





Pioneer Homes	\$1,300.0 (GF/PR) \$434.0 (I/A)	The 8.5 percent requested rate increase should allow the division to collect an additional \$1.3 million in general fund program receipts and \$434.0 in interagency receipts annually.




Alaska Pioneer Homes - General Fund 2006-2015






Alaska Pioneer Homes - Allocation Summary 2007-2016








Alaska Pioneer Homes - Current Challenges


- Aging facility upkeep

Population Age 65-Plus Alaska, 2012 to 2042


