Mission

The mission of the Division of Institutions is to promote public safety. Our division provides secure confinement, access to reformative programs and offender management planning that promotes successful community re-entry.

Institutions

- One of six unified systems in the country
- Jails serve all newly remanded offenders and those serving one year or less
- Prisons house all offenders who are sentenced to one year or more
- 13 Facilities statewide plus one out of state facility at Hudson Correctional Center (HCC) in Hudson, CO
- On February 13, 2013, the institutions' population (including HCC) was 5,079
- 40,347 bookings in 2012 (23,619 individuals)

Custody Levels

Inmates are housed by custody level. Similar risk inmates are housed together. Aids in reducing the risk of assaultive and predatory behavior.

- National Custody levels (averages)
 - Minimum 35-40%
 - Medium 34-45%
 - Close/Maximum 10-15%
- Alaska Custody levels
 - Minimum 44% (includes 18% community custody)
 - Medium 36%
 - Close/Maximum 16%
 - Unclassified 4%

Custody Levels

MINIMUM

- Prisoners who consistently maintain appropriate behavior and meet institutional and social standards for the least restrictive housing and supervision. This prisoner can be housed in facilities without perimeter fences and with intermittent staff supervision.

MEDIUM

- Prisoners who are not generally management problems though do require housing in facilities with secure perimeter fencing. This prisoner is assigned to general population housing and less frequent staff supervision. *Medium custody prisoners may be eligible for furlough up to a maximum of 24 months prior to scheduled release.*

Custody Levels

CLOSE

- Prisoners who require an increased level of supervision and secure perimeter fencing but who can be managed and housed in general population. They do not require two officer escorts or restraints for normal movement and is considered less risk for both assault and escape than the prisoner classified maximum.

MAXIMUM

- Prisoners who require the highest level of supervision and most secure housing within the institution. This is due to being identified as the most seriously disruptive inmate. Housing is almost always single-cell with two officers and restraints required for any movement outside of the cell.

Classification

- Classification policy updated to emphasize behavioral incentives that encourage compliance with programming and other expectations
- Provide timely and accurate custody designations
- Provide a process which moves an offender from initial screening to an integrated transition to supervision upon release
- Includes both an Offender Management Plan (OMP) and an Individual Re-entry Plan (IRP) for each sentenced medium or high risk felon
- It is a process that identifies what programs are needed to reduce criminogenic needs and helps measure an offender's readiness for re-entry into the community
