Analysis

Since the implementation of the Medicaid Expansion Group in 2015, most individuals now qualify for Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI) Medicaid, eliminating the need for the Chronic and Acute Medical Assistance (CAMA) program. Currently, no one is using the service, as its only eligible population—legal immigrants who do not meet the five-year residency requirement for Medicaid—can access alternative options through the federally facilitated marketplace. The division can integrate the regulatory repeal of CAMA into regular updates with minimal impact on public assistance field services.
