BILL NO. SB 229

Analysis

This bill creates a new type of protective order for gun violence. The bill allows peace officers or household members who reasonably believe a person is a danger to self or others by having a firearm to petition the court for a gun violence protective order.

The bill requires the law enforcement agency to retain any surrendered firearms or ammunition until the gun violence protective order expires, and then requires the agency to return the firearms and ammunition to the respondent.

The Department of Public Safety (DPS) will need to make programming changes to the central registry of protective orders to accept and process the gun violence protective orders. This programming will require a contractor to do the work as the department programming staff do not have the skill set needed to program the legacy mainframe system. The department will require four to six months to complete programming once the court provides a copy of the forms to be used for the gun protective orders. Costs are estimated at \$140 per hour and 400 hours to perform the programming changes at a cost of \$56,000.
