STATE OF ALASKA 2025 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Analysis

Harbors and state waters are littered with derelict vessels and finding owners can prove difficult at times for harbor masters and appropriate law enforcement. In 2018, the Alaska State Legislature passed the Derelict Vessels Act (SB92) which put stronger tracing controls on boats plying Alaska waters. The legislation inadvertently required vessels with a valid certificate of documentation with the United States Coast Guard to register with the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV). However, commercial fishing vessels are registered with the Alaska Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission (CFEC), and CFEC can help track down owners if necessary.

The original bill created a duplicative registration requirement, which CFEC estimates the number of vessels affected at 4,700 annually. This legislation does away with the duplicative registration but does not have any other programmatic or fiscal impact on CFEC. Thereby, the commission submits a zero fiscal note.
