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FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA 2025 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Analysis

Senate Bill 17 creates a new crime, classified as a Class A misdemeanor, if a person knowingly sells, offers to sell, installs, or reinstalls a replacement airbag in a vehicle, if that airbag does not comply with federal safety regulations, is counterfeit or non-functioning, or has features that conceal that it is counterfeit or non-functioning. Similarly, the bill creates a new Class A misdemeanor for knowingly manufacturing such a device. And the offense becomes a Class C felony if the conduct leads to a death or serious physical injury.
This legislation may lead to an increase in the number of misdemeanor and felony filings in the court system, but the impact is not anticipated to be great, and the court anticipates will be able to absorb the new cases without fiscal impact.

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
