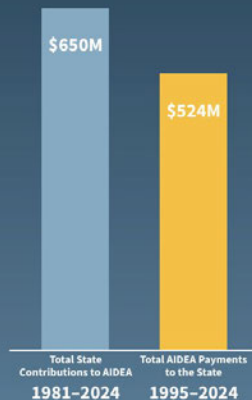

[This is the link to the report AIDEA has made public](#), which is a 16-page executive summary, and not the full report. I urge you to request the full report be released publicly, as AIDEA spent public funds on it. I would also like to highlight this graphic on page 14 (screenshot below). It shows that the "big dividends" AIDEA always refers to are \$126 million *less* than the amount of money the state has provided to AIDEA, meaning AIDEA's direct returns are a net negative to the state. This Northern Economics report was commissioned by AIDEA in response to this [series of analyses](#) by economists Milt Barker and Gregg Erickson, which showed that AIDEA has not only mostly failed to create jobs or wisely invest state funds, it has cost Alaskans billions of dollars.

AIDEA has received a total of \$650.2 million from the state of Alaska over the last 44 years from Fiscal Year (FY) 1981 to FY 2024. Of this total, \$350.1 Million (54%) came in the form of assets/liabilities and pre-existing loans issued by State of Alaska entities other than AIDEA, and \$300.1 Million (46%) in the form of direct appropriations from the Alaska Legislature. In addition, AIDEA development activities have resulted in grants and capital contributions of \$220.3

million from entities other than the state of Alaska including the federal government.

In FY 1995, AIDEA provided a \$60 Million "Return on Capital" to the state of Alaska's General Fund. Beginning in FY 1997 and every year since then, AIDEA has provided the state an annual dividend that has averaged \$16.6 million per year. From FY1995 to FY2024, AIDEA has contributed a total of \$524 Million to the state.

Note that while not quantified here, all AIDEA's payments to the state get put into the general fund and are redistributed, generating additional economic activity/multiplier effects.

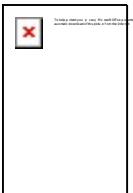

Dear House State Affairs committee,

I'm a mom with two small children and am unable to call in so am submitting the following updates on my previous comments from 2022 included below.

In the time since I submitted those comments below AIDEA has been continuing to provide little notice and does not take public input seriously despite telling the legislature that they do (55:57 in [recording](#)).

I'm extremely concerned with AIDEA's obstruction of public input and incompetence. I've repeatedly been unable to testify during AIDEA board meetings. This happened three times in the just the past year.

During Randy Rauro's presentation to a Joint State Affairs Committee on Apr. 1, 2025 he said "It's interesting, we don't get many people showing up to provide public comment" (47:56 in [recording](#)). What he did not say is that there were many people, including myself, who called in to testify and were prevented from doing so due to a "tech glitch." They invited us to try again at the next board meeting, which I tried to do but was not permitted to I even though I went in person. I was told I couldn't talk about things not on that meeting's agenda, even though the topic I was there to speak about was in fact on the agenda.

The absolute most egregious experience I had was on April 16, 2025 when I tried twice on the phone and twice in person and once again was unable to provide my public comment. Let me paint the picture: I was very pregnant and had just dropped my older child at preschool early so I could call in from the parking lot at 9am on the dot while I drove to the AIDEA office...I was unable to comment from the phone or in person despite trying twice both ways and I still have not received any response to my direct question regarding if there is still a Department of Law representative providing oversight of AIDEA board meetings.

Meanwhile AIDEA has continued to approve millions of dollars in public funds on projects that do not have any proven economic value to Alaskans.

AIDEA does not have authority to spend Alaskans' money however they want.

The state legislature needs to exercise its constitutional right to oversee AIDEA's spending decisions.

I appreciate the opportunity to elaborate on my verbal testimony just now. I'm a lifelong Alaskan and I support HB 271 and encourage you to further strengthen it by adding amendments to address AIDEA's board's illegal overuse of executive sessions.

AIDEA has a terrible track record of violating the Open Meetings Act and has only recently made superficial changes with increased scrutiny. Some examples of AIDEA's complete disregard of public process include: In 2020, the AIDEA board spent 68% of their meetings in executive session. On three occasions, the board spent over 80% of the meeting in executive session. This was up from 2019 when the AIDEA board spent about half of their meetings in executive session. An average of 2-5 days of public notice is not nearly adequate for public decisions of the magnitude and political nature that AIDEA continues to make.

This changes proposed in HB 271 are necessary to ensure that going forward AIDEA play's to its historical strengths as a lender and focuses on issuing loans and bonds for small locally owned businesses and stops making politically-driven investments in which they are the owner and operator of politically controversial projects like the proposed Ambler and West Susitna roads and the leases in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

Oversight is especially needed to ensure AIDEA board member interests aren't swaying their decisions. For example businesses associated with 3 AIDEA Board Members and One Staffer received >\$400,000 in CARES Act Grants. Two AIDEA board members running for public office received \$36,000 In donations from the Energy And Natural Resources Industry. AIDEA board members have donated tens of thousands of dollars to politicians that pushed for oil and gas extraction.

It often appears that the AIDEA board has already made its mind up before they even receive public comments. Public input must inform their decision-making and instead AIDEA it appears that AIDEA is merely conducting damage control and PR, which is not an honest public process. I have personally experienced this numerous times testifying at countless meetings over the last few years.

My first AIDEA board meeting experience was in the early days of the pandemic - AIDEA only gave 3 days' notice for the meeting March 27, 2020 during which AIDEA Board Chair, Dana Pruhs abruptly ended public testimony of people opposing the Ambler Road by saying, "I don't give a shit." The AIDEA board went on to approve \$35 million on the Ambler Road and deny [\\$2.5 million for Alaska's blood bank](#). My second AIDEA meeting was on Dec 23 just before christmas when with less than 48 hours notice I called in despite my power being out due to 80mph winds. I subsequently co-authored two opeds [AIDEA, Alaskans are watching](#) and [AIDEA must diversify Alaska's economy for a resilient future](#).

Lastly, I am forwarding the public comment I submitted to the AIDEA board below to provide specific examples of my experiences of their egregious public process.

Dear AIDEA Staff and Board,

In reviewing the Public Engagement Presentation for your upcoming board meeting I was concerned because there is no mention of your illegal overuse of executive session. The State of Alaska's Open Meetings Act, which requires that decisions made and actions taken by a public entity like AIDEA are public knowledge and genuinely represent the will of the Alaskan public that AIDEA serves. Glossing over a problem doesn't make it go away; changing your operating procedures and real life practices might start to address AIDEA's history of misallocated and secretive investments. Similarly, launching a Public Relations campaign won't make the Green Bank successful; meaningful and genuine stakeholder engagement, which AIDEA has sorely lacked and even scorned in the past, might.

I was pleased to see your first point on slide 4 that a key purpose of public engagement is to "build trust and create stronger relationships." I am heartened by the personal responses I received from Alan Weitzner regarding to a previous public comment and the opportunity to meet with AIDEA's communication director, Colleen Bryan, about my concerns but pointed, executive level attention after heightened public scrutiny and months of comments doesn't address the serious problems with AIDEA's current and past operations.

This novel responsiveness does go a very long way but does not assuage my objection to the actions that AIDEA has taken and continues to take without addressing the public input you have received. A great way to remedy my concern would be to publicly share documentation of AIDEA's use or rejection of factual and other substantive public comments in its project analysis and decisionmaking process. Furthermore, AIDEA needs to implement policies, practices, and bylaws for a robust public process and how it will be conducted so that for example the public knows what you discuss in executive session.

On slide 5, I appreciate that you want to better understand your audience but the purpose of familiarizing yourself with stakeholder values, priorities, and concerns should not be to inform "messaging" (this is public relations). The purpose of gathering this information should be to improve decisions and project outcomes (this is public process as the law requires: actual, genuine public engagement)!

On slide 7, you claim that "Deliberation and action by AIDEA's Board occurs during public session; no decisions are made during executive session" and that "agendas with supporting documentation are posted seven days prior to the next meeting" which has absolutely not been my experience. Historically, AIDEA has been notoriously obtuse and has only recently made changes with increased scrutiny. For example, much of your deliberation on the Arctic Refuge leases occurred in private and the December 23, 2020 meeting was announced with less than 2 days' notice. You also only gave 3 days' notice for the March 27, 2020 meeting when you decided to spend \$35 million on the Ambler Road.

Can you please clarify for me "all steps occurring in the decision-making process" because clearly there's a lot that is decided upon before, during, and after board meetings that the public is absolutely not privy to and do not represent the will of the Alaskan public. I had hoped to be able to comment on the next steps of Arctic Refuge seismic process at this board meeting but it's not on the agenda and instead you've already issued a press release stating your intent to award the contract to SAE. This press release once again does not address any of the public comments in opposition that you have received. When will there be future opportunities for public engagement with regard to the Arctic Refuge or has AIDEA met its public engagement quota for this project already?

That majority of what you propose on slide 8 for next steps sounds like one directional sharing of information about AIDEA's projects. If it's not a two-way exchange then you will continue to fail to "represent the will of the public" that AIDEA ultimately must serve.

I've said this before: it often appears that the AIDEA board has already made its mind up before you receive public comments. If this is the case then you're not actually using public input to inform your decision-making which is illegal and you will be merely conducting damage control and PR--not honest public process. To this point I'm including excerpts from FOUR previous comments below.

I am dismayed that once again I am scrambling at the last minute to convey vital information. 5 days is the bare minimum and way too short notice for any meaningful public engagement. Large scale, long term projects like planning for and permitting a seismic program in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge are of global importance and warrant at least thirty days advance notice. Furthermore, there should be a way to sign up to receive notifications for when the website is updated as a courtesy so we don't have to keep checking back.

Spending of \$1.5million now is eerily reminiscent of when you allocated \$35M for Ambler Road in the height of the Pandemic. Alaska can't afford to waste money on a suspended lease especially given the impending government shut down and 15k state employees just received pink slips!

It is unacceptable that you do not even acknowledge in the 300+ email comments, and on 12/23/20 heard from 39 testifiers all in opposition to bidding on leases except 1.

The proposed Energy Independence Program & Fund can be a powerful engine to diversify Alaska's economy and is clearly aligned with AIDEA's scope and mission, however I am concerned that greater transparency and accountability are necessary to ensure success.

For example, public process is a key element to ensure robust management. I encourage you to establish and implement policies and procedures that require 30 days notice for public comment on resolutions and a publicly available document showing AIDEA's record of its use or rejection of factual or other substantive public comments. I also encourage minimizing the extensive time AIDEA spends in non-public discussions and providing detailed statements describing the basis for and outcomes from each Executive Session.

There is a disconnect between what you said and what you did. Before voting unanimously to pass resolution No. G20-31 AIDEA board members said that they listened to, read, and some even agreed with public comments (which were 98% in opposition). However, there was no honest consideration to any alternative to the resolution on the table. AIDEA board member statements made it clear that your minds were made up well ahead of the hearing. This disconnect between your words and your actions continued when you bid on 11 tracts and ultimately spent \$12,018,825 on Arctic Refuge leases.

I and other members of the Alaskan public, not to mention countless concerned stakeholders across the US and world, are listening very closely to you and it does not appear you have extended the same courtesy to us. During your meeting tomorrow please reconcile this disconnect between your actions and words. Show us that you are listening and acting in good faith.

AIDEA's disregard for the public process is egregious! The draft resolution was released to the public, under pressure, only two days before this meeting, which further fails to serve Alaska's public process. Meeting to discuss and vote on this important and far-reaching resolution in the hours leading up to the Christmas holiday is irresponsible.

Furthermore, to spend \$20 million of taxpayer dollars on such a contentious and hotly-contested issue, in such haste, without reasonable notice, and without forethought of the consequences, fails to serve the public's best interest and fails to meet Governor Dunleavy's commitment - to restore the people's trust in our government.

Finally, my power has been out today due to 80mph winds. The current storm in Southcentral has taken down power in multiple communities during the only 7 hours to submit a written comment during an already prohibitively tight timeframe.

Members of the House State Affairs Committee,

I am writing in opposition to HB 124, “An Act relating to the Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority.”

I support transparency and accountability in public institutions. However, HB 124, as currently drafted, would materially undermine AIDEA’s ability to fulfill its statutory mission as an independent economic development authority and would significantly impair Alaska’s ability to advance responsible natural resource and infrastructure projects.

Several provisions raise serious concern:

- The proposed asset cap would force the liquidation of long-term, revenue-producing assets and disrupt existing loan agreements with small and medium-sized Alaska businesses, creating unnecessary financial instability.
- Requiring legislative approval for projects exceeding \$10 million introduces substantial political and timing uncertainty, effectively rendering AIDEA nonfunctional for projects of meaningful scale. This level of unpredictability is incompatible with private capital participation and federal partnership requirements.
- Provisions that risk public disclosure of proprietary and confidential financial information would deter project applicants entirely, eliminating AIDEA’s ability to evaluate or finance projects competitively.

HB 124 would also have direct and disproportionate impacts on the Northwest Arctic Borough. Communities in the region already face a higher-than-average cost of living and limited job opportunities, making stable employment and economic growth especially critical. The region is home to the Red Dog Mine, where AIDEA-owned infrastructure, including the DeLong Mountain Transportation System and port, has supported one of Alaska’s most successful mining operations for decades. Any forced liquidation of these assets or increased political uncertainty surrounding their management would place existing jobs, local hire commitments, and long-term state and borough revenues at risk.

Additionally, communities in the region have long relied on the jobs and economic activity generated by the Ambler Mining District, and the proposed Ambler Road represents a once-in-a-generation opportunity to provide economic stability, workforce development, and regional self-determination for decades to come. Introducing legislative uncertainty into AIDEA’s ability to support such projects places that future at risk.

Collectively, these changes threaten AIDEA’s creditworthiness, investor confidence, and independence, all of which are foundational to its success. Alaska’s economy, particularly in rural and resource-

dependent regions, relies on a predictable, disciplined, and professionally managed development authority. HB 124 moves decisively in the opposite direction.

If the intent is to strengthen oversight, I encourage a more targeted and collaborative approach that preserves AIDEA's operational independence while addressing specific accountability concerns without destabilizing the institution.

To the members of the Alaska State Legislature;

I am writing to you today to express my strong support for House Bill 124: The AIDEA Accountability Act, and urge you to vote in support of this bill.

The Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority (AIDEA) has a track record of bad investments, contributions to environmental damage that hurts Alaska in the long run, and reckless over-spending, which I believe could be mitigated with more public oversight and a restructuring of the board as is outlined in the bill.

AIDEA's mission statement is to "promote, develop, and advance economic growth and diversification in Alaska by providing various means of financing and investment," yet they have failed to deliver meaningful benefits to Alaskans and primarily serve private interests, gambling with our money and state.

Since 1980, AIDEA has been given \$301 million dollars of public funds. If these same funds were invested into the Permanent Dividend Fund, earning interest, there would be \$11.4 billion dollars in the Permanent Dividend Fund. Seeing as the State of Alaska is consistently seeing deficits in its yearly budget, and struggles to provide education and healthcare to its residents, these billions of dollars could have been put to much better use than the failing projects that AIDEA has invested in.

From 1980 to 2021, nearly half of AIDEA's projects failed- sinking \$233.3 million dollars. It is clear to anyone who looks into where AIDEA is spending their money that they do not invest in smart projects or use their allocated funds wisely. Additionally, from 2008 to 2023, AIDEA only created 218 jobs in Alaska while thousands of Alaskans remained unemployed, in spite of one of the main goals of AIDEA being to provide jobs to Alaskans.

In regards to AIDEA's investments, it has been found that projects they invest in are more likely to cost money than they are to make money. Among the many failed projects AIDEA has invested in are the Mustang oil field, Seward Coal Project, the Skagway Ore Terminal, and Alaska Seafood International. AIDEA has written off \$294 million as worthless since 1987. These outcomes raise serious concerns about whether AIDEA is using public funds responsibly or effectively. I would like to reiterate that this is only based on information that is publicly available, and more information should be accessible to the public about this public-funded corporation.

Additionally, AIDEA is one of the main proponents of the proposed industrial Ambler Road/the Ambler Access Project. They are currently pushing to construct this road and only have a fraction of the money to do so. It has been recently estimated that the project will cost upwards of \$2 billion, while AIDEA is claiming the project

will cost \$765 million. This means more money is being used on what is currently a speculative mining venture than is being spent on education or transportation this year.

The Ambler Access Project and the proposed industrial Ambler Road have also been proven to have massive detrimental impacts on the people, land, cultural resources, fish, animals, and water in northwest Alaska where the road would be constructed. Making sure there is someone advising on environmental impacts of projects AIDEA undertakes is vital to preserving Alaska for future generations.

AIDEA is working with Ambler Metals LLC, which is a mining company that is owned jointly by Trilogy Metals and South32– Trilogy is a Canadian company and South32 is Australian. AIDEA wants to spend (at minimum) \$2 billion dollars of public money on a private road to be used by foreign mining companies, while causing irreparable harm to northwest Alaska.

Providing more oversight into AIDEA’s operations and decision-making is imperative as the state continues to navigate through an ongoing financial crisis and adapts to the realities of climate change that are impacting our state at an alarming rate.

Please pass House Bill 124: the AIDEA Accountability Act. It is the first step in a long process to fix the priorities of the state, and give power back to the people of Alaska over their futures.
