

Alaska Federation of Natives 2014 Legislative & Litigation Committee Resolution 14-11

TITLE:SUPPORT OF A STATEWIDE INITIATIVE TO REDUCE RECIDIVISM AND PROMOTE
SUCCESSFUL RE-ENTRY FOR ALASKA NATIVES WITH CRIMINAL RECORDS

- WHEREAS: The Alaska Federation of Natives (AFN) is the largest statewide Native organization in Alaska and its membership includes 151 federally-recognized tribes, 134 village corporations, 12 regional corporations, and 12 regional nonprofit and tribal consortiums that contract and compact to run federal and state programs; and
- WHEREAS: The mission of AFN is to enhance and promote the cultural, economic, and political voice of the entire Alaska Native community; and
- WHEREAS: There are 138,312 Alaska Native people in Alaska, comprising 19.5% of the state's total population; and
- WHEREAS: Alaska Natives are dramatically overrepresented within the correctional system, comprising 37% of institutionalized adult offenders in the Alaska Department of Corrections institutions; and
- WHEREAS: From 2008-2012 the number of Alaska Natives in Alaska Department of Corrections institutions increased by 17.4%; and
- WHEREAS: In 2012 there were 2,146 Alaska Native adults institutionalized within Alaska
 Department of Corrections, including 377 housed in out-of-state facilities, and an additional 1,580 on probation or parole; and
- WHEREAS: Alaska has highest number of state-created legislative and regulatory barriers to successful re-entry for individuals with criminal records of any state in the U.S., and these collateral consequences disproportionately affect Alaska Natives; and
- WHEREAS: Alaska Natives have the highest recidivism rate among all ethnic groups in Alaska, at 73.8%; and
- WHEREAS: Alaska Natives have been impacted more than any other ethnic groups by issues that have a direct bearing on justice including unfamiliarity with the justice system, poverty, homelessness, substance use, domestic violence, and a cultural adherence to honesty which equates to guilty pleas; and

- WHEREAS: Over half (51.4%) of all incarcerated Alaska Native adults are released to urban areas such as Anchorage, disconnected from family, culture, subsistence lifestyle, and vital support systems.
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the AFN Legislative & Litigation Committee of the Alaska Federation of Natives, Inc., a Standing Committee authorized to act on behalf of the AFN Board of Directors, that there be a statewide initiative to reduce recidivism and improve re-entry outcomes among Alaska Natives involved in the correctional system; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED it be a priority to create and implement culturally relevant community-based re-entry services and establish best practices for effective reintegration of Alaska Natives with criminal histories; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that AFN endorses the Alaska Native Justice Center to lead a statewide effort to examine and develop recommendations regarding sentencing practices, collateral consequences, pre- and post-release re-entry processes, and other factors that affect recidivism among Alaska Natives; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that AFN hereby endorses the Alaska Native Justice Center's proposal to the United States Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance for a Second Chance Act Statewide Adult Recidivism Reduction Strategic Plan Implementation Program grant for the fiscal years 2014-2017; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution shall be the policy of AFN until it is withdrawn or modified by subsequent resolution.
