The Capital Programs section is responsible for assembling funding requests for each project into a three-year schedule of capital improvements called the State Transportation Improvement Program or STIP. I supervised the preparation of the STIP and subsequent tracking to ensure timely disbursement of federal funds for construction and maintenance of the entire state surface highway system, including allocations for the Anchorage and Fairbanks metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs). I also supervise the preparation of the Department's annual capital budget which is currently worth approximately \$1billion and funds all transportation projects within the state, including highways, airports, rail, ports, etc. The Capital Programs Section is also responsible for the scenic byways program and the preparation of the urban work planning program, which allocates federal planning funds to the Anchorage and Fairbanks MPOs. Currently, the Capital Programs staff includes six (6) planner IIIs, one (1) planner I/II and one non-permanent intern.
