

Alaska's Dynamic Economy The churning labor market



During the average year –

- Approximately 80,000 individuals move in/out of Alaska
- Alaska employers hire over 200,000 workers, the majority of them filling existing positions
- The state's job count is about 45,000 higher in July than in January a huge seasonal swing

During 2011, Alaska had a –

- Labor Surplus: 7.6 percent average annual unemployment
- Labor Shortage: Just over 20% of Alaska's workers 83,488 individuals were nonresidents





Wage and Hour Administration



Mission: Advance opportunities for employment by providing legal employment conditions, enforcing Alaska's Employment Preference Act, and providing safe work environments for children.

- · 14,870 employer briefings
- · 359 wage claims resolved \$600K in wages for Alaska workers
- Evaluated 7,857 youth work permits
- Conducted 584 Alaska resident hire and prevailing wage worksite inspections

Mechanical Inspection



Mission: Reduce hazards to life and property posed by unsafe boilers, pressure vessels, elevators, escalators, trams, lifts, and electrical and plumbing work.

- Increased boiler inspections by 16%
- Boiler inspection backlog increased by 25% (3,168 units)
- Increased elevator inspections by 5%
- Elevator inspection backlog is up 10% (61 units)
- Maintained electrical and plumbing code inspections
- Issued \$80K in contractor licensing civil fines

Alaska Occupational Safety and Health




Mission: Eliminate workplace injuries, illnesses and deaths through a combination of consultation and enforcement functions.

- · Youth Safety Outreach program
- Seafood processing industry partnerships
- Conducted 706 worksite inspections (+7%)
- Reduced accidents loss time rate reduced by 5.5%
- Fatalities constant, but lower in AKOSH jurisdiction





Mission: Ensure the efficient, fair and predictable delivery of indemnity, medical and vocational rehabilitation benefits intended to enable workers to return to work at a reasonable cost to employers.

Workers' Compensation



Mission: Advance injured workers' employment opportunities.

- 387 employers were investigated for illegally operating without workers' compensation insurance
- 120 employers were penalized for illegally operating without workers' compensation insurance

Workers' Compensation Appeals Commission



Mission: Ensure timely, thoughtful, well-reasoned and sound decisions on appeals from the final decisions and orders of the Workers' Compensation Board.

- Reduced the time lag from record closure to written decision issuance to 62 days, compared to 75 days in FY2011
- In cooperation with the Alaska Labor Relations Agency, attracted two volunteer summer law interns who received six weeks of intensive training

Benefits Guaranty Fund

Mission: Pay benefits to workers who have been injured while working for an employer that was not in compliance with the Workers' Compensation Act and fails to pay benefits owed to the injured worker.

FY2012:

• \$329.1 in benefits were paid to 22 claimants

Second Injury Fund

Mission: Facilitate reemployment of injured workers.

FY2012:

• \$3,256.9 in benefits were paid to 95 claimants

Fishermen's Fund



Mission: Provide assistance with the medical and health care costs of occupational injuries or illnesses due to commercial fishing activities on shore or in state waters, allowing commercial fishermen to get back to work promptly.



Unemployment Insurance



Mission: Provide economic stability for communities in Alaska through payment of unemployment insurance benefits that keep skilled workers in Alaska.

FY2012:

- Benefits Paid in FY2012 \$305,338.7
 - ∘ State \$146,231.9
 - Federal \$128,193.4
 - Interstate \$17,954.4
 - Reimbursable Employers \$12,959.0

Maximum number of benefit weeks payable is 86 (26 weeks of state benefits and 60 weeks of federal benefits).

Unemployment Insurance



- Staff investigate fraud tips, assess penalties and collect wrongfully obtained benefits
 - Fraud penalties assessed in FY2012: \$2,878.4
 - Fraud overpayments collected in FY2012: \$1,539.1
