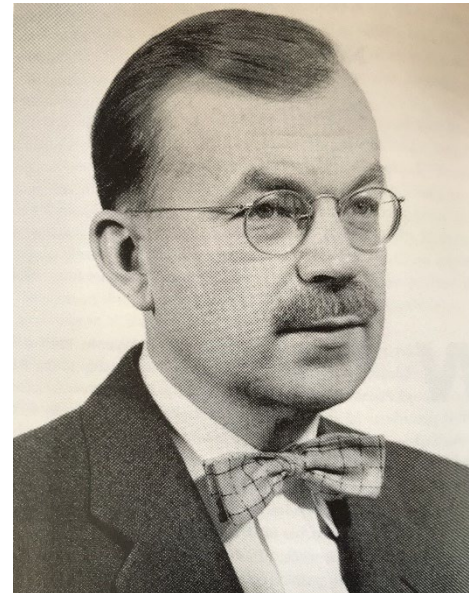
OUR HISTORY

- Swedish missionaries Jenny Olson and E.A. Rasmuson met in Yakutat and married in 1905.
- Jenny creates Rasmuson Foundation in 1955 with \$3,000 and names her son, Elmer, the first board chair.
- The first grant is \$125 to the Wasilla Presbyterian Church to purchase a motion picture projector.
- Surpassed \$500 million in grantmaking in 2023.

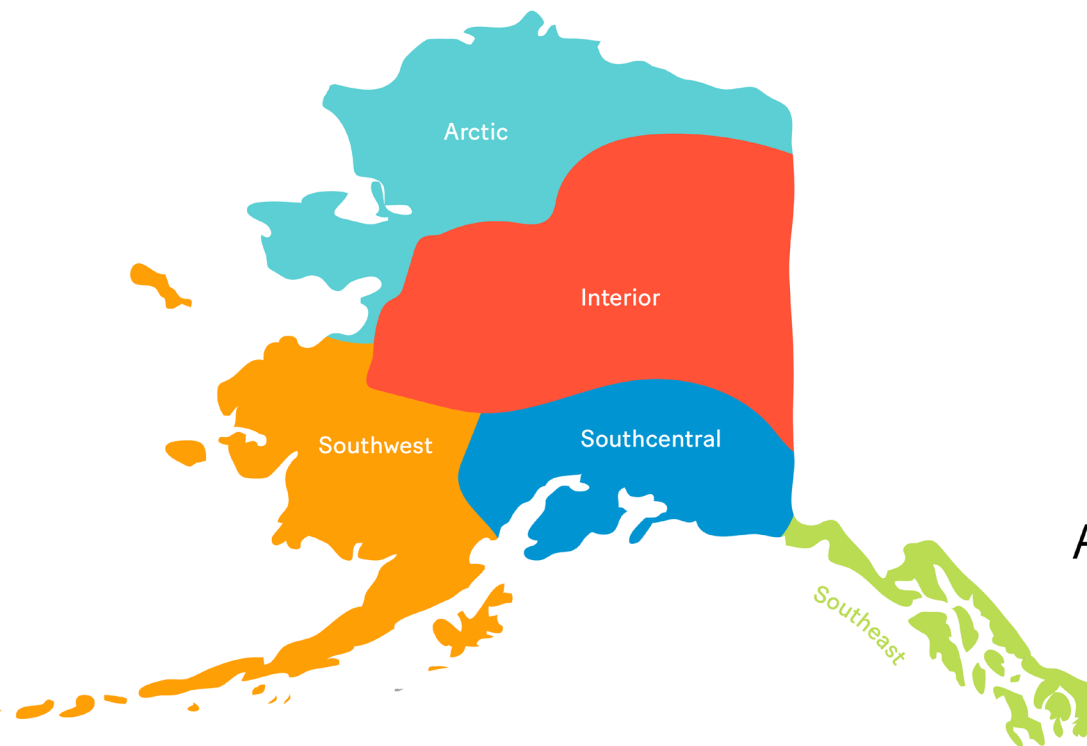

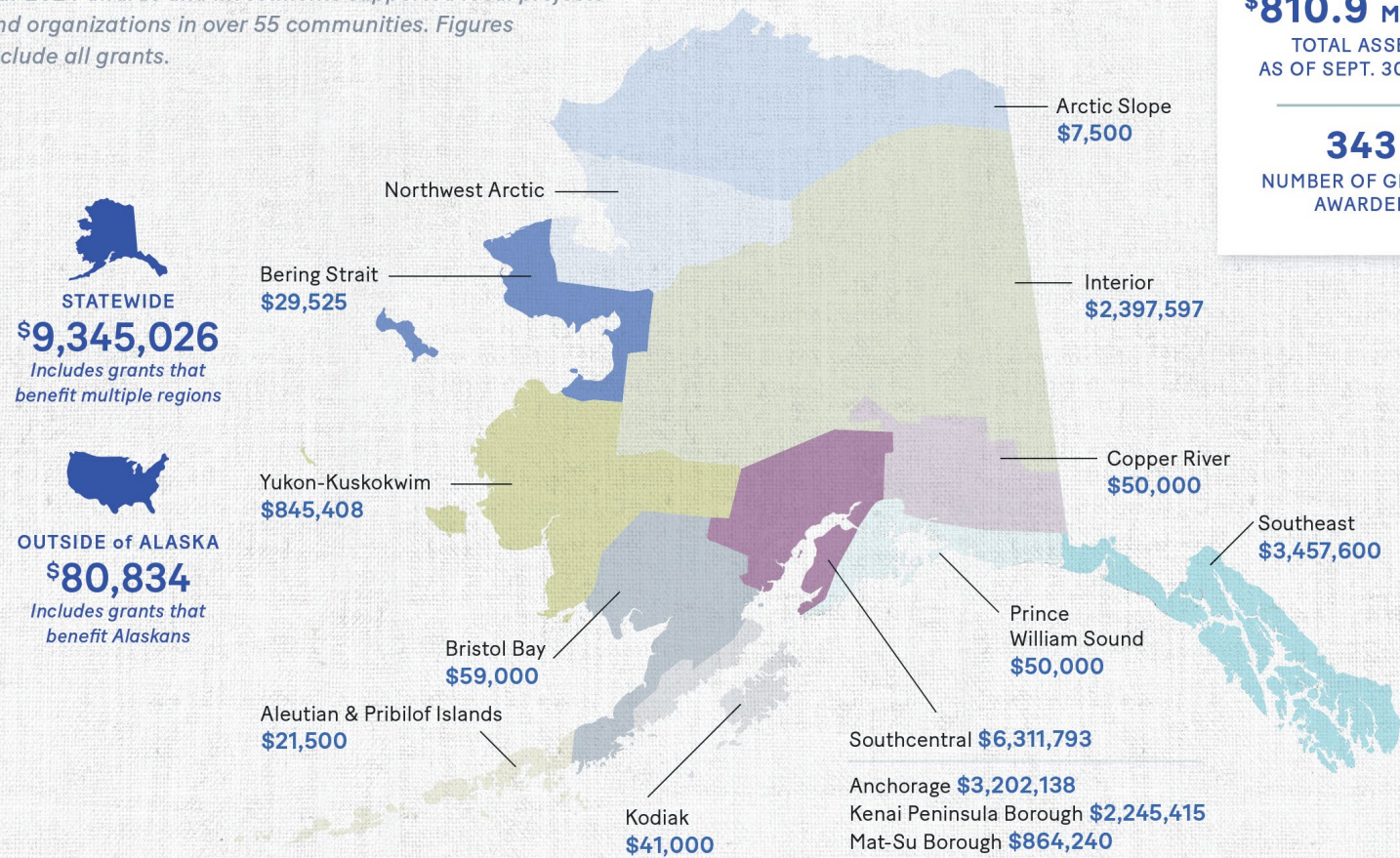

INVEST: Core & Strategic Grantmaking Highlights

Tier 1

This program primarily supports small capital projects and one-time investments. The maximum award amount is \$35,000.

Meals on Wheels delivers freshly cooked and hot meals to Sterling area seniors five days a week. A Tier 1 grant of \$33,640 supported the purchase of a delivery vehicle.

Food security, environmental stewardship, workforce development, and collaborative governance are top of mind for Ahnita Intertribal Resource Commission, a collective that represents eight federally recognized Tribes and two Alaska Native regional corporations in the Ahnita Territory. A grant of \$35,000 supported the purchase of a delivery vehicle that would include food processing facilities, an environmental stewardship program, and an environmental stewardship program.

Community Support

Legacy

New in 2024, the Legacy grant is the Foundation's large grant program, providing awards of more than \$250,000, for capital projects, programs of strategic importance, and innovative solutions to issues of community or statewide importance.

Juneau Housing First Collaborative opened Forget-Me-Not Manor with 23 units of permanent supportive housing in 2017. In its second construction phase, the manor doubled in size to accommodate 64 units. Continuing its mission to end homelessness and achieve equity, health, and dignity through housing, connection to services, and community, the nonprofit is now in the process of adding an additional 28 units. The collaborative received a Legacy grant of \$500,000 toward the construction of phase three.

Program-Related Investments

Program-related investments, or PRIs, refer to a collection of financial instruments that can support a charitable project or activity. Usually structured as loans, PRIs also can be equity investments, linked deposits or loan guarantees.

Strategic Grantmaking

Strategic grantmaking includes our long-term investments that create systems-level change through partnership and collaboration with communities. In 2024, the Board of Directors approved a \$5 million award to the University of Alaska as an early investor in its Arctic Leadership Initiative. Grants also benefited efforts to end homelessness and advance the Alaska Long Trail.

In Our Backyard is an Anchorage nonprofit that came together to build the city's first small shelter village for adults experiencing homelessness. The six tiny homes provide transitional housing for adults ages 50 and older. The project was supported with a \$100,000 Foundation Homelessness Initiative grant.

Across the state, more than \$2.6 million was invested in efforts to end homelessness, including projects to expand the statewide coordinated entry system and funding to increase housing in Fairbanks by updating blighted and vacant properties.

Build 12 small cabins to provide transitional housing for unhoused residents of Sitka.

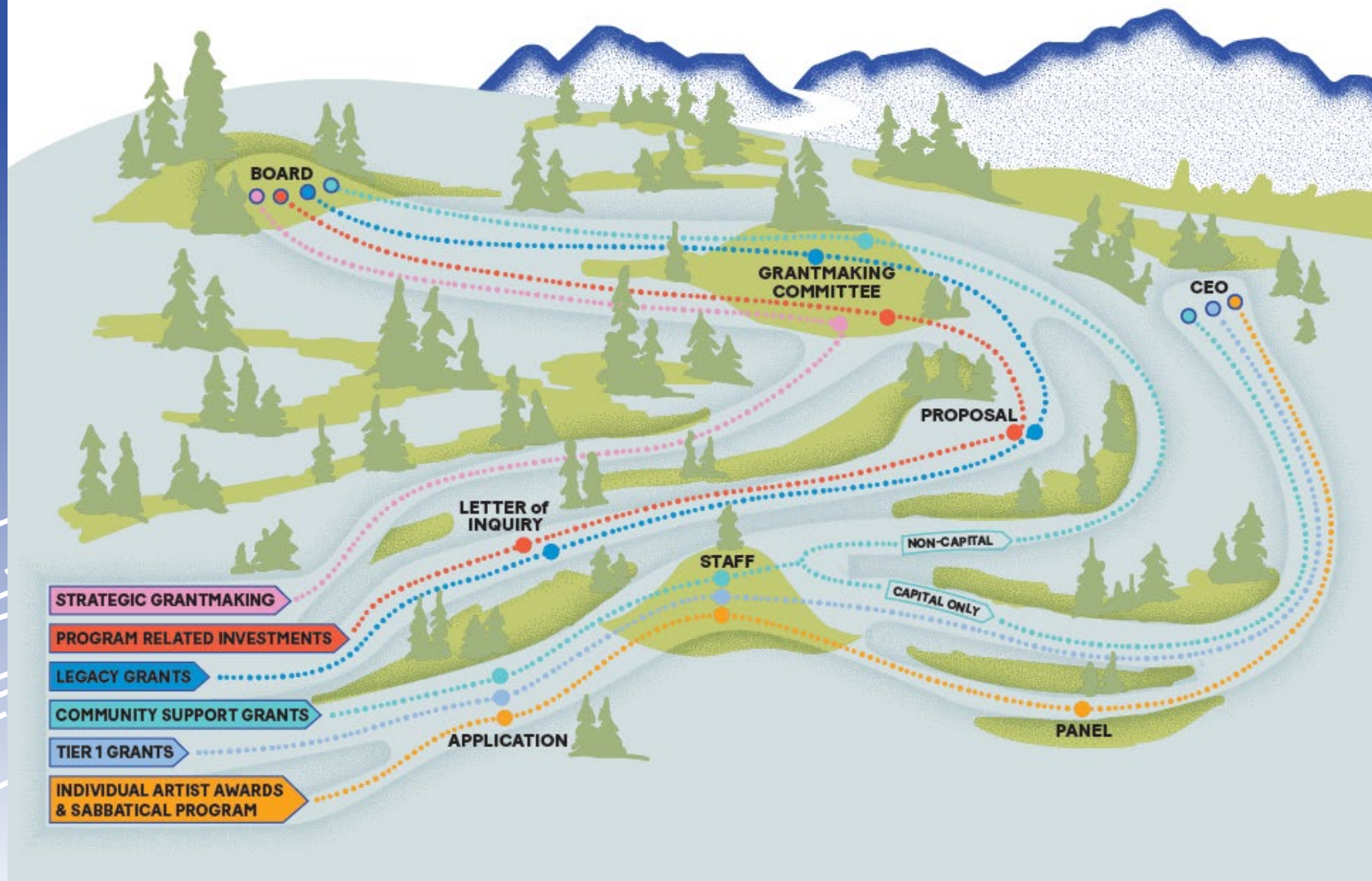
