
Alaska's Growing Senior Population

- Alaska 65+ grew by 63% between 2012-2022*
- Nationally the senior population average growth in the same period was 35%

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


RET16. Do you plan on living in Alaska during your retirement years full-time, part-time, or not at all?




Three-quarters (75%) of Alaska adults age 45+ plan on living in Alaska full-time during retirement, up significantly from 2020.


Plans to Live in Alaska in Retirement

Home and Community-Based Care

Saves Money



An estimated 1/3 of the people who are age 85 and older suffer from dementia.

How should the State of Alaska care for those who are unable to care for themselves? Compare the costs of care at home versus the costs in a facility:

Home and Community-	HCB Care through the	Care in a Nursing Home
Based (HCB) Grants at	Alaskans Living	(Skilled Nursing Facility)
home with Family	Independently Waiver*	
\$74 per month	\$3,778 per month	\$11,939 per month
\$893 per year per person	\$45,338 per year per person	\$143,263 per year per patient

Consider other advantages of Home and Community-Based Care in addition to the vast cost savings:

- The older adult can remain with dignity in his/her own home and community;
- Alaskan family caregivers are given support to continue providing unpaid care;
- Meals, rides, adult day, case management, respite, chore services safeguard elders from injury and deterioration which lead to premature costly institutionalization.

Senior & Disability Services Grant Programs

Community grants that serve older Alaskans include:

- Nutrition, Transportation & Support: (NTS) home delivered and congregate meals, transportation, information & referrals (I&R).
- Adult Day: 12 adult day programs keep seniors in safe, active and monitored day program
- Senior In Home: case management, chore & respite services
- Family Caregiver Support: support for unpaid family caregivers-respite, information & referral (I&R),
 Lifeline, counseling, group support, caregiver training
- **Health Promotion & Disease Prevention**: fall prevention, and health and safety in the home.
- ADRD: Alzheimer's disease and dementia education, counseling, support groups.
- Medicare Counseling and Outreach: coordination of Medicare outreach, counseling, and referral
- Center for Independent Living Grants: Skills training, individual advocacy, peer support, nursing and ALH transitions assistance. 47% of all CIL grant services are provided to individuals 60 and older.
- Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) and Developmental Disability Resource
 Connection (DDRC): Provide the front door to SDS services with I&R, short term assistance and

What is Long Term Care (LTC)?

 Quality of Care for individuals provided by a nursing home or an assisted living home

What is an Ombudsman?

- Swedish word meaning representative of the people
- An official appointed to investigate individuals' complaints against maladministration


