Village Public Safety Officers (VPSOs)

- VPSO is an established division, revitalized since 2018 to grow and strengthen this important work
- Salaries for VPSOs have been significantly improved
- VPSO staffing increased from 40 in 2020 to 92 in 2024
- DPS is committed to adding additional VPSOs until every village that wants a VPSO has one

Investigators in Western Alaska

- Established the first Major Crimes Unit in Western Alaska
 - Four Investigators
- Shortened response time for homicides and acute sexual assault for investigators
- Established Yukon-Kuskokwim Child Abuse Investigative Unit in 2024
 - Four Investigators

Missing & Murdered Indigenous Persons

- 2021 DPS hires first MMIP Investigator
- 2021 Governor's People First Initiative
- 2023 Increased to four MMIP Investigators
- 2023 DPS publishes the first Alaska specific MMIP Data Report
- 2023 DPS mandates NamUS entries for all missing persons
- 2024 DPS begins cultural awareness training with MMIP focus

Missing & Murdered Indigenous Persons Data

- 345 Missing Alaska Natives, American Indians, or Unknown Race
- 77% Environmental Factors
- 5% Suspicious

Hired two dedicated Tribal Liaisons within DPS

 Attended dozens of community meetings, listening sessions, townhall meetings, and public safety summits with Tribes and Villages
