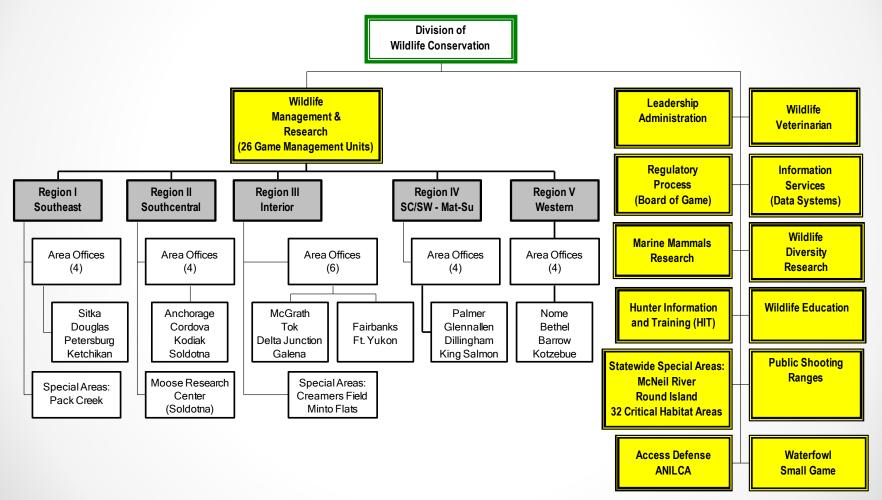

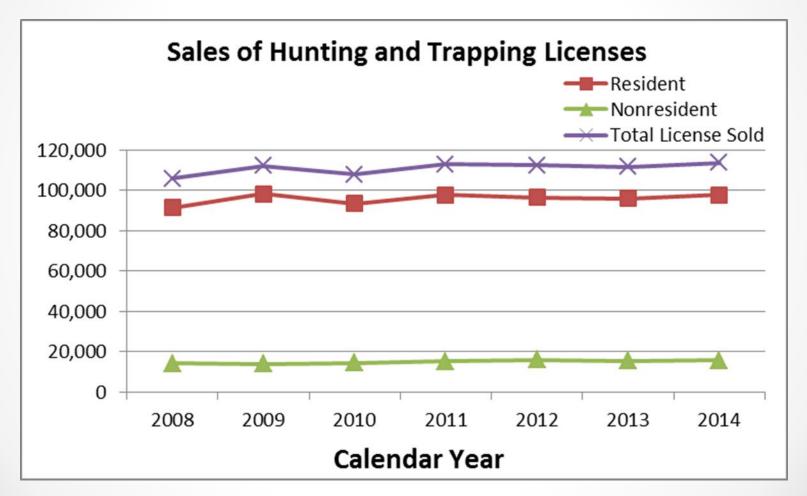


Wildlife Conservation: Functional Organization



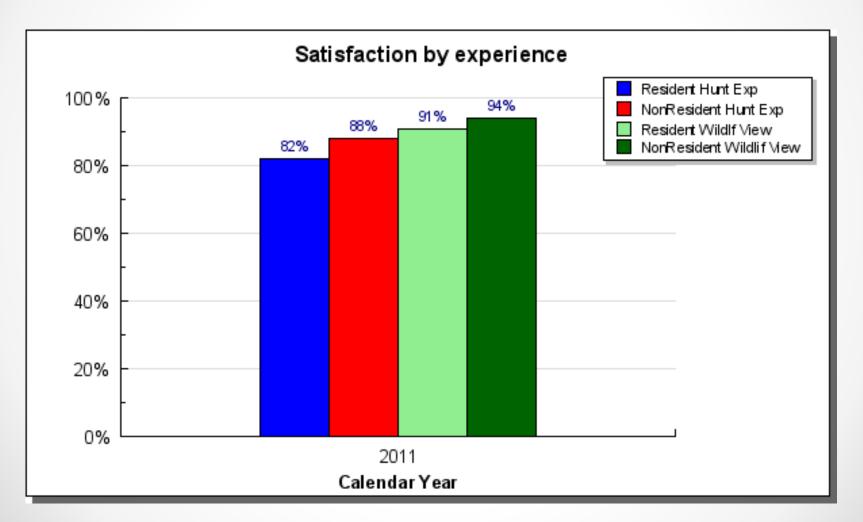


Wildlife Conservation Performance Measure: Increase sales of hunting and trapping licenses



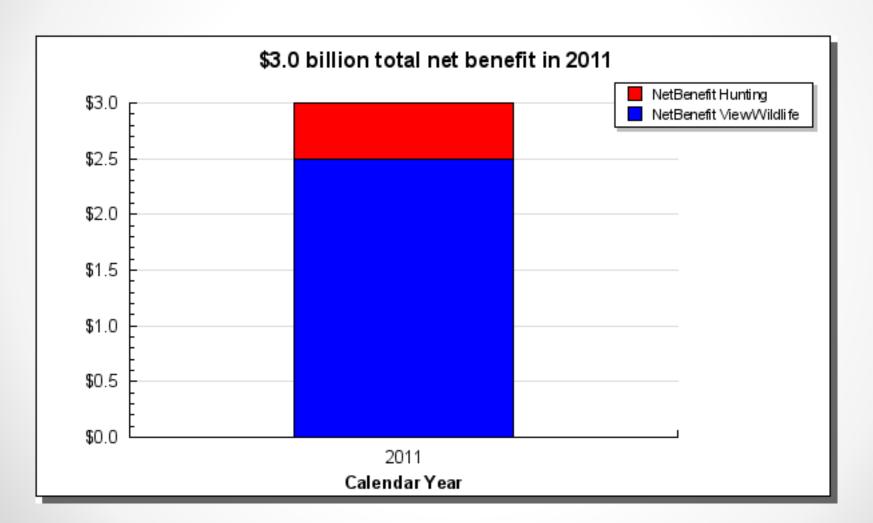


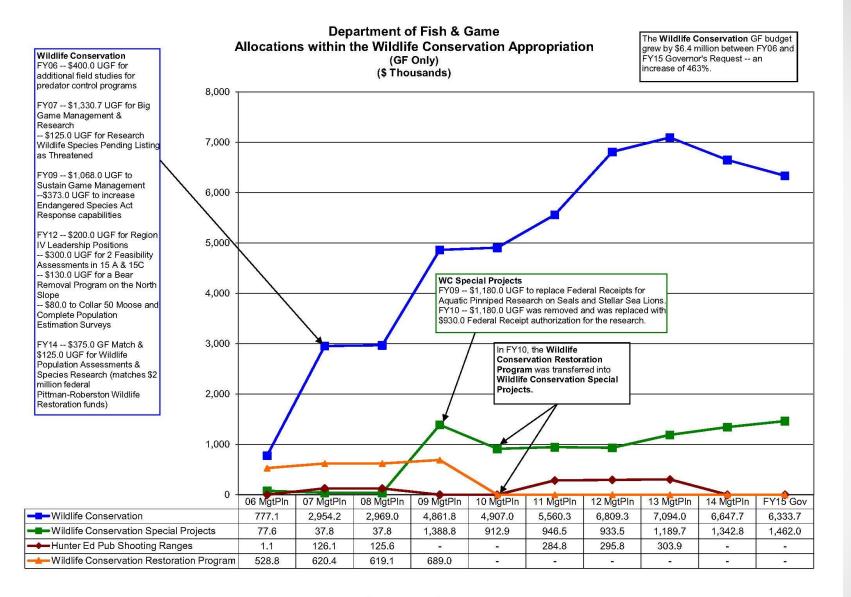
Wildlife Conservation Performance Measure: Satisfaction of wildlife experience – 2011 study





Wildlife Conservation Performance Measure: Economic value of wildlife – 2011 study

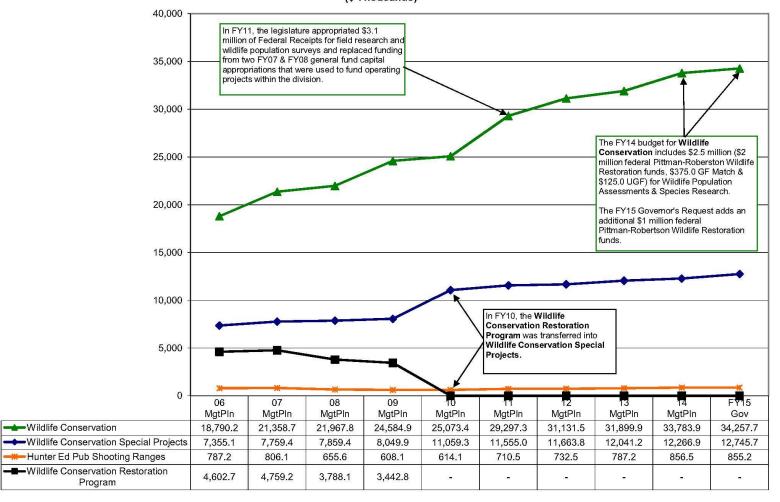




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Department of Fish & Game Allocations within the Wildlife Conservation Appropriation (All Funds) (\$ Thousands)

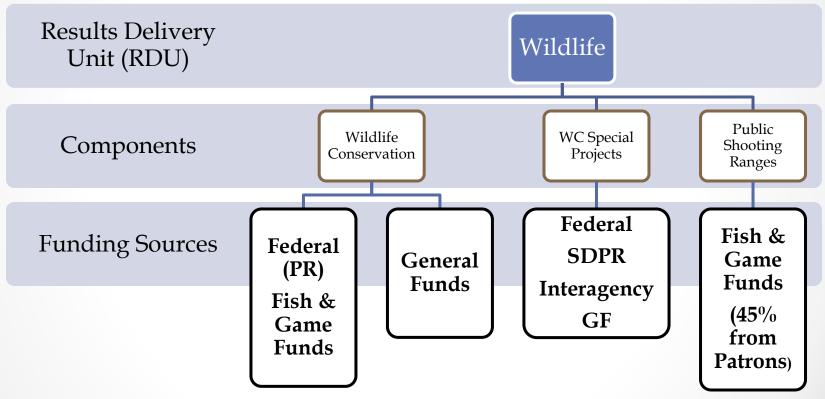
The Wildlife Conservation budget has increased by \$16.3 million from FY06 to FY15 Governor's Request an increase of 52%.



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Budget Structure

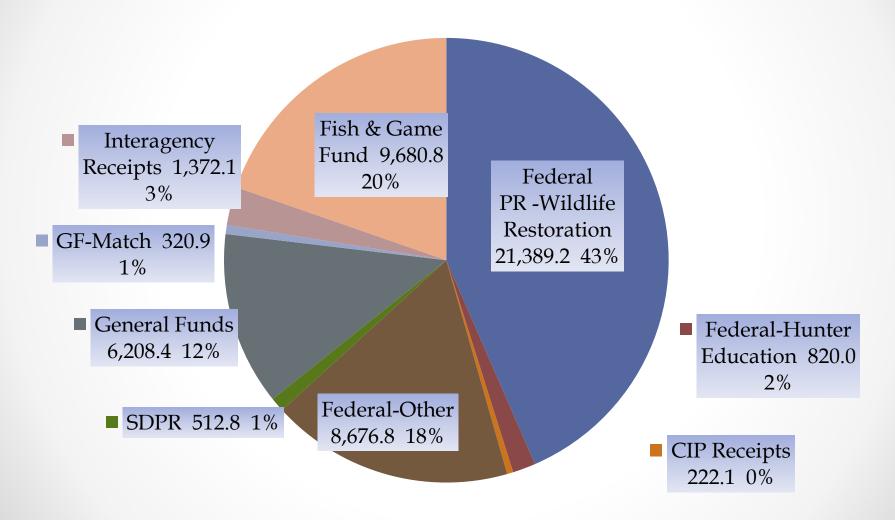

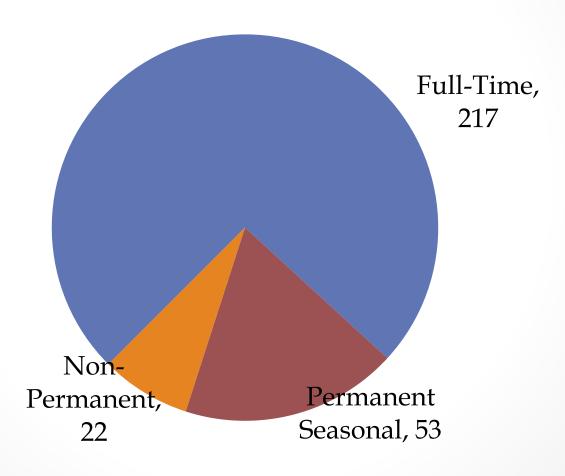


FY2016 by Fund Source Wildlife Conservation - \$49,203.1

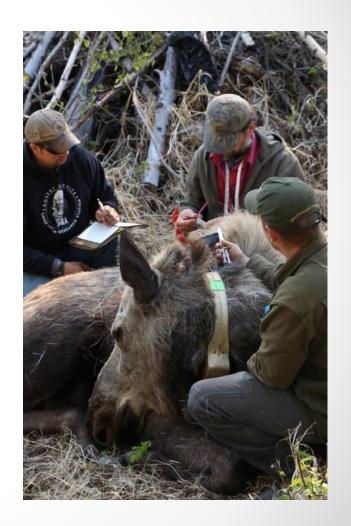

Accomplishments in 2014

➤ Intensive Management

- Moose, Caribou, Deer Populations Important for High Levels of Consumptive Use
- Predator Management, Habitat Enhancement
- Currently: ~6 Active Predator, ~5 Ongoing Habitat,~3 Feasibility, 5 suspended
- ➤ Wood Bison Reintroduction
 - ➤ Moving to the landscape, March 2015
- ➤ Caliber of Science and Customer Service
- Economic Contribution of Alaska's Wildlife





Funding Challenges

Federal Funding

- Unprecedented increase from Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Restoration Excise tax on guns, ammunition, and archery equipment
 - > up 230% over the past 7 years
- ➤ Challenge to meet 25% Match

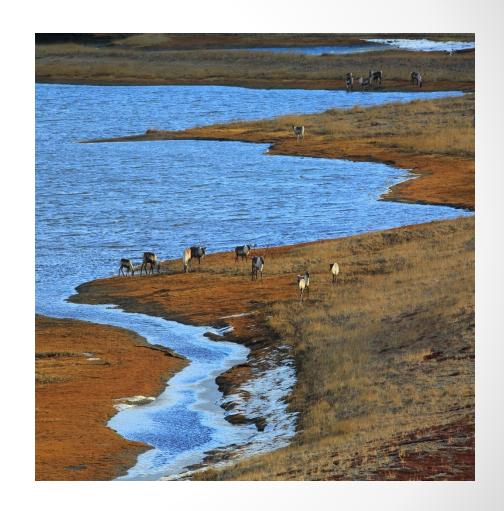
Fish and Game Fund

- Revenue from Licenses and Tags
 - Residents up 7% since 2002 \$2.2M for 2014
 - Non-Residents down 18.6% since 2002 \$5.0M for 2014

- Endangered Species
- ➤ Arctic Caribou Declines
- Data Management





Key Changes in Operating Budget for FY2016

> Fund Source Change

- Reduce General Funds, \$1.2 Million
- Increase Federal Funds from Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Restoration
 - ➤ Applicable projects and staff adjusted between funding sources. Potentially a one-time action.
- ➤ Looking to FY2017
 - ➤ GF reductions will impact some of the following functions: Special Areas, Access Defense, Assert & Protect State's Rights, ESA Response
 - > Work that cannot be funded under Wildlife Restoration or Fish & Game Fund
- > \$1 Million Federal Increase Wildlife Population Assessments
 - Maintain existing services for the hunting public related to species population analysis and research.
