Analysis

HB 232 allows minors, aged 16 and older, who provide documentation they are either an unaccompanied homeless minor or a minor living apart from their parent or legal guardian, and who are managing their own financial affairs, regardless of the source or extent of income, to seek and provide their own consent for behavioral and mental health services.

The bill permits up to five outpatient behavioral and mental health treatment sessions without parental consent, with provisions for continued treatment if obtaining parental consent would be detrimental to the minor's well-being.

Additionally, the bill clarifies that parents are not financially responsible for services obtained under these provisions.

These changes would affect the Department of Family and Community Services; however, they would not increase or decrease any costs incurred by the department.
