The **Tenth Amendment (Amendment X)** to the <u>United States Constitution</u>, which is part of the <u>Bill of Rights</u>, was ratified on December 15, 1791. The Tenth Amendment states the Constitution's principle of <u>federalism</u> by providing that powers not granted to the <u>federal government</u> by the Constitution, nor prohibited to the <u>States</u>, are reserved to the States or the people.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.
