Sponsor Statement – HB 306

"An act creating a state energy policy"

Creating a state energy policy is one of the first steps to meeting the state's energy current and future needs. A comprehensive energy policy in statute will serve as a blueprint for future generations of Alaskans.

The House Special Committee on Energy Co-chairs Rep. Bryce Edgmon, D-Dillingham and Rep. Charisse Millett, R-Anchorage used a unique method to draft the bill - they didn't write it.

Instead, they assembled a diverse group of Alaskans with decades of experience in energy policy to come together and write what they believed would make a good energy policy for Alaska.

The result of their hard work is House Bill 306. The draft energy policy carries five core fundamental principles to guide the state moving forward:

- Promote energy efficiency and conservation
- Promote development of renewable and non-renewable energy resources
- Promote economic development through cost-effective, long-term sources of energy for communities statewide
- Support energy research, education, and workforce development
- Support coordination of governmental functions, which promotes streamlining of regulatory processes and overall coordination of efforts by all levels of government

If passed, Alaska will join many other states in having a statewide energy policy on the books.

2 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

- * Section 1. The uncodified law of the State of Alaska is amended by adding a new section to read:
- 5 LEGISLATIVE INTENT. It is the intent of the legislature that
- 6 (1) the state achieve a 15 percent increase in energy efficiency on a per capita 7 basis between 2010 and 2020;
- 8 (2) the state receive 50 percent of its electric generation from renewable energy sources by 2025;
- 10 (3) the state work to ensure a reliable in-state gas supply for residents of the 11 state;
- 12 (4) the power project fund (AS 42.45.010) serve as the main source of state 13 assistance for energy projects;
- 14 (5) the state remain a leader in petroleum and natural gas production and 15 become a leader in renewable alternative energy development.

22	(A) promoting the development of renewable energy resources,
23	including geothermal, wind, solar, hydroelectric, hydrokinetic, tidal, and
24	biomass energy, for use by Alaskans and for export of power that is surplus to
