RE: Background on proposed Catch Sharing Plan

As a result of my conversations with members of the House Fisheries Committee and other members of the Alaska State Legislature, I have been asked to provide a briefing that explains SEAGO's and the Alaska charter industry's concern with the Catch Sharing Plan (CSP) currently in public comment period.

While I have outlined multiple points of concern that address myriad issues presented in the CSP, in a different document, there are two that I believe are of the greatest interest to the Alaska State Legislature.

- Because of the lack of current economic analysis (CSP is based on 1998 economic data) the
 devastating impact of the CSP to the sectors or coastal communities has not been properly
 understood. The loss of jobs and charter fishing related revenue should be projected prior to
 the implementation of this rule.
- CSP circumvents the public process by placing the authority of setting annual management
 measures (bag and size limits) with the <u>International Pacific Halibut Commission (IPHC)</u> rather
 than with the <u>North Pacific Fishery Management Council</u>. The IPHC is not subject to the
 <u>Administrative Procedures Act (APA)</u> which mandates public involvement in the rule-making
 process. In essence, this change removes United States citizens from management decisions
 over domestic allocation. Convenience and expediency should never justify preventing public
 involvement in significant policy decisions.

I will expound on these points and reference others during my testimony before the committee during its hearing on September 1st.
