The Constitution of the State of Alaska Article 8 – Natural Resources

§ 4. Sustained Yield

Fish, forests, wildlife, grasslands, and all other replenishable resources belonging to the State shall be utilized, developed, and maintained on the sustained yield principle, subject to preferences among beneficial uses.

(2) manage, protect, maintain, improve, and extend the fish, game and aquatic plant resources of the state in the interest of the economy and general well-being of the state;

To protect, maintain, and improve the fish, game, and aquatic plant resources of the state, and manage their uses and development in the best interest of the economy and the well-being of the people of the state, consistent with the sustained yield principle.

 Provide hunting and fishing opportunities, protect state's rights to manage its fish and wildlife resources, protect and improve habitat and access.

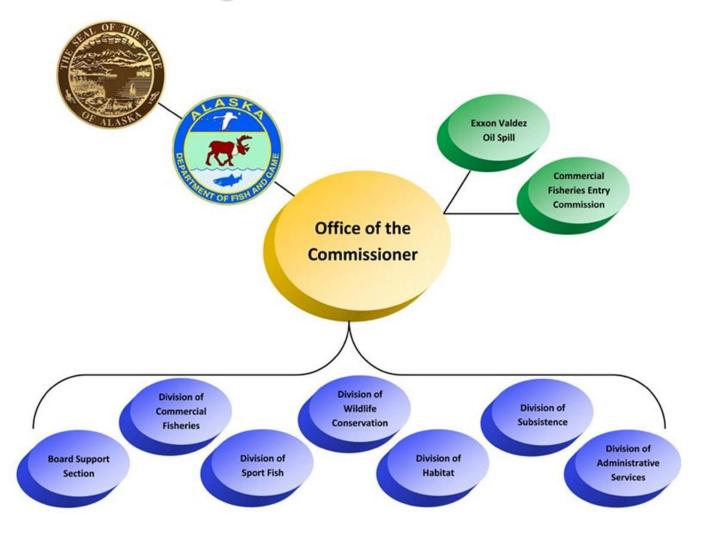

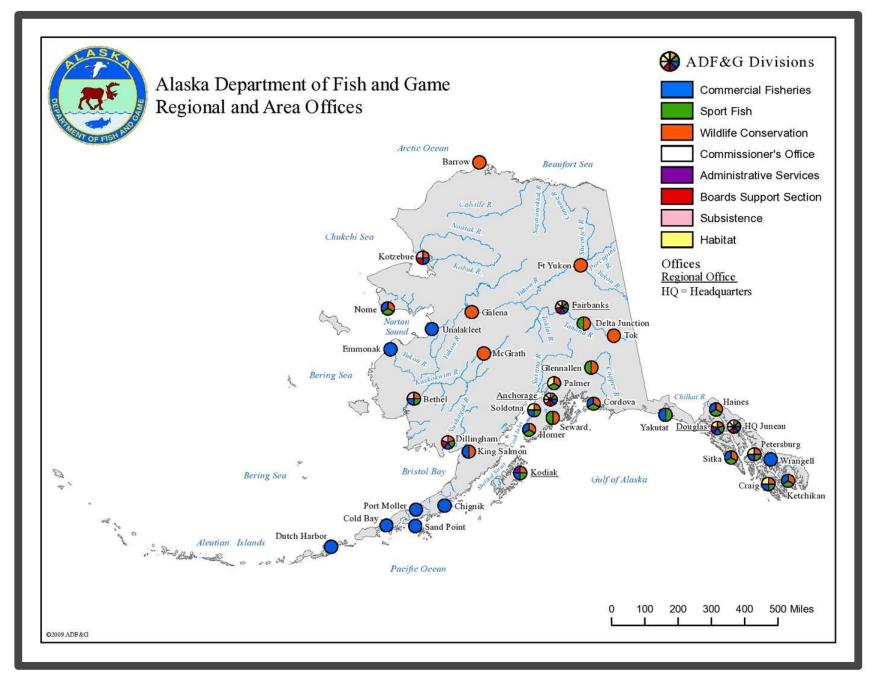

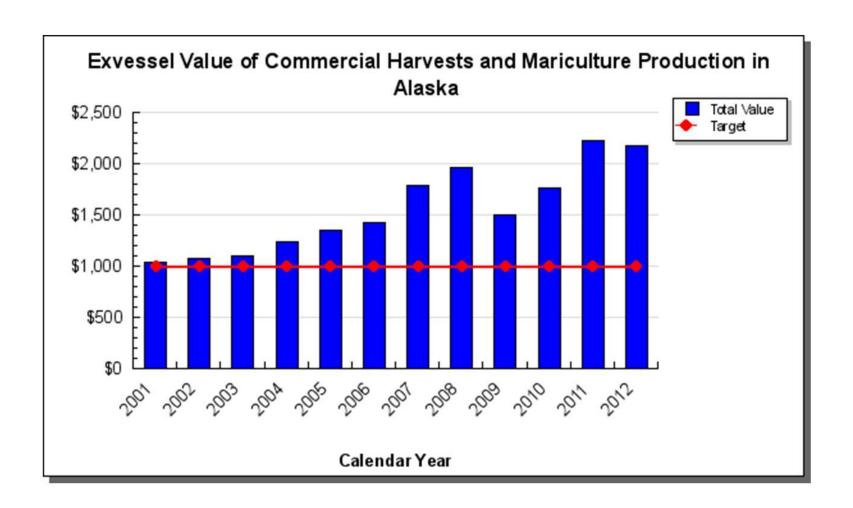

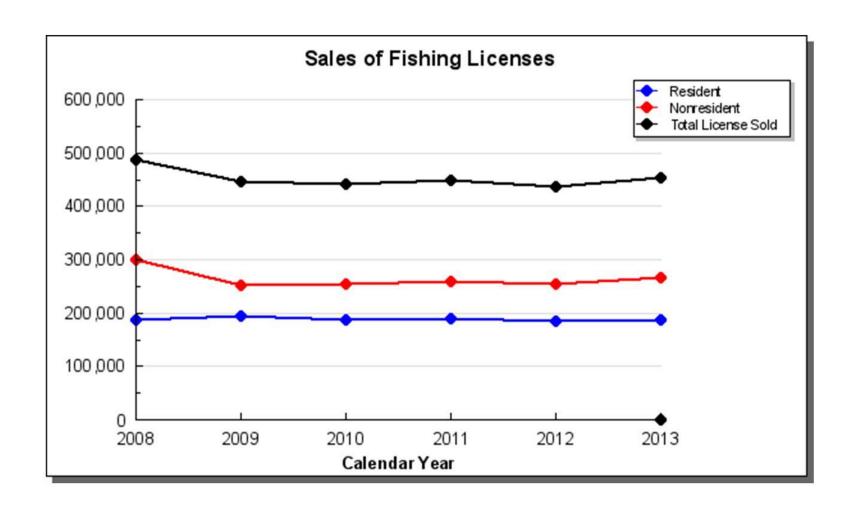

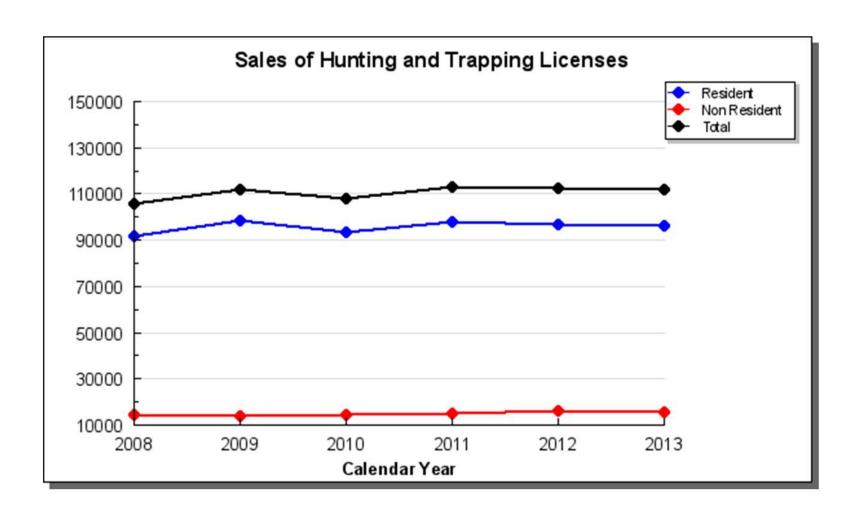

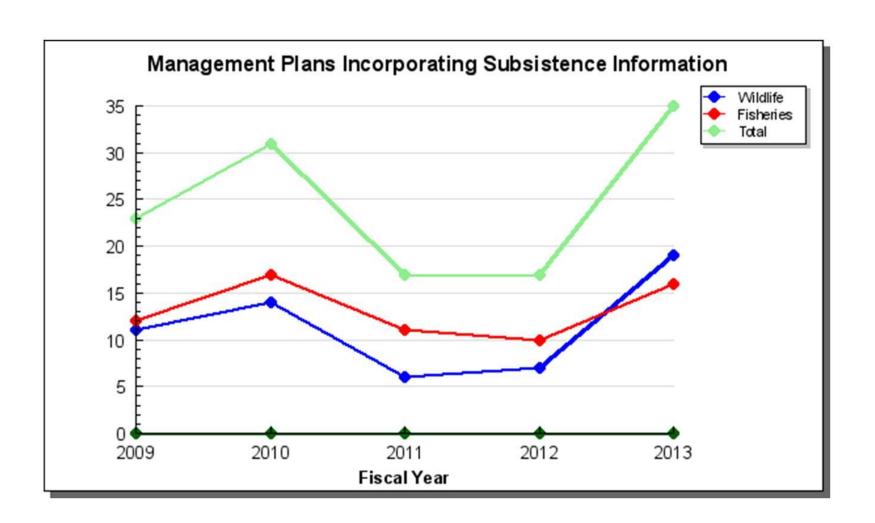

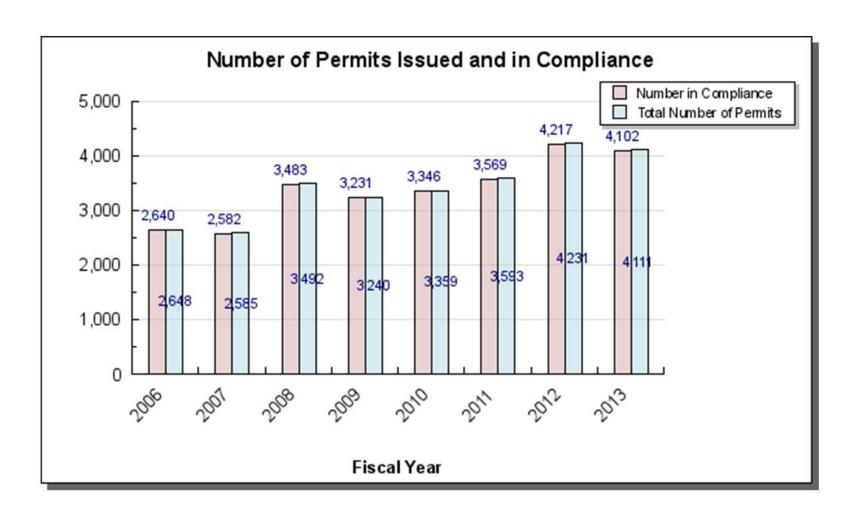

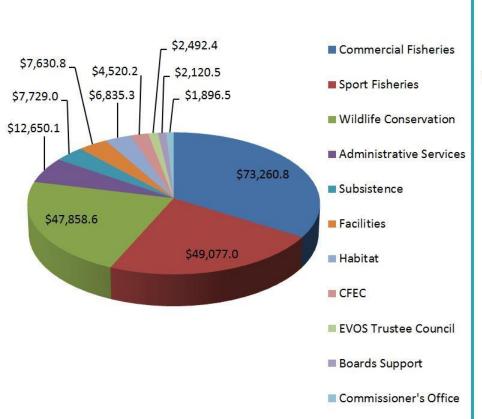

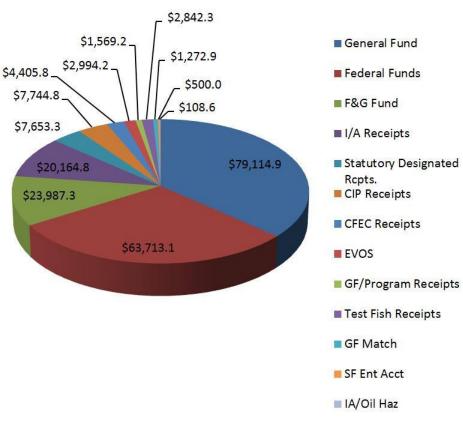

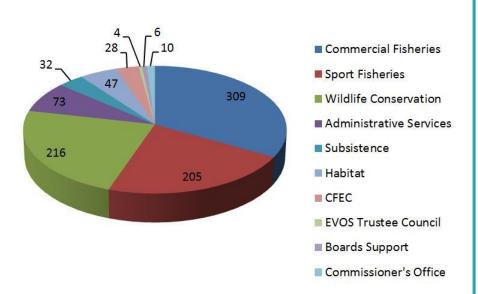


FY2015 Budget By Fund Source

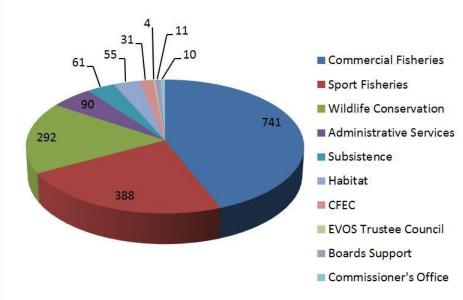


FY2015 Budgeted Positions

Request GF budget equals \$269 per resident worker.*

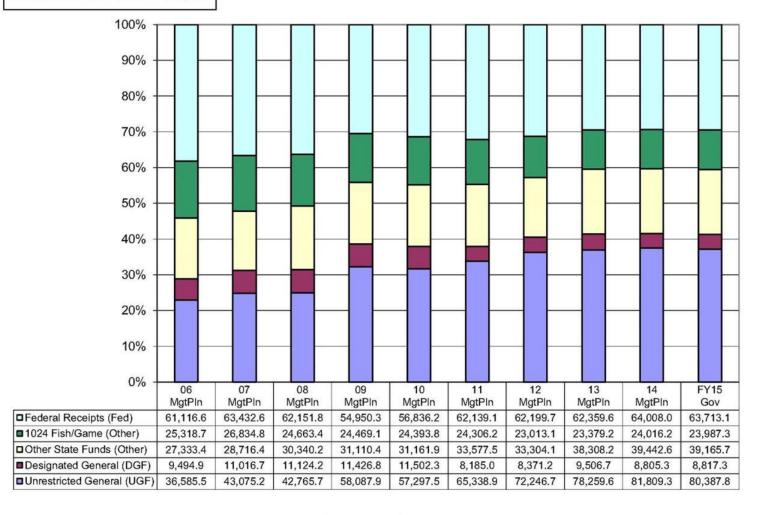


According to the Department of Labor, there were 331,081 resident workers in Alaska in 2011.

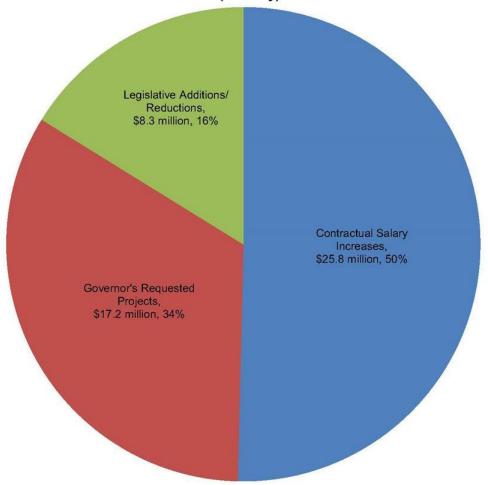

Department of Fish & Game Percent of the Total Department's Budget by Fund Group (All Funds)

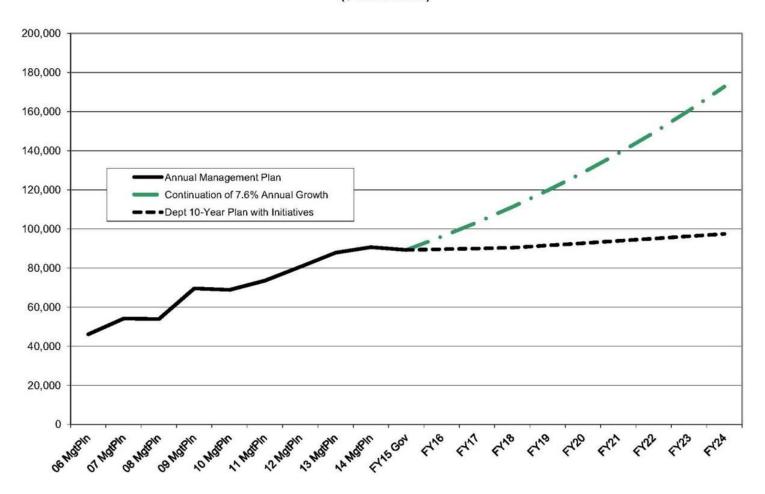

Department of Fish & Game Approximate Growth from FY05-FY15 Governor's Request (GF Only)

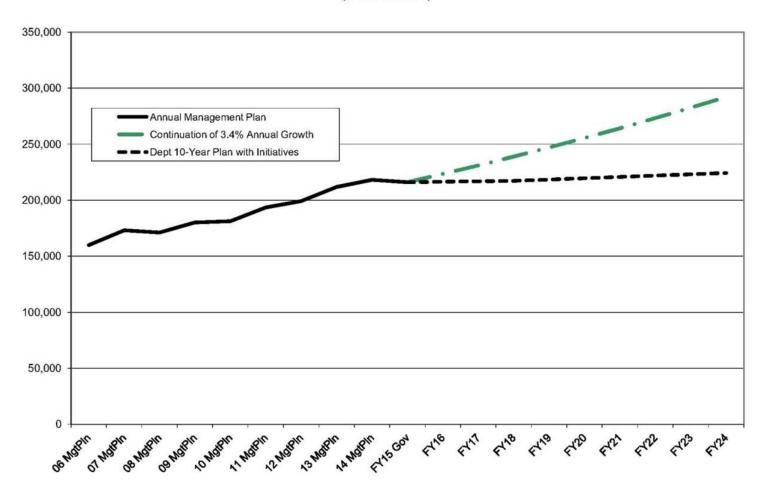


Department of Fish & Game Continued Budget Growth Compared to 10-Year Plan (GF Only) (\$ Thousands)

- ➤ \$1 million increase in federal receipt authority for Wildlife Conservation, Pittman-Robertson funds
- ➤ Elimination of 36 vacant positions and associated funding
 - 10 permanent full-time
 - 12 permanent part-time/seasonal
 - 14 non-permanent
 - \$570.0 UGF reduction, \$739.0 federal reduction, \$509.8 other
