






# FY2025 Civil Hours Billed to Client Agencies






# FY2025-FY2026 Hours Billed by Mission Statement Category





# Labor Relations (CY2025)

- Total number of **Grievances** resolved: **62**

- **Arbitration:** Successfully defended grievance brought by the union on behalf of 12 correctional supervisors who claimed they were entitled to a supervisory differential under Article 24.11 of the APEA collective bargaining agreement



# Consumer Protection Unit

- Alaska's Consumer Protection Law is the Nation's Toughest
  - \$1.0 Minimum & \$25.0 Max per Instance
- Unit Has Its Own Three-person Investigation Team — Scours State for Unfair & Deceptive Trade Practices
- Unit Partners with Other States to Leverage Outside Resources for Harms in Alaska
- Year over Year, Consistently Obtaining Civil Penalties averaging \$7,600.0 over a 5-year span
  - FY2025, \$5,000.0+
  - FY2024, \$13,000.0+
  - FY2023, \$15,600.0
  - FY2022, \$140.0
  - FY2021, \$4,700.0
- Highlights from 2025: Juul, Lithia, Mercedes (totaling ~\$3,500.0)




# Child Protection

- **Strengthened Workforce Stability:** Fostered a supportive and collaborative environment that prioritized attorney training, professional growth and well-being, ensuring continuity in representation for children and families.
  - **Note:** Additional positions from previous legislative years have allowed the section to move away from a crisis driven case management system.
- **Created Advancement Pathways:** Developed a structured promotion track for senior and supervising attorneys, reinforcing career growth opportunities and long-term retention within the agency.
- **Promoted Timely Permanency:** Advocated effectively in court to move cases forward, helping children achieve safe and permanent homes without unnecessary delays.

# Child Welfare Reform Lawsuit (*ABC federal litigation*)

## *What was this case about?*

Suit is an “institutional” or “structural” reform case asking the federal court to direct the State on how much money must be spent on child welfare, exactly how that money should be used, and other specific measures.

## *What happened last session?*

Legislature appropriated sufficient funds to take the case through trial (\$4 million).

## *Why is the case so expensive?*

Compared to other states that settled before trial, the State spent under half of what other states spent (averaging between \$15 to \$20 million). The amount of documents that had to be reviewed and produced was excessive; the preparation for a three-week trial; and depositions and other witness preparation in advance all add to the cost. The State successfully kept costs down by doing the bulk of the legal work, including trial work, in-house.

## *What is the current status?*

Trial was completed in late August through early September. The Department awaits the judge’s ruling. (This was not a jury trial.)




# Vail (Class Action Lawsuit)

## *What is this case about?*

This class action constitutional suit, filed by the ACLU in federal court in May of 2025, seeks systemic reform of inmate health care in the Department of Corrections (DOC) prisons and jails through the judicial branch. This is a national trend against correctional systems. The plaintiffs allege that everything from deficient medical devices, to understaffing, to inadequate recordkeeping constitutes violations of Eighth and Fourteenth Amendments. The putative class is "all prisoners who are now, or will in the future be, subjected to medical, mental health, and dental care policies and practices of the Alaska DOC."

## *What is the current status?*



The Court denied the State's motion to dismiss on December 30, 2025. The case will now proceed to the discovery phase, which could easily last over a year.


# Recent Successes to Unleash Alaska's Resource Potential

## Gaining Access for Resource Development, Fish and Game, and Recreation


- **The State won Fortymile!** Feds disclaimed the entire river system
  - Feds put out notice on eight Recordable Disclaimers of Interest that have been sitting for seven years
  - Next steps: Continue pursuing two existing lawsuits (Mulchatna and Koyukuk), while seeking streamlined processing of the riverbeds Alaska already owns
- **The State won access** to the trails around Chicken, Alaska, vital to mining claims
  - Next steps: Continue pursuing recognition of public trails and roads in Alaska

## Clearing Up Unnecessary Regulatory Hurdles to Build Our Energy Economy

- **Successfully defended** ability for continued oil and gas development on the North Slope
  - Private groups challenged the Polar Bear incidental take regulations; if successful, this would have stopped oil and gas activities
- **Successfully challenged** the expansive critical habitat designation for ice seals which would stall development and economic activity in all waters surrounding western and northern Alaska (now on appeal awaiting a decision)
- **Successfully enjoined** prior definition of Waters of the U.S. that causes incredible delays and unnecessary litigation over any development, whether it be housing, infrastructure, or resource development, in partnership with other states
  - Submitted comments on the recent federal rulemaking
  - Case is stayed while we await the outcome
- **Successfully defeated** new rule that would require Department of Transportation and Public Facilities to create and monitor emission targets on the transportation system (separate and apart from the Clean Air Act), in partnership with other states
- **Successfully defeated** the Liquid Natural Gas Export Ban and Oil & Gas Leasing Moratorium attempted by the last federal administration, in partnership with other states




