# **Sponsor Statement: Senate Concurrent Resolution 4**

# Mental Health Month; Tardive Dyskinesia Awareness Week

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4 recognizes the urgent need to bring awareness to the mental health crisis affecting thousands of Alaskans and their families. By designating May 2025 as Mental Health Awareness Month and May 4–10, 2025, as Tardive Dyskinesia Awareness Week, this resolution seeks to promote understanding, reduce stigma, and support those affected by mental illness and related conditions.

In Alaska, more than 108,000 adults are living with mental health conditions such as depression, bipolar disorder, and schizophrenia. Among our youth, more than 8,000 experience depression—yet the majority are not receiving the care they need. Our state also faces an alarming suicide rate, ranking second in the nation per capita. These statistics underscore the urgent need for public awareness, early intervention, and accessible mental health services.

Mental illness does not discriminate. It touches every community, regardless of age, race, or background. Moreover, conditions like tardive dyskinesia—often a side effect of long-term antipsychotic treatment—affect hundreds of thousands nationwide yet remain underdiagnosed and misunderstood.

Through this resolution, we aim to shine a light on these critical issues and foster a culture of compassion, education, and proactive care. Let us come together to build a mental health system that supports healing, dignity, and hope for all Alaskans.

#### **A RESOLUTION**

- 1 Designating May 2025 as Mental Health Awareness Month; and designating May 4 10,
- 2 2025, as Tardive Dyskinesia Awareness Week.

#### 3 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

- 4 WHEREAS one in five adults in the United States experiences a mental illness each
- 5 year, and it is estimated that over 108,000 adults in the state have a mental health condition,
- 6 such as major depression, bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, and a growing number of other
- 7 debilitating behavioral health conditions; and
- 8 WHEREAS one in six youths aged 6 17 in the United States experiences a mental
- 9 health disorder each year; and
- 10 WHEREAS, according to the United States Centers for Disease Control and
- 11 Prevention, the peak age of onset of a mental health disorder is adolescence and early
- adulthood, with half of all mental health conditions beginning by age 14, and 75 percent by
- 13 age 24; and
- 14 **WHEREAS** it is estimated that over 8,000 youths in the state aged 12 17 experience
- depression, 62.9 percent of whom did not receive care in the last year; and
- WHEREAS high school students with significant symptoms of depression are more

2	WHEREAS more than half of the individuals in the United States with mental health									
3	conditions did not receive treatment last year; and									
4	WHEREAS, with residents of the state struggling to receive needed mental health									
5	care, 29,000 adults in the state did not receive the care last year, with cost being the reason for									
6	which over 42 percent of those individuals did not receive the care; and									
7	WHEREAS 377,470 residents of the state live in communities that do not have									
8	enough mental health professionals; and									
9	WHEREAS anyone is susceptible to experiencing mental health difficulties, just as									
10	anyone is susceptible to physical health issues and emergencies; and									
11	WHEREAS, according to the National Alliance on Mental Illness, one in four									
12	patients receiving long-term treatment with an antipsychotic medication will experience									
13	tardive dyskinesia; and									
14	WHEREAS tardive dyskinesia affects approximately 600,000 people in the United									
15	States, and nearly 70 percent of Americans living with tardive dyskinesia have not yet been									
16	diagnosed; and									
17	WHEREAS, although tardive dyskinesia may look or feel different from day to day, it									
18	is a chronic condition and symptoms may be persistent; and									
19	WHEREAS one in eight emergency department visits in the United States is related									
20	to mental illness or substance use disorder; and									
21	WHEREAS suicide is a public health problem and leading cause of death in the									
22	United States; and									
23	WHEREAS the state ranks second in the nation in suicides per capita, suicide is the									
24	second leading cause of death for individuals between the ages of 10 and 34 in the state, and,									
25	on average, one person dies by suicide every 48 hours in the state; and									
26	WHEREAS it is more important than ever to build a stronger mental health system									
27	that provides the care, support, and services needed to help people build better lives; and									
28	WHEREAS the state of an individual's mental health affects the individual's ability to									
29	navigate the environment and societal relationships, adapt to changing situations, and develop									
30	healthy coping strategies; and									
31	WHEREAS addressing complicated mental health needs with coordinated,									

than twice as likely to drop out as students without symptoms of depression; and

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1	comprehensive mental health services provides a lifeline for families and individuals
2	struggling with the complex process of locating appropriate treatment; and
3	WHEREAS residents of the state must work together to overcome and eliminate the
4	discrimination and stigma that may deter individuals from seeking consistent support and

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adequate mental health treatment;

- **BE IT RESOLVED** that the Alaska State Legislature encourages all residents of the state to recognize those affected by mental health issues and the important role that support, acceptance, and mental health services play in enriching the lives of the residents of the state; and be it
- FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alaska State Legislature designates May 4 10, 2025, as Tardive Dyskinesia Awareness Week; and be it
- FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alaska State Legislature designates May 2025 as
  Mental Health Awareness Month.

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**1 in 5 U.S. adults** experience mental illness each year.



**108,000 adults** in Alaska have a mental health condition.



It is more important than ever to build a stronger mental health system that provides the care, support and services needed to help people build better lives.





More than half of Americans report that COVID-19 has had a negative impact on their mental health.

In February 2021, **43.1% of adults in Alaska** reported symptoms of **anxiety or depression.** 

26.5% were unable to get needed counseling or therapy.



**1 in 20 U.S. adults** experience serious mental illness each year.

In Alaska, **28,000 adults** have a serious mental illness.



1 in 6 U.S. youth aged 6–17 experience a mental health disorder each year.

**8,000 Alaskans** age 12–17 have depression.

## Alaskans struggle to get the help they need.



More than half of people with a mental health condition in the U.S. did not receive any treatment in the last year.

Of the **29,000 adults in Alaska who did** not receive needed mental health care,

42.1% did not because of cost.

11.5% of people in the state are uninsured.



Alaskans are over 2x more likely to be forced out-of-network for mental health care than for primary health care — making it more difficult to find care and less affordable due to higher out-of-pocket costs.

**377,740** people in Alaska live in a community that does not have enough mental health professionals.

# An inadequate mental health system affects individuals, families and communities.



**High school students** with depression are more than **2x more likely to drop out** than their peers.

**62.9% of Alaskans** age 12–17 who have depression **did not receive any care** in the last year.



1,949 people in Alaska are homeless and 1 in 8 live with a serious mental illness.



On average, 1 person in the U.S. dies by suicide every 11 minutes.

In Alaska, **184 lives were lost to suicide** and 31,000 adults had thoughts of suicide in the last year.

# 1 in 4 people with a serious mental illness has been arrested


by the police at some point in their lifetime –



leading to over **2 million jail bookings** of people with serious mental illness each year.

About **2 in 5 adults** in jail or prison have a history of mental illness.





**7 in 10 youth** in the juvenile justice system have a mental health condition.
