FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

Analysis

This bill establishes a firearm safe storage program within the Department of Public Safety by creating a firearm safe storage grant fund and assigning DPS responsibility for managing and implementing the program. Under AS 44.41.080, DPS would be responsible for accepting appropriations, grant funds, and donations; purchasing firearm safe storage devices; arranging for storage and inventory control; distributing devices at no cost to school districts statewide; and adopting regulations necessary to implement the program. This legislation creates a new structured program with statutory responsibilities for procurement, distribution, reporting, and regulatory oversight that are not supported by existing staff or infrastructure.

This fiscal note assumes the addition of one Criminal Justice Technician 1 position to provide administrative and program support for the firearm safe storage program. The position would perform clerical and technical support functions, including maintaining records, tracking inventory and distributions, processing documentation related to procurement and shipping, coordinating logistics with internal staff and external partners, and supporting required reporting and regulatory documentation. The position is assumed to be located in Anchorage.

The fiscal note assumes the procurement and distribution of approximately 5,000 firearm safe storage devices annually. Devices are assumed to be basic firearm locking devices, such as cable or trigger locks, consistent with the statutory definition of firearm safe storage device. Based on current market pricing, these devices are estimated to cost between \$5 and \$20 per unit. Using a midpoint estimate of \$12.50 per device, annual device procurement costs are estimated at approximately \$62.5 and are reflected as commodities. Services include approximately \$2.0 for shipping and handling associated with statewide distribution and \$17.0 for standard departmental chargebacks.

The fiscal impact to DPS results from the creation of a new program requiring dedicated staffing and ongoing operating costs. The primary cost drivers are personnel necessary to provide administrative support for program operations and the procurement and distribution of firearm safe storage devices. Other provisions of the bill related to school reporting and parental notification do not have a fiscal impact on DPS.
