- 5. Link people to needed personal health services and assure the provision of heath care when otherwise unavailable.

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


Legislative Finance's 10-Year Look Back

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



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TOBACCO PREVENTION AND CONTROL

Smoking On the Decline

- High School Students
 - Overall \clubsuit from 37% (1995) to 14% (2011).
 - AK Native \Downarrow from 60% (1995) to 26% (2011).
- Adults
 - Overall \bigcirc from 28% (1996) to 21% (2010).

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Immunization Rates Improving

- Two-year olds fully immunized
 - #39 rank among states, improved from #42.
 - **69%** of Alaska 2-year olds are fully immunized, up from 66%.
 - Alaska Natives generally have higher immunization rates.
- 7% "opt-out" rate highest in U.S. and climbing.

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FY2013 STATUS UPDATE Budget Increments

- Increased funding for Nursing grantees \$1,100.0 GF/Fed
- Immunization for Children & Seniors: \$700.0 GF/Fed
- Loan Repayment Program Expansion: \$380.0 GF/MHTAAR
- Chlamydia Media Campaign, Testing & Therapy: \$360.0 GF

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Challenges & Top Priorities

Budget Overview, p. 335-341



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Obesity is the dominant public health problem today.

- Medical complications; premature death.
 - Eclipses tobacco in terms of medical costs.
 - Challenge is to address physical, social, and economic environment that makes it easy to be inactive while making it harder to be active.

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Tobacco remains a significant health problem.

- 600 Alaska deaths annually; nearly \$500 million in medical costs & lost productivity.
 - Disproportionately affects Alaska Natives.
 - Smokeless tobacco rates higher than national average.

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Infectious Disease is still a threat

- Low rate of immunizations for children under age 2.
 - High rates of sexually transmitted diseases and tuberculosis.
 - Alaska's role as transportation and tourism hub increases the challenge as people come here from around the world.

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Maintaining Community Water Fluoridation is a challenge

- One of the top ten public health accomplishments of 20th century.
- Alaska Native children without fluoride water have 2x more decay.
 - Losing ground with fluoridated public water systems.
 - 67% of population in 2006
 - 55% of population in 2011

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Unintentional injury 3rd leading cause of death in Alaska.

- #1 leading cause of death for ages 1 to 44 years.
- Falls are leading cause of non-fatal hospitalizations for all ages.
- 90% of drowning fatalities were not wearing a life jacket.
 - Largely preventable with education and expertise from prevention specialists.

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Investing in Public Health infrastructure makes sense

- •It generally costs less to keep someone well than treat them when they are sick.
- •Efficiencies gained when aging data systems are replaced and new data systems facilitate service integration.

•Health systems need to be expanded to be truly statewide.


