










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
LIMITATION (CONTRACT AUTHORITY) AND FUNDING (REVENUE)




FEDERAL TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION APPORTIONMENTS **FFY2025**

SECTION 5307 URBANIZED AREA FOR TRANSIT & ALASKA RAILROAD (ARRC) FFY25 APPORTIONMENT







The initiative supports Rural Alaska by partnering with Alaska Native and Rural Villages to gather situational awareness data on snow, ice, and trails while creating scalable, sustainable models.


