, and other support organizations are providing a shocking and unsustainable level of support to our school system. Within the last few years, The Bear Valley PTA has purchased a snow plow, provided functioning blinds throughout the school that are essential during lockdown drills, replaced thousands of library books, projector bulbs, computers and other technology, provided a pallet jack, replaced gym equipment and even purchased ice melt for our custodial staff, among many others. In addition, we are providing resources for enrichment opportunities and afterschool programs and Bear Valley Community Association (BVCA) offers before and after school childcare for our working families. I fully acknowledge that our school has excellent parent engagement and support and that the support structure for many other schools does not look like ours. However, this monumental level of support from families is not sustainable. Parents and grandparents cannot keep our education system afloat... We do not receive Title funding and are solely reliant on the passing of bonds and community support to get things done.

As a transplant, who has lived and worked in many different locations, there is something special about Alaska that draws you in and makes you want this to be your forever home. If our attitude and actions towards education do not improve drastically, we, and many others, will make a difficult decision about what is best for our families and our children's academic futures. Talented, generous, invaluable and skilled residents across this state will take their families elsewhere. It does not need to be this way if we prioritize funding for our education system.

I would like to invite you to visit with the Bear Valley PTA so that we may educate on areas where we need your help. We want to use our voices in a productive and meaningful way to help drive change and are here to be of service to you throughout this process as well. Thank you for your time, and look forward to additional dialogue in the future.

My name is Gabby Ide from Anchorage representing myself. I have 3 children in ASD and the gross negligence with the bloated funding ASD receives without accountability. I am not in support of HB69 as it is written.

- Education spending is the second-largest category of Alaska's budget: the Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) is budgeted \$1.67 billion for fiscal year 2023 (July 2022 June 2023).
- Education spending has outpaced inflation in the last 10 years by over 50%.
- Alaska has much higher per-pupil expenditures than the nationwide average—over \$22,000 per student per year, the sixth highest in the nation—but Alaskan students lag in academic performance, ranking 49th in education according to the Casey Foundation in 2022. Alaska's current spending per pupil is 23% higher than the U.S. average.
- Between 2002 and 2020, Alaska saw a 0.7% drop in enrollment from 133,000 students to 132,000 students, yet current spending growth has kept pace with revenue growth, increasing 32% per pupil. Correspondence school enrollment has risen to 16.3% of students.
- Since 2002, Alaska has grown its education revenues and spending by nearly a third while enrollment in brick-and-mortar schools has declined.

Increases in support services have quickly outpaced the lean increases in teaching salaries.

- To improve Alaska's dismal education outcomes, funding should be used to directly support students instead of just increasing generalized education funding.
- Alaska is falling behind on all education fronts but one—Alaska's charter schools lead the nation in math and reading performance.
- Alaska's current correspondence program should be fully funded (it is currently only funded at 90%). Alaska legislators should focus on leveling the financial playing field for families who choose charter and correspondence programs for their children over traditional neighborhood schools.
- Increasing funding and access to correspondence always all Alaska's families, regardless of income or location find a system of education that will allow them to reach their educational goals.
- Only a few charter schools have been authorized in the past few years despite an increased demand. By all measures, students in Alaska's charter schools perform better than students enrolled in traditional public schools regardless of ethnicity, subgroup, or gender.11
- Adding money to an antiquated, one-size-fits-all system is not the solution Alaska's students need. It is time to fund students, not systems.

If we tie BSA to the CPI to Anchorage and we enter a depression we will need to shutter out schools.

Let's try a new approach to the BSA by considering a few new factors:

- **Student Needs**: Schools may receive additional funding based on the needs of students, such as those with disabilities, low-income students, or English language learners.
- **State or District Budget**: The amount of funding available in the state's budget can affect the BSA. If the state has more funds available, the BSA might be higher.
- Additional Adjustments: There might be other factors like geographic cost differences (some areas may cost more to operate than others), and this can adjust the BSA amount.

Each borough may have different unique needs for this allocation, but the core idea is that it's tied to student enrollment and local funding policies.

If we continue to tie the **Base Student Allocation (BSA)** to the **Consumer Price Index (CPI)** can be troublesome for a few reasons:

- Mismatch with Educational Costs: The CPI measures inflation in general consumer goods and services, but it doesn't always align with the specific costs schools face. For example, education-related expenses like teacher salaries, special education needs, or school infrastructure often rise faster than the CPI. This means the BSA, adjusted by CPI, may not be enough to cover the real cost increases schools face.
- Underfunding During Low Inflation: If the CPI is low or there's deflation, the BSA increase could be minimal, potentially leaving schools without the necessary funds to cover rising costs, especially when the cost of providing education is still increasing. Especially, if we are heading into the next great depression.
- **Regional Discrepancies**: The CPI is a measure of Anchorage, but costs of living and inflation can vary widely across different boroughs. For example, a borough with rapidly increasing housing or labor costs might struggle if its funding is tied to a Anchorages CPI rather than a more regionally adjusted measure.
- Lag in Response: The CPI is usually reported on a delayed basis (annually, for example), which means funding adjustments based on CPI may not reflect current cost

pressures in schools in real-time.

In short, while the CPI is a commonly used economic indicator, it doesn't always track the specific financial pressures that schools face, making it a potentially ineffective way to ensure schools are properly funded year over year.

While tying the **Base Student Allocation (BSA)** to **standardized test performance** can be troublesome for several reasons:

- Inaccuracy in Reflecting True Needs: Standardized test scores don't always accurately reflect a student's learning needs or potential. Many factors—such as socioeconomic background, access to resources, language barriers, or disabilities—can affect test performance, meaning schools serving higher-needs populations may be unfairly penalized, even if they're doing their best to support students.
- Pressure to "Teach to the Test": If schools' funding is tied to test results, it can create an incentive to focus more on test preparation rather than providing a well-rounded, enriching education. Teachers and administrators might prioritize testable subjects and skills, potentially neglecting creative, critical thinking, and non-tested subjects like the arts and physical education.
- Incentivizing Inequality: Schools in wealthier areas often have more resources, which can lead to higher test scores. On the other hand, schools in low-income areas, where students may face more challenges, might see lower scores. This could create a cycle where lower funding leads to fewer resources and more difficulty improving test scores, perpetuating inequality.
- **Test Score Variability**: Standardized tests can be influenced by many factors beyond just what students have learned, such as test anxiety, student health, or the testing environment. Relying on these scores to determine funding could lead to fluctuations in funding that don't accurately reflect the quality of the education being provided.
- Narrow Focus: Education should aim to develop a wide range of skills, from critical thinking to social and emotional learning, not just the ability to perform well on a test. Tying BSA to test performance could diminish the focus on these important areas of student development.

In summary, while standardized tests can provide some insight into student performance, tying BSA to these results can lead to inequities and pressures that don't necessarily support the broader goals of education. So, I do not support it.

The best way to determine the **Base Student Allocation (BSA)** should be one that ensures fair and adequate funding for all schools while accounting for diverse student needs, regional differences, and the true costs of education. Here are several key

considerations for determining an equitable and effective BSA:

- Student-Centered Funding: The BSA should reflect the varying needs of students, recognizing that some students require more resources to succeed. For example, students with disabilities, English language learners, and those from low-income backgrounds often need additional support. A weighted funding formula could allocate additional funds to schools serving higher-needs students.
- Cost of Education: The BSA should be tied to the actual costs of providing education, including teacher salaries, instructional materials, facilities maintenance, and other operational costs. This could be done by regularly updating the BSA to reflect actual inflation and rising costs in education, beyond just the general Consumer Price Index (CPI), which may not fully capture education-specific expenses.
- **Regional Adjustments**: Different regions may have different costs of living, including housing, salaries, and operational costs. A regional adjustment to the BSA would ensure that schools in areas with higher costs aren't disadvantaged in comparison to those in less expensive areas.
- Equity-Based Distribution: The formula should prioritize equity, ensuring that schools in disadvantaged areas receive sufficient funding to bridge the gap in resources and opportunities. This might involve using a needs-based formula that factors in poverty rates, the percentage of students with disabilities, English language learners, and other equity factors.
- Stability and Predictability: The BSA should provide stable, predictable funding to schools. Frequent or drastic changes in funding can disrupt educational planning and make it difficult for schools to meet their students' needs. Setting a consistent growth rate for the BSA, while allowing for adjustments based on inflation or changes in student population, would help maintain this stability.
- Transparency and Accountability: The process of determining and distributing the BSA should be transparent to ensure fairness and build public trust. It's important that stakeholders—teachers, parents, and communities—understand how the BSA is calculated and how funds are being spent to improve student outcomes.
- Long-Term Planning and Support: Funding should not just address short-term needs but also support long-term educational goals. This might include investing in technology, teacher professional development, and infrastructure that improve the quality of education over time.

A balanced, **needs-based** formula that accounts for both the direct costs of education and the varying student and regional needs is likely the best approach for determining BSA. This ensures that schools receive the necessary funding to provide all students with a

quality education, regardless of where they live or their circumstances.

To reflect the **actual cost** of education beyond the Consumer Price Index (CPI), it's important to incorporate factors that more accurately capture the specific challenges and expenses schools face. Here are several ways to achieve this:

# 1. Education-Specific Inflation Metrics

Instead of relying on the CPI, which tracks general consumer prices, a more targeted **education-specific inflation index** can be created. This index would track the costs that directly impact schools, such as:

- Teacher salaries
- Educational materials and technology
- Facilities maintenance and utilities
- Specialized staff (like counselors, special education professionals)
- Training and professional development for teachers
- Health and safety measures in schools

This tailored metric would better capture the true costs associated with running schools.

# 2. Regional Cost of Living Adjustments (COLA)

The cost of living can vary significantly from one area to another. For example, schools in high-cost urban areas may face higher housing costs, transportation costs, and salary expectations compared to those in rural or less-expensive areas. A **regional cost-of-living adjustment** (COLA) can be added to the BSA to account for these disparities, ensuring that schools in higher-cost regions receive adequate funding.

# 3. Local Wage Adjustments

Since personnel costs (teacher salaries, administrative staff, etc.) represent a large portion of a school's budget, factoring in local wage trends is crucial. **Local labor market adjustments** could ensure that schools are able to recruit and retain quality staff by providing salaries that are competitive for the region, and reflective of rising or falling wage trends in the area.

# 4. Differentiated Funding for High Needs Students

As mentioned earlier, certain student populations—such as those with disabilities, English language learners, or those living in poverty—require additional resources. The funding formula could incorporate **weighted allocations** for these groups, reflecting the true cost of supporting these students, which often involves additional personnel, resources, and services.

## 5. Technology and Infrastructure Costs

The cost of integrating and maintaining technology has risen significantly in recent years, and this will likely continue to increase. Schools need to ensure they have the equipment, software, and cybersecurity measures to support both in-person and remote learning. A dedicated portion of funding for **technology and infrastructure** would reflect the growing need for digital tools and support.

# 6. Health and Safety Expenditures

Post-pandemic, schools face higher costs related to health and safety, including sanitization, PPE, ventilation improvements, and mental health services for students and staff. Including a **health and safety adjustment** would ensure that schools have the resources to address these pressing needs without detracting from their core educational goals.

## 7. Annual Reassessment of Cost Drivers

The cost of education evolves over time. To ensure funding is always aligned with current challenges, the education funding formula could include **regular reviews** (annually or biennially) of the major cost drivers, adjusting the BSA based on factors like changes in technology, infrastructure needs, or shifts in student population.

## 8. Collaboration with Educators and Administrators

Ensuring that funding aligns with actual needs requires direct feedback from educators and school administrators. Their insights about specific costs or challenges faced by schools, particularly those in underserved or high-need areas, can provide a clearer picture of what funding levels are truly necessary to deliver quality education.

Incorporating these strategies would provide a much more accurate reflection of the **actual costs** schools face, ensuring that funding levels are appropriate and that schools have the necessary resources to meet the diverse needs of their students. The key is to regularly adjust and tailor funding formulas to address real-time changes in the education landscape.

An example of a needs based formula is below.

A needs-based formula for determining a school's Base Student Allocation (BSA) is designed to allocate funding based on the specific needs of students and the challenges faced by a school or district, rather than solely on student enrollment numbers. This approach helps ensure that schools with higher numbers of at-risk or high-need students receive additional resources to meet those needs. Here's how a needs-based formula can work:

## **Key Elements of a Needs-Based Formula:**

- Base Student Allocation (BSA) for Every Student:
- Every student enrolled in a school would receive a standard, base amount of funding. This amount covers basic education costs like teacher salaries, classroom materials, and general school operations.
- Weighted Funding for High-Need Students:
- The formula adds **weights** or additional funding for students who face greater challenges, including:
- Low-Income Students: Additional funding is allocated for students from low-income families to help address the challenges of limited resources and access to educational opportunities.
- English Language Learners (ELL): Schools with a higher number of ELL students would receive extra funding to support language acquisition programs and specialized instruction.
- **Students with Disabilities**: Schools with a higher population of students with disabilities would receive additional funding for special education programs, services, and accommodations.
- **At-Risk Students**: This could include students facing homelessness, those in foster care, or those at risk of academic failure. They may require additional support like counseling, mentoring, or other services.

These weights are added to the BSA to reflect the higher cost of educating these students.

## • Regional Cost Adjustments:

• Since the cost of living and educational expenses vary by location, the formula can include **regional adjustments** to account for geographic disparities in salaries, housing, and overall cost of living. This ensures that schools in high-cost areas can meet the financial demands of running schools.

#### • Local or District Needs:

• Some districts or schools may have unique needs based on factors like rural vs. urban locations, school size, or aging infrastructure. The formula could factor in additional funding for **capital improvements** or specific local challenges that impact the cost of education.

### • Additional Factors (Optional):

- Teacher Experience and Quality: Districts with higher percentages of inexperienced teachers or those in hard-to-staff schools could receive additional funds for **professional development**, retention programs, or to attract highly qualified teachers.
- **Health and Safety Needs**: For example, if a school is dealing with a higher incidence of health issues, it may need additional resources for **mental health services** or school-based health clinics.

## **Example of a Needs-Based Funding Formula:**

Let's say the base student allocation is \$6,000 per student. Under a needs-based formula, the following adjustments might be made:

- **Low-Income Students**: A school with 40% low-income students might receive a weight of **0.25** (25% more funding). For each low-income student, the school would receive \$7,500 (\$6,000 + 25% of \$6,000).
- English Language Learners (ELL): If a school has 20% ELL students, they might receive a weight of **0.2** (20% more funding). Each ELL student could then receive \$7,200 (\$6,000 + 20% of \$6,000).

- Flexibility: The formula can be adjusted to account for changes in student demographics, regional cost shifts, or other emerging needs, allowing for more adaptive and responsive funding.
- **Incentive for Improvement**: Schools are incentivized to focus on improving outcomes for vulnerable populations, since funding is tied to the presence of students who require more resources, such as low-income or ELL students.

## **Potential Challenges:**

- **Complexity**: A needs-based formula can be more complicated to calculate and administer, especially when adjusting for various factors like regional cost variations or fluctuating student populations.
- **Disincentivizing Consolidation**: Some argue that needs-based funding formulas may unintentionally create a disincentive for schools to consolidate or streamline, as they may lose additional funding when they reduce the number of at-risk students in a district.
- **Equity Concerns**: While the formula aims for equity, there could still be issues of distribution or local political influence that may affect how fairly resources are allocated.

A needs-based formula for determining BSA aims to ensure that funding is distributed in a way that reflects the actual challenges and costs faced by schools serving different student populations. By adjusting funding based on student needs, this approach seeks to provide more equitable and effective support for all students.

I believe if we use a needs based formula we can find a balance between helping both our children and our teachers excel.

Our district is facing a catastrophic \$17 million deficit going into the next school year, and without a significant increase to the Base Student Allocation (BSA), the consequences for Alaska's children and communities will be devastating.

The only way to bridge a deficit of this magnitude is through deep staff cuts—cuts that will impact theater technicians, pool staff, counselors, secretaries, custodians, teachers, paraprofessionals, and administrators. These reductions will severely diminish the quality of education and support available to students, many of whom already face challenges in accessing the services they need to thrive. Schools are the backbone of our communities, and continued underfunding is eroding their ability to function effectively.


Additionally, KPBSD's transportation deficit is so severe that bus route consolidations may force students to wait for their bus along dark highways—an unacceptable risk for our youngest learners. This is not the standard of education and safety that Alaskan families deserve.





I am writing to you in support of our public schools and House Bill No. 69. I am a parent in Fairbanks of two young children and expecting the arrival of another this summer.

In the last several years, I have witnessed numerous school closures, the removal of arts and music programs from public schools and the departure of a multitude of talented teachers, researchers and healthcare providers from Fairbanks. In my household alone, we've had to change health providers four times. The latest letter my husband received indicated that his primary care provider is leaving the state and there is no one to take him as a patient in the clinic. This year, the Fairbanks North Star Borough school district is proposing the closure of *five* elementary schools. Five, including my daughter's. **It is hard not to look around and see a community in decline**.

These trends are happening state-wide. I commend (and am proud of) the bipartisan efforts of the legislature to put forward sustainable education spending for our state, but am I at a complete and utter loss at the Governor's veto of last year's SB 140. Alaska is failing to meet its constitutional obligation to adequately fund public education and we are caught in a downward spiral.

Inflation has hurt all Americans the last few years. It is no secret that costs have risen significantly, and yet our state education funding has remained flat, **unduly burdening local districts and families**. I urge the legislature to both continue their bipartisan work and to consult with the Governor's office to ensure that the proposed education funding increase includes reasonable priorities from the Governor's office. **Alaskans cannot endure another veto of education funding.** Even after closing five elementary schools, the school district will *still* have a \$6 million deficit. There is only so much we can do locally; **the future of education in our town relies on legislative action**.

Working age Alaskans are leaving because our state has chosen not to fund services that support raising families here. As a result, talented people are seeking better opportunities for themselves and their children elsewhere. With them they take their good ideas, entrepreneurship, and innovation that the Alaska economy desperately needs. I don't blame them. Without an increase in state funding, school districts will continue to spiral downward. More will leave.

Again, thank you for addressing this critical issue. There is no doubt in my mind that whatever the outcome for education is in the 2025 session, it will have lasting implications for the well-being of our state. It is my sincere hope that we can **take the long view** and leave a positive lasting legacy for generations to come.

My name is Shelly Kocan, I am a community member in Cordova, Alaska, a 10 year business owner and a parent to a 2nd grader and a 4th grader at Mt Eccles Elementary School. I'm testifying in support of HB 69. I'm very proud of the energy that the leadership, the teachers and the staff bring to our school, their standards are high for providing these kids with an enriching and positive educational experience. They have been able to keep most, but not all, classrooms under 25 students, and continue to offer a lunch program and a PE program and extracurriculars. However this would not have been possible with the current Base Student Allocation, if the Native Village of Eyak had not stepped in and donated \$700,000 for the 24/25 school year to close some of the budget shortfall. We can't rely on the possibility of donations to cover basic spending. The school district has relied heavily on volunteer involvement to close gaps, and many parents have stepped up, but wouldn't it be wonderful for the administration and teachers to be able to focus on programming, curriculum development, teacher training and actual education rather than trying to find volunteers, monitoring the kids for crosswalk duty or staffing the scholastic book fundraiser. Both the elementary school and the high school have had a very hard time recruiting and retaining paraprofessionals, understandably, as the pay is not competitive, you could earn more working as a clerk in the grocery store.

Cordova currently doesn't offer preschool which is a dire need in our community. My fourth grader was in the last preschool class that was offered, and it never returned after covid. The lack of consistent funding has made planning difficult, for example, the need of moving the 6th grade to the high school because of space issues at the elementary school has been happening for years, but the district needs more money to make that happen. We are working with one guidance counselor for the entire district, one music teacher, no school nurse, no art teacher, no librarian, no gifted program. Cordova School District has done a good job of hiding the extent of the harm, but increased funding is necessary for sustained excellence in our schools. I hope you will support House Bill 69 and invest in the education of our children.

Hi, I'm Mike Bronson. I am a Joe-six pack volunteer with the Anchorage branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. We have a lot of parents and grandparents with public school students.

I'm speaking in favor of House Bill 69 to increase the base student allocation.

Passage of the bill will be a big step toward complying with the education clause of the constitution. As Judge Gleason clarified in her *Moore v. Alaska* decision in 2007, the public schools must provide an opportunity for each child to meet the state's standards in reading, math and science. In a legal sense, the Legislature owns the schools. Consequently, the Legislature is responsible for giving them enough direction and money for schools to create those opportunities. In turn, whether the opportunities that you provide are legally adequate is judged largely by assessments in the core subjects. There is not much wrong with public schools that the Legislature can't fix.

Unfortunately, since the *Moore* decision and the tougher state standards in 2012, the Legislature has let its students languish. It is hard to escape the conclusion that the drop in the real-dollar value of the base student allocation was closely associated with the loss of 2,000 classroom teachers, the expansion of class sizes to among the highest in the U.S., and the loss of about one year's worth of learning in math and reading. However, those are not the trends you'd expect if the Legislature had followed the *Moore* rulings and the constitution.

The goal of the Legislature instead should be to raise up reading and math proficiency so that most of its 128,000 K-12 students meet the state's reading and math standards. That would take restoring thousands of teachers to the classroom. HB 69 is a step in that direction.

#### Dear Senators and Representatives,

I'm writing to encourage you to support House Bill 69, which would increase the base student allocation and fund public education in Alaska. In my 40 years, I have never seen our schools in such dire straits as they are at the moment.

I grew up in Fairbanks, attended Pearl Creek Elementary School, Ryan Middle School, West Valley High School, and the University of Alaska Fairbanks for both my BS and my MS degree. My daughter is now a kindergartener at Pearl Creek Elementary and I have had the honor of being a guest scientist in her phenomenal school, as well as other wonderful schools now slated for closure due to lack of funding from the state, including Hunter Elementary, a Title I school, and Salcha Elementary, a strong community focused rural school. Although my hope is that we can keep these schools open, and to that we have a robust proposal to turn Pearl Creek into a magnet school which will bring students back into the district and increase equity by inviting students from outside of Pearl Creek's boundaries to attend, even with the closure of these five amazing schools, Fairbanks will still face *at least* a \$6 million deficit. Without increased funding from the state, it is hard to imagine that the Fairbanks North Star Borough School District will be able to keep paying teachers, staff, next year and, in the next few years, how it will be able to keep any of its public schools open at all.

This goes against a fundamental right guaranteed to our people in our constitution: that every child in our state has a right to a public education. When we close neighborhood schools, title I schools, and rural schools, we are in violation of our own constitution. I understand our Governor is a big fan of parent choice, but parents don't have any choices when their schools are taken away. Many families cannot homeschool, as the pressures of working two jobs to pay for rent do not leave anyone at home to provide a homeschool education. Many families cannot attend charter schools, because the charter schools do not provide bussing and are not equally available to everyone - for example, the lottery this year for one charter school had 100 students apply, and accepted only 9. Charter schools do not have the same resources available for students with special needs. With our public schools closing, charter and homeschools cannot be considered truly accessible public education. Neighborhood schools are the best answer to educating our kids, especially in communities like our borough, which is nearly as large as the state of New Jersey.

Our town will die without increased funding in education. I realize that sounds extreme, but I am one of many life-long Alaskan families that love our town and our state that will be forced to move out of state due to the lack of funding for education. When we lose people, our economy suffers. This will happen quickly to Two Rivers and Salcha, who will face the choices of bussing their kids for hours each day or homeschooling or moving. Once again, this hardly seems like parental choice- this seems like forcing parents into losing scenarios.

Representative Schwanke, I am a long time Goldstream resident (don't we live in a beautiful place?) and was very impressed with your focus on education this summer during your campaign. I asked questions and in response appreciated hearing that you support our neighborhood schools. I know many of us in Goldstream are counting on you as our representative to help fund public education and keep our own neighborhood school, Pearl

Creek Elementary, open.

We must start first with providing for the most important members of our community - our youth and our future. Please support HB 69 and fund public education, for Fairbanks, and for Alaska's future.

My name is Erin Stevens, and I am a resident of the Kenai Peninsula Borough. I serve as the Title I Specialist for the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District, sit on the board of directors for Sprout Family Services, and am the parent of two students within the district. Thank you for the opportunity to share my testimony regarding the urgent need to address Alaska's education funding crisis.

### **Funding Alaska's Public Schools is a Constitutional Duty**

Salcha Elementary is more than a school; it is the heart of our community, a place where education, connection, and opportunity intertwine. Beyond its classrooms, Salcha serves as a gathering space, a safe haven, and a resource hub for families. It offers world-class running and ski trails, fosters outdoor learning, and provides children with experiences they would never find elsewhere. More than just a place of academics, it builds resilience, curiosity, and a deep connection to the environment—qualities that shape students for life.

I know this because Salcha Elementary shaped me. My journey into scientific research began at just five years old, sparked by the unique opportunities this school provided. Partnering with the local watershed association, we conducted long-term environmental studies—testing water quality, identifying juvenile fish, and monitoring riparian zones. Our work began after a levee altered a local slough, and over a decade, our data revealed a troubling six-degree Celsius rise in water temperatures. What started as a local science project led me to national and international platforms. I was invited to present our research at the Global Learning and Observation to Benefit the Environment (GLOBE) Symposiums, the American Fisheries Society (AFS), the American Water Resource Agency (AWRA), the International Arctic Research Center (IARC), the National Center for Atmospheric Research (NSF NCAR), and the American Geophysical Union (AGU) Fall Meeting. These experiences opened doors to paid internships while still in high school, scholarships, advanced research opportunities, and scientific publications.

Salcha Elementary made all of this possible. It instilled in me a passion for climate and environmental science, one I am now pursuing on a Presidential Scholarship at Linfield University. I may never have discovered my path without Salcha's hands-on, community-driven approach to education.

Closing Salcha Elementary is not just about moving students to another building—it is about dismantling a thriving ecosystem of learning, discovery, and community support. The loss will be profound. Busing young children for well over an hour each way will not replace the education and experiences they receive in Salcha. If we want to invest in our students' futures, we must recognize this school's irreplaceable role in shaping them.

I urge you to reconsider closing Salcha Elementary. This school is not just a place of learning—it is a foundation for opportunity, for scientific discovery, and for the future leaders of Alaska and beyond.

My name is Rozlyn Grady-Wyche, and I am a mother of five children in the Anchorage School District (ASD), an ASD graduate, an ASD educator, and the Education Chair for the Alaska NAACP Tri-State Area Conference. I am writing to express my strong support for HB 69 because Alaska's students deserve adequate, consistent, and equitable funding for their education.

The Alaska Constitution, Article 7, Section 1, mandates that we establish and maintain a public school system open to all children. That means every student whether they live in Anchorage or Bethel must have access to the resources, teachers, and opportunities they need to succeed. Yet today, too many of our schools lack proper materials, adequate training, and enough staff to meet student needs. Overcrowded classrooms and teacher shortages persist because education funding has not kept up with rising costs.

HB 69 is a critical step toward stabilizing school funding by increasing the Base Student Allocation (BSA) and tying it to inflation. This will allow our schools to keep pace with real costs, ensuring students have:

Qualified teachers who stay in their schools

Up-to-date materials and technology

Purposeful training and professional development for educators

However, while HB 69 addresses inflationary adjustments, it must also reflect the unique and complex realities of Alaska's educational landscape. Rural schools often face disproportionately higher costs due to factors such as transportation, housing for educators, and access to resources. The bill uses the Consumer Price Index for urban Alaska, but rural districts experience even steeper cost increases due to geographic isolation and limited infrastructure. Adding a rural cost adjustment would ensure funding accounts for these unique challenges.

# 2. Targeted Support for Underserved Communities:

Rural schools often serve higher proportions of Alaska Native students and communities facing systemic inequities. Increased funding should be accompanied by resources to support culturally responsive education, teacher retention, and wraparound services that address the social-emotional needs of students.

## 3. Equity Monitoring and Accountability:

To ensure the funding truly benefits underserved students, I recommend creating mechanisms to evaluate how these increases impact rural and urban schools differently. Transparent reporting can help guide future adjustments and ensure this bill delivers on its promise of equitable funding.

The Time to Act Is Now

Our children only get one shot at their education and they cannot afford to

wait while we debate whether their schools should receive adequate funding. Investing in education is investing in Alaska's future workforce, economy, and communities. Underfunding schools today means fewer opportunities for students tomorrow.

HB 69 is a step in the right direction, but it must be fine-tuned to ensure education adequacy between rural and urban schools. Alaska's children cannot afford for us to kick this can down the road. If we believe in Alaska's future, we must invest in it starting with our students.

I listened online to the presentation by Superintendent Clayton Holland on Monday to the Senate Education Committee. I believe he mentioned the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District was facing an 18-million-dollar funding deficit.

Today I appreciated the testimony of Cody McKenna, the principal at Aurora Borealis charter school. He covered many of the items on my list.

Funding for public education in Alaska must increase. It should be adequate, timely, and consistent. We are no longer able to attract and retain quality educators in our community. I have witnessed the steady decline of programs and opportunities in our schools due to lack of funding and/or staffing issues.

I object to the idea that we are "throwing money" at education. I can only speak for myself and our district when I say every dollar is accounted for in the annual budget.

I also object to the idea that education is not meeting "performance standards." For example, last night I caught some of Governor Dunleavy's address to the state. He recognized the significant gains Kindergarten students have made in the implementation of the Alaska Reads Act. I wish I could give you my ideas for where to move money around to pay for this necessary increase to school funding. At the municipal level, we have revenues that are tied to our citizens and the base services we provide. Unfortunately, you're extra challenged at the state without similar ties of a tax base to support the state's constitutional obligations, and we continue to do less with less.

Our school district here in the Kenai Peninsula Borough has stretched and reduced year over year over year. There could absolutely be plenty of improvements, and we also have been in a budget crisis since the year my oldest child entered school. I hear regularly that our district administration is bloated. I ask you - if you have a company of over 1,000 employees that stretches an area the size of West Virginia with a mandate to serve over 8,000 students — what is the lower level of administration that you can imagine? How many people does it take to do payroll, ensure curriculum and policies are implemented correctly, answer HR questions, track finances and budgets? Theoretically, DEED could be working with all school districts to assess and understand administrative overhead, create some benchmarks and plans for adjustment as necessary, and truly accept and support the need for actual administration of any programs. Here at KPBSD, in my experience as a parent the District administration has crossed below that lower level with barely enough human bodies to run the programs it's charged with on behalf of our kids.

Neighborhood schools are the cornerstone of our public education system. When you look to buy a home, the rankings of your neighborhood schools are what show up. If we want a strong economy in Alaska, we need working families, and to have working families we need strong and supported neighborhood, brick and mortar schools. They are the one school choice that can never go away, and the one school choice that every single parent in the state of Alaska has the constitutional right to enroll their children and expect those kids' needs to be met. Testimony regarding HB 69 Randy Trani

Superintendent of the Matanuska Susitna Borough School District

I am Randy Trani, the proud superintendent of the Mat-Su Borough School District. Thank you for your service to Alaska. I recognize the challenges you face with prioritizing spending of limited resources.

In the Mat-Su we start meetings with good things. I would like to share some good things from the Mat-Su School District. We are celebrating the highest combined graduation rate for a 4-year period this century, we produced more Career Technical Education Concentrators than ever, and more college credit for our graduates ever. The Mat-Su, like the rest of the state, leverages resources for the good of students and their families.

Currently we are budgeting presuming that the one-time \$680 is maintained. This leaves a \$22 Million deficit or approximately 8%. IF the one-time dollars are not replaced the deficit grows to more than \$45 million or approximately 17%.

Our biggest challenge is not knowing how to plan for next year to continue our amazing academic growth. Year to year uncertainty is disruptive to producing academic growth.

Let me give you one example. Later today we will meet to begin to decide if we will offer summer school this year. We need to have this meeting now because we have no certainty regarding funding levels. If we proceed now with the planning and hiring for summer school programs and funding levels are low, we will have retained summer programs only to cut school year core programs. However, if preemptively cut summer school and funding levels materialize late in the state budgeting process, we will have unnecessarily removed critical support for struggling students who take advantage of summer school.

In summary the Mat-Su produces outstanding academic outcomes. But we need certainty in our funding levels so we can continue to grow our academic success. This bill would still leave a shortfall of about \$11 Million dollars or about 4% of our budget. But if passed quickly and supported by the executive branch we would have the certainty we need to continue to do great things for kids.

Thank you for all your work! I am optimistic that your combined leadership will help provide a consistent, predictable, reasonable funding level, so schools across the Valley and our state can build stable programming that supports academic growth for our most important resources... our kids.

Hello and thank you in advance for your time.

My name is Tabitha Voeller, I am a parent of two children with disabilities who attend Anchorage public schools, and I work as a substitute Paraprofessional in a Title 1 school for the Anchorage School District. We personally experience a lot of challenges, but are extremely grateful for the educators and staff who support our children, we know they work very hard to provide a safe learning environment.

I write to you today asking that you please support HB 69. Right now our schools are threatened not only by underfunding from the state of Alaska, but now the federal government as well, therefore, state support is more important than ever. I have been working in a kindergarten classroom with 27 students, seven of these students have IEPs (individualized education program). My understanding is that this school does not have the resources to split the class into two separate classrooms. These are five to six year old children - that is a lot of children of this age without any additional needs! The level of need is high, students come to school unprepared. Behavioral issues distract the entire class which affects learning for all of the students. Many will argue that this is a "parent" issue, not a school or government issue, but I believe this is a much larger systemic issue. The economic and social climate of our country has the majority of our families feeling extremely strained, they are overwhelmed and trying to survive - and that is no different for most Alaskan families. We see these conditions reflected in the children in our classrooms- students that depend on free lunch programs, students who need additional nurturing and support, students who require special programs due to disabilities.

To meet the needs of our schools, adequate and full funding is imperative to provide each school with the resources - trained staff, equipment, and materials - that they need. We want to retain and continue acquiring eager and qualified educators. Our educators are under immense pressure and are doing the best they can to support students in the myriad of ways they are needed. I am in awe of the patience and selflessness our current educators and staff bring to the table, but it isn't right, no one should be responsible for that level of stress. Under the existing socioeconomic conditions our most vulnerable families are struggling and yet it is the children and schools who are penalized.

Please take the time to really consider ALL Alaskans in your decision, supporting HB 69 and continuing to fully fund education in years to come can help us develop stronger communities and a stronger future for Alaska.

As a parent, I've seen firsthand how vital education programs can be to the success of our children. We need to provide our schools with the funding they need to meet the growing challenges of inflation, overcrowded classrooms, and diminishing programs to support students of all abilities.

When my son started school, it was a difficult transition. He faced varied challenges that required additional assistance to integrate into the classroom. Fortunately, he was able to access programs that gave him the individualized support he needed to stay on track.

Without those early intervention programs, it's improbable my son would have caught up and kept pace with his peers. Today he is thriving in third grade and is being considered for the district's gifted student program—something unforeseeable just a few short years ago.

Many of these very programs are being stripped from our schools due to lack of funding and support.

We continue to ask our educators to do more with less, but there are limits to what they can accomplish without the support they need. Programs designed to support students at every level are critical to giving every child the chance to succeed.

Next year, my son will enter 4th grade, where class sizes can reach as high as 40 students. It's hard to imagine how any teacher could effectively engage with and support each child in such an environment.

We cannot let inflation continue to outpace the funding. We cannot continue making it harder for teachers to give individual attention. And we cannot afford to continue stripping programs and services from our schools.

I hear people calling for accountability regarding current funding, but we can't expect progress without taking action. You can't expect a plant to grow if you refuse to water it.

This is not just about numbers or test scores on a page; it's about the future of our children. It's about ensuring that <u>every</u> student, no matter their background or abilities, has access to the education and resources they need to reach their full potential.

By investing in our schools, we are investing in the future of our state.

In my family's 14 years in the district, I have my first kiddo who requires student services. For context, Jacob is legally blind in his left eye, autistic, and has a severe speech delay. Jacob requires frequent check-in's with a safe adult to help mediate his academics and help him regulate behaviors.

I am writing to you today to provide advocacy for our most vulnerable students, those with special needs.

Investing in our schools is not merely an expenditure, but an investment in our future. When we fund our education adequately, we create a ripple effect that benefit every aspect of our society. It is time to shift our perspective and recognize funding our schools adequately is not a burden but a necessity.

According to the Department of Education website, as of FY23, just over 15% of students require some form of special services state-wide. Some services are ONLY available via Zoom with a provider out of state because of staffing.

The BSA in Alaska has been flat funded since FY17, though the number of enrolled students has remained roughly the same. If my sources serve me, the national inflation rate averages 2.5% per year.

In FY20, Alaska was ranked 4th in state funding for school districts across the nation.

I am confident in this committee's ability to see the need and importance of services to our most vulnerable students. I am trusting my children's education to you.

At the very least, account for inflation. But at most, see the need for increasing the base funding for Alaskan schools and give our children a fighting chance.

I urge you to vote in support of HB69.

#### Dear Legislatures,

My name is Heather Aruffo and I live in Fairbanks, Alaska. I am here to testify in support of HB 69. I work as a regulatory medical writer in the pharmaceutical industry, as well as own and manage a rental property. I've lived in Alaska since 2016, and my husband, who is a teacher, is a third generation Alaskan. I make a six figure income, and pay property taxes on both our income generating rental property and on our home. My husband and I plan to start a family in the next year and are excited to have children.

I am deeply concerned about the funding situation for schools in this state, especially in five to six years when our first future child will start school. I attended public schools throughout my childhood, as did my husband, and my husband and I fully intend to send our children to public schools given the lackluster quality of the private schools in Fairbanks. Additionally, I am not willing to chance my childrens education on a charter school lottery. I am deeply concerned that my future children will be cheated out of the quality public education they are owed according to the state constitution. I am unwilling to compromise my future children's education and limit their earning power by staying in Alaska if this continues to be the case. School funding is an economic issue. More and more high earners will continue to leave or will not come to Alaska in the first place if the schools are not funded to a level commiserate with inflation. To defund public schools is to economically hamstring the state for decades into the future, not only in terms of current jobs but also for future jobs if our graduates do not have the skill sets necessary for professional jobs, jobs in the trades and other jobs that involve business savy, interpersonal skills and a specialized skill set. One of my coworkers, who is also a six figure earner, and a lifelong Alaskan married to a lifelong Alaskan, has already moved to Washington and has no intent of returning to the state due to the constant defunding of schools.

As someone who fully intends to continue to contribute to Alaska's economy, as well as participate in what is a multi billion dollar industry across the United States and provide my children the best possible education, I will not be homeschooling, nor do I believe that diverting money away from public schools in the name of supporting homeschooling, where many parents opt out of required tests and whose quality is impossible to assure or regulate, is within the legislatures best interest. I have heard too many stories from my husband of the uneven quality of homeschooling, including stories of children who are illiterate at 10 years old returning to public school, to think that homeschooling is any kind of solution to this manufactured problem of defunding public schools, which is pushing more and more families

away. The wants of the few should not overrule the needs and constitutional rights of the many. The BSA has not been increased at a rate commiserate with inflation and is unsustainable for schools at its current level of funding.

As the spouse of a teacher, I have seen how teachers are forced to do more and more work without pay. An example of this is the Alaska reads act, which is unfunded. Our teachers have done a heroic job of working without funding to raise the scores of their students, however, we cannot continue to demand that teachers do more and more work without pay. That is a volunteer position, not a career, and teaching is a career that in the past provided stable, decently paid jobs to our economy and communities. Additionally, the lack of pensions for teachers has made it extremely difficult for the school districts to retain teachers who are not on the tier 1 or tier 2 pension system. At my husband's school, 2/3 of the teachers are on tier 1 or tier 2 pensions, meaning that in the next five to ten years, 2/3 of the teachers will be retired. Teaching is an essential profession, and the profession is losing out on young teachers because of the difficulties associated with one time funding and uncertainty, as well as the lack of pensions and, in Fairbanks, the recent increase in insurance costs. Teaching is a profession that should be respected and that requires a full slate of benefits in order to retain professionals who will continue to serve their communities. Spending \$3,000 per teacher per year on insurance is an investment in continued teacher retention, as well as commiserate with what someone with a masters degree working a professional job would be given in the private sector as a benefit. We will have a school system in an even deeper crisis when the last of the tier 2 teachers retire. My husband, before he met me, was considering leaving due to job uncertainty and lack of pension. He was lucky that I had a good job. However, many teachers are not as fortunate.

I strongly urge you to vote yes on HB69 for the future wellbeing of Alaska as well as the present wellbeing. If personal testimony does not move you, I hope that a focus on the numbers, and the economic importance of funding schools will. After all, isn't the essence of conservatism to make our country as economically strong as possible? The Republican Party that my father proudly voted for was a party of profit and economic success. I hope yours is as well.

I am a strong supporter of public school reform including school choice in the form of magnet and charter schools. I am sure that administration efficiency can be improved. I am not questioning that we should always strive for better outcomes for our children and our communities.

- I love living in this state. I have 2 small children and another on the way. I want to ensure they receive a quality education that serves them throughout their lives. I am a professional engineer in this state, and personally oversee over \$20M in federally funded research on energy technologies relevant to Alaska.
- However, if the current trajectory on public education continues, I fear we will join the growing exodus from this state.
- For years, through both action and inaction, our elected leaders have reduced the level of public funding per student on a real basis. I have seen a notable shift in opinions among the "political left" in my community toward being accepting and even enthusiastic about school choice. Perhaps restricting funding has had the intended effect.
- House Bill 69 is a clean and defensible bill to correct the downward trend in education funding in real terms, and to do so gradually over three years.
- I understand concerns about tying the state budget to a CPI index that is outside of our control, but the alternative is to tie our children's and our economy's future to DC's monetary policy. #### INTRODUCTION & PURPOSE

Thank you, Co-Chairs Representative Justin Ruffridge, Representative Jamie Allard, and Members of the House Education Committee for the opportunity to speak on **HB 69** and our urgent need to **demand accountability** in Alaska's education funding. My name is **Judith Eckert**, **M.Ed**. I write to address **overspending**, **untested online curricula and the need for fundamental policy reforms**. I also want to introduce a **collaborative proposal** for the **Elks Drug Awareness Program** (the "PixelPandemic" initiative). This proposal is urgent, as it broadens the Elks' longstanding focus on substance abuse prevention to include **screen-hazard education**, highlighting the concerning links between **excessive screen time**, **dopamine loops**, and the risk of **subsequent addictions**—including gaming, drugs, and alcohol.

### I. WHY ALASKA NEEDS RENEWED ACCOUNTABILITY & REFORM

#### Speaking Out Against HB 69: Without Proper Accountability

•

Simply increasing the Base Student Allocation (BSA) will not solve the core issues in our schools. We must enact fundamental policy changes that require districts to demonstrate how they are using those dollars, particularly regarding online curricula, which often show questionable outcomes and high costs.

#### Overspending on Unvalidated Digital Platforms

•

Many online curricula suffer from "designed obsolescence" and are not statistically tested. Excessive "pixelation" fosters dopamine loops that can harm students

cognitively, socially, and emotionally. In extreme cases, it may contribute to **addictive behaviors**, mirroring the patterns we see in substance abuse.

#### **Calls for a Comprehensive Audit**

•

I respectfully request that this Committee conduct or mandate a **comprehensive audit** of all **online curricular expenditures**—especially those supported by federal funds like ESSER and **Title I**—to evaluate **cost-effectiveness** and **student outcomes**. This audit is crucial to ensure transparency and accountability in our education funding.

#### Hands-On, Community, and Vocational Learning

•

Funding should be **reallocated** toward **hands-on**, **culturally relevant**, **and project-based approaches** that build reading comprehension, critical thinking, and social-emotional resilience—rather than fueling ever-increasing screen reliance.

#### **Support School Choice & Invest in Teachers**

•

**Families deserve options**, mainly if local public schools rely heavily on unvetted digital tools. We must also **invest in high-quality teachers**, providing them with **incentives and training** to reduce teacher turnover and classroom chaos sparked by ill-considered tech mandates.

#### II. OVERVIEW: DRUG AWARENESS

"PIXELPANDEMIC" INITIATIVE This initiative has the potential to significantly improve the mental health and academic performance of our students.

To complement these education reforms, I propose an **expansion** of Drug **Awareness Programs**—dubbed the "PixelPandemic" Initiative—to address **excessive screen time** as a **public health crisis** and a potential **gateway** to other addictions. This initiative aims to engage:

#### A. Rationale & Target Population

#### **Dopamine Loops and "Pixelation"**

Repeated exposure to "gamified" digital content can foster **addiction-like behaviors**. Researchers Dr. Rebecca Jackson, Brain Balance Centers, Nicholas Kardaras Maui Recovery, Hawaii, and Dr. Michael Rich, Harvard, have documented links between screen overuse and **aggression**, **depression**, and compromised social-emotional skills.

#### Military Families in Alaska

•

Alaska has the **highest per capita military population** in the U.S. Family stressors —frequent relocations, extended deployments—exacerbate reliance on digital content, increasing the risk for screen addiction and other mental health challenges.

#### **Public Health & Legal Framework**

•

**CDC** guidance on adolescent mental health highlights the need to address excessive screen time as a **community health priority**.

- **DEA** alignment helps us frame digital addiction within broader **addiction-prevention** strategies.
- **SAMHSA** (Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration) provides national leadership in behavioral health and can help direct resources and best practices to reduce both screen-based and substance addictions.
- **The EEOC** ensures non-discriminatory hiring practices, which is critical for recruiting educators who effectively manage balanced tech integration.
- **FDA** oversight applies when "therapeutic" devices or interventions (e.g., Brain Balance protocols) claim medical benefits and require evidence-based compliance.

#### III. OBJECTIVES & KEY STRATEGIES

Incorporate Screen Addiction Prevention into the Alaska State Elks Drug Awareness Program

**Dual-Focus Education**: Recognize parallels between **substance** and **digital** addictions, emphasizing how dopamine-driven tech can undermine mental health.

Partner with Brain Balance Centers & Professional Learning Communities (PLCs)

**Neuropsych Evaluations & Interventions**: Address ADHD, autism, dyslexia, or other disorders often exacerbated by digital overexposure.

**PLCs via Solution Tree**: Data-driven methods to track reading comprehension, mental health, and screen-time habits, adapting strategies in real time.

#### **EEOC-Compliant Hiring & Curricula**

Bring **qualified educators** trained to integrate tech responsibly, ensuring **inclusive instruction** that does not depend on questionable digital content.

#### Strong Mental Health Referrals & HIPAA-FERPA Compliance

Tools like **Care Solace** can promptly connect students to mental health professionals while respecting **privacy laws**.

**SAMHSA** partnerships could facilitate additional services or funding for counseling and addiction prevention programs.

#### Collaboration with CDC, DEA, DoD, Robert F. Kennedy Jr., and SAMHSA

**Military-Focused Engagement**: Tailor resources for children of active-duty and reservist parents, often in remote Alaskan communities.

**Public Health Synergy**: Align with **CDC** advisories on pediatric well-being; collaborate with **DEA** and **SAMHSA** on community-level awareness of addiction progression.

**Advocacy Role**: Robert F. Kennedy Jr. could serve as a public-facing advocate, raising awareness of the "PixelPandemic."

#### IV. THREE-MINUTE PUBLIC COMMENT

Good afternoon, Members of the House Education Committee, President Trump's Transition Team, DEA, DoD Officials, CDC Experts, SAMHSA Representatives, and Esteemed Guests:

My name is **Judith Eckert, M.Ed.**, and I urge you to **expand our substance abuse prevention initiatives** to address what I call the **"PixelPandemic"**—a crisis of excessive screen time leading to dopamine loops, gaming addiction, and other mental health risks. Dr. Rebecca Jackson, BrainBalance, Nicholas Kardaras, a neuropsychologist, and Dr. Michael Rich, M.D., conducted the research. Harvard Mediatrician confirms the alarming effects of digital overuse, from increased anxiety to diminished reading comprehension. This is not a problem we can afford to ignore.

In **Alaska**, where military families abound and Native communities face some of the nation's highest suicide rates, children already contending with Autism, Dyslexia, ADHD, or other needs cannot afford further harm from unvalidated digital tools. Prolonged lockdowns and the push toward more screen-based curricula have only magnified these risks.

We can foster real solutions by **partnering** with Brain Balance Centers, rolling out **Professional Learning Communities** (PLCs), and forming a collaborative network with **the CDC**, **DEA**, **SAMHSA**, **DoD**, and tech innovators. **EEOC** oversight ensures we hire qualified educators. **FDA** compliance guarantees that therapeutic claims adhere to evidence-based standards. Finally, **HIPAA/FERPA** protections ensure student privacy as they receive the desperately needed interventions.

I call upon the National Elks, President Trump's Transition Team, and Robert F. Kennedy Jr. to champion these pilot programs in Alaska and Hawaii, where the stakes are highest. Let us protect our Native Alaskan, civilian, and military children by ensuring they grow up in a balanced, healthy environment, free from the harms of unregulated digital overexposure.

#### **Better Allocation of Education Funds**

Instead of pouring money into **HB 69** increases for the BSA without strings attached, we can **tie funding** to responsible, evidence-based programs. We can audit digital expenditures and demand improvement in authentic literacy and mental health metrics.

#### **School Choice & Empowered Parents**

**Correspondence schools** and other choice-based models allow parents to opt out of tech-saturated classrooms that may harm their children's progress or well-being.

#### **Teacher Investment**

Attract and retain **high-quality teachers** who combine **research-backed practices** with controlled, purposeful technology use rather than relying on half-baked software or "designed obsolescence" e-textbooks.

#### Legal & Ethical Compliance

Align with **IDEA**, **Section 504**, **ADA** (particularly in light of **Perez v. Sturgis Public Schools**), ensuring that children in special education are not "pushed online" without robust, in-person support.

Integrate **SAMHSA** guidelines to coordinate mental health services and

#### Phase 1: Coalition Building & Funding

•

Engage the **Drug Awareness Program**, philanthropic tech leaders (Musk, Zuckerberg, Bezos), and others to fund pilot Brain Balance Centers and PLC training in Alaska and Hawaii.

Collaborate with CDC, DoD, DEA, and SAMHSA to address public health and military-family needs.

#### **Phase 2: Pilot Program Launch**

Integrate **screen-limiting measures**, Brain Balance interventions, and PLC best practices in select school districts, Solutions Tree, prioritizing areas with high special education, military, and Native Alaskan family populations.

Track outcomes in **academic performance**, **social-emotional well-being**, and **reduced screen reliance**.

#### Phase 3: Assessment & Nationwide Replication

Evaluate pilot results against **FDA** standards for any therapeutic claims.

Refine the approach for national expansion under the **National Elks Drug Awareness** umbrella, continuing to align with **DEA**, **SAMHSA**, **EEOC**, **HIPAA**, **FERPA**, and relevant court precedents.

#### **CONCLUSION & CALL TO ACTION**

In closing, **Alaska** must be at the forefront of **transforming education funding** and addressing the **Pixel Pandemic** crisis. My testimony calls on the Legislature to:

1.

Reject HB 69 (as currently structured) or significantly amend it to require accountability before increasing the BSA.

- Conduct a comprehensive audit of online curricular spending and demand evidence-based programs.
- Embrace the Elks Drug Awareness Program "PixelPandemic" Initiative to combat screen addiction and its link to broader substance abuse, starting with pilot programs in Alaska and Hawaii.
- We should support school choice, invest in teachers, and ensure all policy changes comply with the mental health and substance abuse prevention guidelines set by IDEA, Section 504, the ADA, the EEOC, the FDA, HIPAA, FERPA, and SAMHSA.

By safeguarding student mental health and insisting on **responsible**, **scientifically validated** educational practices, we can secure a **brighter**, **more resilient future** for Alaska's children, including those from our cherished Native and military communities.
